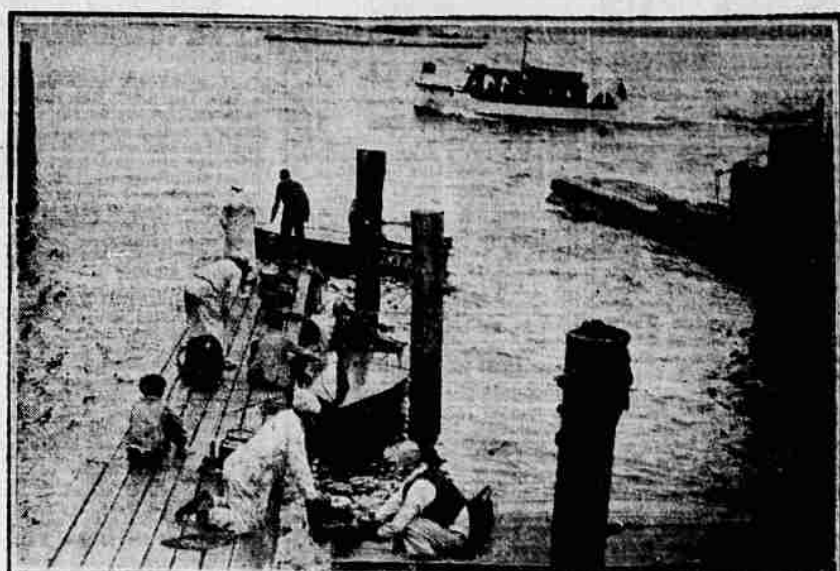


Townies Hand Colored Nine 8-5 Beating; Eugene To Meet Bend Today

HEAVY SCHEDULE FACED BY O. S. C. TEAM THIS SEASON

CORVALLIS, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Oregon State's football team will play four of its 11 games this fall before crowds paying a top price of \$2.20 for best reserve seats, the graduate managers' office informed alumni of the institution.

These top prices will be paid for the Stanford and Oregon games in Portland, the Washington State game at Pullman and the Washington game in Seattle. The two games in Los Angeles, Southern California, and U. C. L. A., have a top price schedule of \$1.65. Games with Willamette, Pacific, San Francisco university, Columbia and Montana, all to be played at Corvallis, will be at general admission prices only, ranging from 75 cents to \$1.10.

Oregon State's 1934 squad, which will swing into action in just three weeks with the opening of practice, will be called upon to excel in a way, the "iron men" performance of the 1933 team. Never before has a Beaver team faced such a heavy schedule as is now lined up for the coming season.

Every conference team with the exception of California and Idaho, will be met, in addition to games with the strong San Francisco and Columbia university teams, and a double-header opener with Willamette and Pacific one week after practice starts. The complete schedule:

Lott and Stoefer Win Doubles Title In Smashing Style

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 25.—(AP)—George Lott and Lester Stoefer, the crafty Chicagoan and smashing Californian who lead the world in combination net play, gained sweet revenge today on their leading rivals of the court as they retained their national doubles tennis crown in four blistering sets at the Germantown Cricket Club.

Smashing through to a 6-4, 9-7, 3-6, 6-4 triumph over Wilmer Allison, towering Texan, and speedy Johnny Van Ryn of Philadelphia, in an hour and 50 minutes of terrific struggle, the Lott-Stoefer duo, victors in Wimbledon play and three rounds of Davis Cup competition this season, turned the tables on their veteran rivals, to whom they played a week ago in the Newport invitation finals.

To the wily Lott, strategist of the combination, went the honor of turning the tide of victory in the direction of his coast team-mate and himself after the giant Californian's game cracked in the second and third set.

Had it not been for the Chicagoan's super coverage of the court, his splendid all-round play, and his directing genius at the helm of the team, another story might have been written.

For, although Stoefer's game was far better than the mediocre performance he turned in for yesterday's quarter-finals of national mixed doubles play, he was wild at times through the second and third set.

Outboard Motor Races To Feature Regatta At Astoria

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 25.—(AP)—The Pacific coast outboard championship races under the auspices of the American Power Boat Association and the National Outboard Association will be held in Oregon waters for the first time this year during the 1934 Astoria regatta, August 30, and 31, and September 1.

Last year 80 swift speedboats gathered at Seattle for the event, and an equal number are expected here this year. Over \$1,500 in prize money and about \$1,000 in expense money will be paid to the drivers including a number of nationally known figures in outboard racing.

The races will be held around a new course already laid out in Youngs Bay where the waters are quieter than the stretches of the Columbia river, site of outboard races at recent Astoria regattas.

There will be hydroplane races for classes A, B, C, and in both the professional and amateur divisions. There will also be the run-about races.

In addition the regatta race features will include a large number of sail boat events which are attracting entries from all along the coast as well as the usual fish boat and cannerly tender races and the tugboat tug-of-war.

Topping off the Pacific coast's biggest water show will be "Pir-ate's Den" fun, festival and other attractions.
