

JOHNSON HOPEFUL FOR SETTLEMENT IN NRA DISPUTES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The whole question of NRA reorganization will be settled two weeks from Monday at Hyde Park, N. Y., when Mr. H. H. Johnson, recovery administrator, said today after nearly two hours' conference with President Roosevelt.

Johnson, in a jovial mood, left the White House insisting that he was not fighting and that the only thing that worried him back was a "slight misunderstanding as to timing."

The president decided that I should go on a two weeks vacation and will settle the matter in two weeks at Hyde Park.

Johnson insisted that "this thing is not a matter of life or death."

The Blue Eagle chieftain was reacting to reports of sharp conflict between Mr. H. H. Johnson, and Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins over reorganization policies.

Johnson's reaction was to reports of his possible divorce from recovery efforts, the administrator pointed out that he wanted to change his relationship to the program, adding that "I recommended that before I went away."

To questions as to whether that meant he was to become head of the board of directors of the NRA, Johnson refused to commit himself, declaring that that was a question for Mr. Roosevelt to decide.

**U. S. Must Work
Own Relief Plan**

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Harvey L. Hopkins, federal relief administrator, returned today on the S. S. Washington from a survey of European relief measures convinced that the United States must work out a relief program of its own.

"It was made clear to me that we must find an American way of meeting the hazards of the economic system," he said, "such as unemployment and old age insurance, rather than rely on the schemes they have abroad."

"I think that some type of unemployment insurance, coupled with a permanent program of public works, would be non-competitive with private enterprise should be worked out."

**New Road Will Aid

Eastern Newspapers Observe Liberty League With Varied Sentiments Of Favor, Alarm

The following is a synopsis of editorial opinion of the newly organized American Liberty league:

New York Herald Tribune (Republican)—With the unveiling by Mr. Joseph Shouse of the American Liberty League certain premonitory signs and omens are fulfilled. The beginnings, at any rate, of that bipartisan conservative opposition to the New Deal, which many commentators have foreseen, stand revealed.

New York Daily News (Independent)—We're in favor of the New Deal up to now; think the welfare of the country is bound up with the Roosevelt innovations and reforms. But we're all in favor of having the opposition come to life in this manner and start a real contest. We need a real opposition in this country, even in these crucial times. We don't want the United States to generate into a yes-yes country of the Hitler variety.

Philadelphia Record (democrat)—The League will be just as American as the financial internationalism of its sires. It will be just as liberty-loving as its real aim of restoring banker government will allow. . . . The impossibility of uniting all groups under the New Deal banner is conclusively demonstrated by the formation of the League. Viewing its mobilization, the president should breathe a sigh of relief. It is easier to fight an enemy in front, than treachery in the ranks behind.

Buffalo Courier Express—The organization may be non-partisan, but it is to be observed that the outstanding members of its executive committee . . . are not to be included among those who look upon the Roosevelt policies with any degree of sympathy. However, if this produces sharp criticism, keen condemnation, that is not wholly to be deplored. Criticism does not always impede progress and it often keeps progress from wandering from the highway.

Nashville Evening Tennessean (democratic)—"Formation in Washington of an organization under the name of 'The American Liberty League' may well be the first move of aggression of a powerful reactionary group. Its battlecry—to defend the constitution—is the hallmark of its intentions. It has been the rallying standard of the old line republicans. It was, in Atlanta last week, whipped up by the assembled klanes of the Ku Klux Klan."

Boston Post (independent-democratic)—Nobody can object to the intention of this body of patriotic citizens (American Liberty League) to "become a real factor in assisting toward recovery and the restoration of prosperous conditions for all our people." If it can do that in a non-

partisan way, we say more power to it.

Baltimore Sun—Looking at the matter on the broadest lines, thoughtful people will welcome such an organization as the League might well become. Unless there is a minority party in power tends to become arrogant. There has been no such opposition during the period of the New Deal. . . . If there is to be a new alignment of liberals versus conservatives in our politics—and it is easy to envisage—it may well happen that the president will continue to draw the forces of one to his standard, and invite the conservatives to turn to the Shouses, Davises and the Wardsworths for their leadership.

Washington Star—The time is ripe for such an organization. There is much radicalism in evidence and many believe that property rights are in danger and that the constitution is being weakened. It would seem to be a fair deduction that the League will be critical of some of its (New Deal) features. In any case, Mr. Shouse's vigor of organization and administration is likely to become at least a persistent factor of warning, of shrewd analysis and forthright criticism.

**Automobile Exports
Greater This Year**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Automobile exports were greater in the first six months of 1934 than for the entire year 1933 the commerce department reported today.

This year's exports through July totaled \$169,962,767 compared with \$163,063,383 for the entire year 1933, and \$82,185,000 in 1932.

The union of South Africa, Belgium, Sweden, Australia and Japan were the chief purchasers.

ADDITIONAL DOCK WORKERS CHARGED WITH MURDER NOW

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 24.—(AP)—Investigators today persistently questioned more suspects and planned to add more names to the unusually large list of 24 already charged with first degree murder of James Conner, 22, labor riot victim.

Funeral services for Conner were scheduled for this afternoon.

Investigators said most of the 24 charged with murder admitted presence in the International Longshoremen's association delegation which stormed the Columbia Longshore-

men's hall where the young longshoreman was killed.

The I. L. A. local continued its own investigation into the slaying with \$500 reward offered for the apprehension and conviction of the slayer. The longshoreman declared their investigation showed the shots at the riot were fired from inside the hall, and not from the outside.

One of the men charged with murder, Wally Knight, 27, was identified from fingerprints as Walter H. Knight, held in San Francisco in September, 1924, on a charge of assault with intent to kill, and booked here in 1929 on charges of carrying a concealed weapon. Disposition of the case was not listed.

Those charged yesterday with first degree murder were Cecil Taylor, 28; Art Shire, 33; Jack O'Connell, 31; Sol Halden, 45; Nicholas Brown, 40; John Carlson, 40; Otto Starberg, 35; Harold Courtway, 34; John Kirk, 31; Merritt Eddy, 32, and Paul Duda, 39.

INSTITUTE TO BE HELD OCT. 18, 19

October 18 and 19 are the dates set for the annual Lane county Teachers' Institute, according to announcement by L. C. Moffitt, county school superintendent, Friday. The place of holding the meetings has not yet been selected but this will be attended to later.

For a number of years past the institute has been held at the Wilson Junior high school but the attendance has been so large that the building has been pretty well crowded and the Eugene high school may be obtained.

Robert Wanske, assistant state superintendent of public instruction, will be the representative of the

state department of education at the institute. Superintendent Moffitt announced, but other speakers have not yet been selected. The committee named to prepare the program has not yet met but will do so soon after the fall term of school begins.

Every teacher in the county, both from the city schools and the rural schools, is expected to attend the institute. This will make a total attendance of 525.

Alcatraz Inmates Isolated 3 Months

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.—(AP)—A three months complete isolation period today was clamped down upon Alcatraz prison, where Al Capone and 99 other notorious federal prisoners have been installed on the nation's "Devil's Island" in San Francisco bay.

Warden James Johnson announced that for 90 days no outsider will set foot on the rocky island. The time will be used, he said, to get the prison functioning as it should.

Men Get 30 Days For Shoplifting

James E. Duffey and Harry E. Lewis, alleged shoplifters, arrested at Cottage Grove a few days ago, were found guilty at a trial before Justice of the Peace Johnston Friday and were sentenced to serve 30 days each. The charge was larceny in a building.

These men were arrested after the alleged theft of a pair of trousers in the Hreier store and the trousers were found in their possession by the arresting officer.
