

POLITICS STIR AS CHAMBER ELECTION JOINS IN CAMPAIGN

dates have appeared as yet, but it is known there will be real battles for the council positions, especially should present councilmen choose to run again.

Viewing state politics during the past week, one might get the impression that anyone dissatisfied with the way things were affecting them intended putting independent candidates in the field with the view of obtaining what they wanted.

One Threat Dropped

Earlier in the week there was considerable talk of an independent movement on the part of advocates of old-age pension plans. It was even hinted that sponsors of the Townsend plan might seek an independent candidate for congress, one pledged to work for their plan. Observers contacting voters throughout the county returned to Eugene with the story that an appreciable number of persons planned to devote themselves to the election of a congressman pledged to the Townsend plan, feeling that regardless of what else he stood for, so long as he advocated their plan he would be safe.

However, with the receipt of letters from James W. Mott, republican, and R. R. Turner, democratic, assuring advocates of the plan they were in favor of old-age pensions, though they do not commit themselves definitely to the Townsend plan, this particular independent movement appeared to have been dropped.

Dry Seek Candidate

But the first congressional district may yet see an independent candidate for congress if plans of drys from this district are carried through. A meeting of drys from Marion, Polk, Lane and Linn counties was held in Salem Friday to discuss this plan, but as there were not enough present to name a candidate, action was postponed till Friday, August 31, at which time it is planned to name a candidate and adopt a platform.

F. C. Heffron, Eugene attorney, who, as a dry candidate, was unable to win a congressional job at the last election, was present at this meeting and may be the candidate named.

In the gubernatorial contest, the name of Governor Meier still hovers over the horizon of independent candidates, the governor not yet having made up his mind regarding the race. He declared Saturday he would make a definite statement within a week in regard to this race.

Zimmerman Active

Peter Zimmerman, leading independent candidate to date, has been active in organizing his forces throughout the state and the amount of money he appears to have to spend in causing republicans to look somewhat agast. Lane county has been organized with Kenneth Nielson, grow farmer, who has twice sought legislative election at the hands of republican voters and who apparently has disappeared of their support, heading the campaign organization in this county. A. G. Enright is secretary and next Wednesday Mrs. Grace M. Charlton of Tillamook, state chairman of the women organizations backing Zimmerman, will be in Eugene to organize women of this county.

Zimmerman's strength at present is believed to lie chiefly in the counties around Yamhill and Clackamas, political observers declare, in stating they do not believe his candidacy has much support in Portland and in eastern Oregon. But they admit he may make a strong fight in the Willamette valley.

C. C. Chapman, one of the keenest political analysts of the state, says this week that the recent killing of the dock hand in Portland, reflecting as it will on the relationship between labor and farmer organizations, has constituted a severe setback to Zimmerman, who was said to have stood in closely with radical elements of both forces. Other observers believe his stock has declined appreciably during the past few days.

In Lane county races, present indications point to the race for county commissioner to be a hot affair with Walter Holland, democrat, giving O. E. Crowe, republican incumbent, a stiff race. Republicans also believe the candidacy of C. F. Hyde, democrat for the state legislature, also will bear watching.

For state representative, 14th district, Lane county, George O. Adams, Eugene, Frank Hamblen, Eugene, and Dr. J. G. Radabaugh, Goshen.

Yolk of 1 egg
 1/2 cup chopped pecan nut meats
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 Mix all ingredients with fork until light. Mold in the desired shapes. Roll in bread crumbs. Dip in egg which has been mixed with a little cold water. Fry in deep hot fat until brown. Drain on unglazed paper and serve.—Ruth Nagel, Route 1, Eugene.

Potato and Almond Croquettes
 3 cups hot mashed or riced sweet potatoes
 1 tablespoon butter
 Salt and pepper to taste
 Yolks of 2 eggs
 1/4 pound shredded almonds
 Bread crumbs
 Mix potatoes, butter and egg yolks. Season with salt and pepper. Shape into cones. Dip into a mixture of 1 egg beaten with 2 tablespoons cold water. Roll in bread crumbs, dip again in egg and then roll in the shredded almonds. Place in frying basket and fry in deep fat to a delicate brown. (Fat should be hot enough to brown one inch cube of bread in 60 seconds.)—Mrs. M. Johnson, 501 West Broadway, Eugene.

Ham and Cheese Croquettes
 3-4 cup hot milk
 2 doz. rolled salted crackers
 1 cup flaked American cheese
 1/2 cup cooked ham, ground
 Salt and pepper
 2 eggs
 Pour hot milk, 1/4 cup finely rolled crackers, and beat until creamy. Combine 3-4 cup cracker crumbs with cheese, ham, seasoning and one beaten egg. Combine the two mixtures and shape into croquettes. Coat with remainder of crumbs, dip in beaten egg and again in crumbs. Fry in deep fat until brown. Serve with mustard flavored white sauce. Makes 12 croquettes.—Mrs. F. C. Swindall, 1075 Emerald street, Eugene.

 1/2 cup rice
 1 cup scalded milk
 1 egg yolk
 1/2 cup boiling water

If both speaker and leader were from below the Mason Dixon line. However, by their long service and prominence, the three contenders—Representative Joseph W. Byrns of Tennessee, Sam Rayburn of Texas, and William B. Bankhead of Alabama—have large blocks of supporters reaching into northern states. John Rankin of Mississippi ran third in the 1933 contest.

That the speakership will go to Byrns, Rayburn or Bankhead appears likely now to many observers. However, in the event of a deadlock, a compromise candidate might be selected at the party caucus before the new congress meets in January. Representative Lee of California already has been mentioned in that role.

At present there are indications that one of several prospective northern candidates, including John McCormack of Massachusetts, John J. O'Connor and James Mead, both of New York, might team up with a southerner for the leadership. Representative Cresser of Ohio also is considered a possibility.

In working out the trade for house control in 1933, the late Speaker Henry T. Rainey and Byrns created a position of assistant leader which is held by Thomas Cullen, chief of Tammany's delegation. Cresser, a contender, was made chairman of the specially created steering committee. Byrns appointed Greenwood of Indiana as whip, and Lea was made chairman of the democratic caucus.

Whatever leadership is selected for the new house, it will be a result either of trading or by presidential interference, direct or indirect, which would be unusual.

streets, the same for the west side. Wiley's report, however, shows the ship did not go over the butte and if it did, only to swing over it slightly. When it is remembered that the Macon is 785 feet long, a pretty good idea of altitude is obtained in looking at the composite picture shown in the upper portion of the picture above. This picture, taken by Chester L. Stevenson, local photographer, gives

you the position of the Macon as it went over the northwest part of the city. The west tip of Skinner butte is seen at the right while at the left is the Woodrow Wilson school building. The Macon was approximately over Third avenue west, around Blair, in the third view of the ship to the left.

The larger scene of the Macon in the lower portion of the picture was snapped by Herbert Wiltshire, local engraver. He was on the west slope of Skinner butte and the picture was taken as the ship was about opposite the butte and just swerving to make the turn westward.

"Anyway, we had a lot of fun guessing," commented one Eugenean who missed the mark a bit.

Mr. Stevenson reported that 800 orders of pictures taken of the Macon came in to his shop in one day, and out of that 800 only three parties had caught the Macon, most of the cameras being unable to distinguish between the blue and white. These three had only very small images of the ship on them.

preventing fires. Thousands of people were expected to enter the forest Sunday, many of them planning to camp, and it was for the purpose of checking up on camp fires that the patrolmen were sent out.

There are no closures of sections of the forest except a portion of the road that connects the north fork of the Willamette and the south fork of the McKenzie. Camp fire permits must first be obtained, it was announced.

The humidity in Eugene Saturday was somewhat higher than it had been the past few days and the danger of fire is lessened to some extent, but there still exist serious hazards and all precautions possible to prevent fires are being taken.

The atmosphere is quite smoky from fires in other parts of the state and lookouts on tops of peaks in the Willamette forest are unable to detect fires very far off.

uncribbled in southern Iowa and rationed to livestock.

Montana, Idaho Gain
 More of the three million distress cattle purchased by the government went to market, helping ranchers conserve feed. Experts said the movement amounted virtually to a gigantic culling program.

Latest estimates of Montana's winter wheat crop placed it above that of 1933. Idaho's grain crop also was forecast officially as several hundred thousand bushels greater.

The same was true of potatoes. Idaho's statistics placed the state's crop at 20,000,000 bushels. Encouraging potato reports came also from the east.

Washington's peach production increased 1,050,000 bushels over last season, and the western slope of Colorado prepared to harvest one of the largest crops in its history.

George L. Knight, Montana state horticulturist, said orchardists there expected higher prices for their production, which was almost normal.

Southern California's crop outlook indicated a larger orange crop for next season than last. Lemon trees bore abundantly, and Imperial Valley grapefruit was reported unharmed as yet by dry weather.

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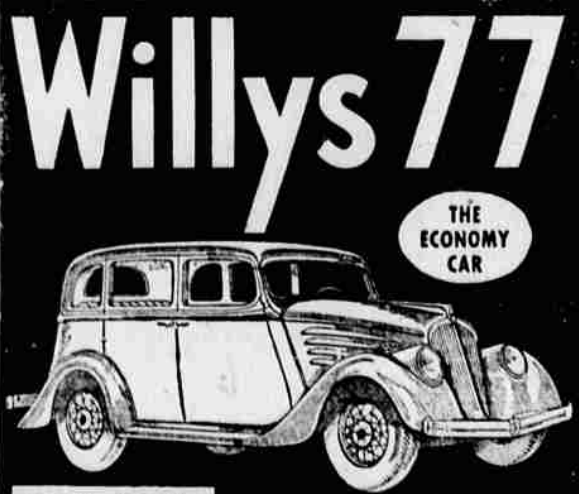
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
