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SLIGHT OPTIMISM SUSTAINS PRICES AGAINST SELLING

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The stock market backed and filled rather indifferently during most of today's brief session. Resistance was shown to scattered profit taking, however, and in the final hour there were some fairly substantial advances. The close was steady to firm. Transfers approximated 470,000 shares.

Commission house commentators continued to maintain a cautiously bullish attitude toward stocks, although most of them pointed out that setbacks must be expected even if the price trend should prove to be definitely upward. Today's closing prices:

BUTTER UNCHANGED
ON OPEN MARKET

PORTLAND, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Decreasing supplies of butter continued to be announced by the trade. This applies equally to home centralizer output and to out-state offerings in the trade. The centralizer output was again increasing over the shipped in volume although both showed a decrease during the week. Loss of out-state offerings was somewhat greater than curtailment of local churning.

Somewhat of a flurry is developing in the butterfat market and in many instances premiums were being freely offered and paid over what the code calls for. This suggested an increasing demand.

Now that there was no change in the price on butter for the day insofar as the open market was concerned.

Trading in the egg market was generally of steady character. Greater withdrawals of storage eggs were shown and practically none of these was openly sold. Strictly fresh eggs were firmer.

Demand for live chickens at the week-end appeared sufficient to take care of demand with light Leghorns and colored broilers less plentiful than last week.

Now that the market has been fairly cleaned of Pekin ducks, the trade is beginning to inquire for a few and offers of 10c for this supply were being made in some quarters.

There was a good demand for practically everything in the country kitchen of meat line with the possible exception of heavyweight calves, which remained a trifle slow. All prices were stationary.

Really strong tone was showing for tomatoes of quality and prices were firm to higher as a result of inability to meet demand.

The entire Pacific northwest was seeking Hermiston watermelons and the late advance of at least \$1 ton in the price was finding distributors unable to take care of the increasing call. Experts say they are the best melons to reach Portland.

EGGS TAKE BOOST ON PUBLIC MARKET

Eggs were boosted on the Producers' Public Market, Saturday, putting them in line with the general market. The new prices bring the specials to 20 cents, other grades at 27 and 25 cents.

Big displays of tomatoes and melons were featured on the market, Saturday. Tomatoes run around 75 and 85 cents a bushel, retail.

Several kinds of cantaloupes are displayed in addition to watermelons. Local eggplant is coming in on the market, quoted at two pounds for 15 cents.

New turnips are coming in in small quantities now, selling at 5 cents a bunch.

A few raspberries are quoted, selling at 10 cents a box, three for 25 cents.

A few baskets of late varieties of peaches were seen, Saturday.

Some endive was listed, also, at 10 cents a pound.

A good display of grapes was shown, selling at 20 cents a basket. Campbell's Early and Wordens are in, with the bulk of Wordens to start next week.

Good corn is scarce at the market. Prices are unchanged.

Good quantities of pickling cucumbers were seen, Saturday.

Red peppers are listed at 10 cents a pound.

Some excellent Gravensteins were seen Saturday. So far they are the main variety of apple in some Waxons.
