

OREGON GETS OVER SEVEN MILLION OF AAA OUTPOURINGS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—(U.P.)—More than \$1,000,000,000 is destined to go into the pockets of the nation's farmers through the AAA before the end of 1935.

Cotton, tobacco, wheat and corn-bog benefit payments will total \$779,402,000 officials estimated today. Of this sum \$282,882,510.21 had been paid out up to August 25.

Of the latter payments cotton farmers have received the lion's share, \$152,510,793. Wheat farmers shared \$67,781,061, corn-bog farmers \$46,815,988, and tobacco growers \$16,773,788.

In addition to the \$779,402,000—which is being paid out to farmers for controlling production—cattle raisers will net about \$120,000,000 and sheepmen approximately \$7,500,000 by selling drought-stricken animals to the government. This raises the total for farm adjustments close to \$1,000,000,000.

The figures do not include benefit payments under the sugar program which is still being drafted. These are expected to boost the outlay well above the billion dollar figure.

Chester C. Davis, farm administrator, said that about \$587,000,000 of the benefit payments would go to farmers in emergency and secondary drought areas. They have already received about \$150,000,000 of this.

Louis H. Bean, economic advisor of the AAA, added that the payments "assure that farmers as a whole will have a larger cash income in 1934 than in 1933." While production has been reduced, he said, prices are higher.

Farmers sharing in the \$779,402,000 before the end of 1935 included: Oregon, \$67,717,000; Washington, \$12,946,000; Idaho, \$8,472,000; Montana, \$13,101,000; California, \$6,064,000.

The AAA announced that farmers in 20 drought-stricken states had received up to August 25 a total of \$32,878,390 for cattle bought by the government for relief distribution.

Of the total \$20,575,872 was purchase payments and \$11,502,518 was benefit payments which are made free of any prior lien on the livestock.

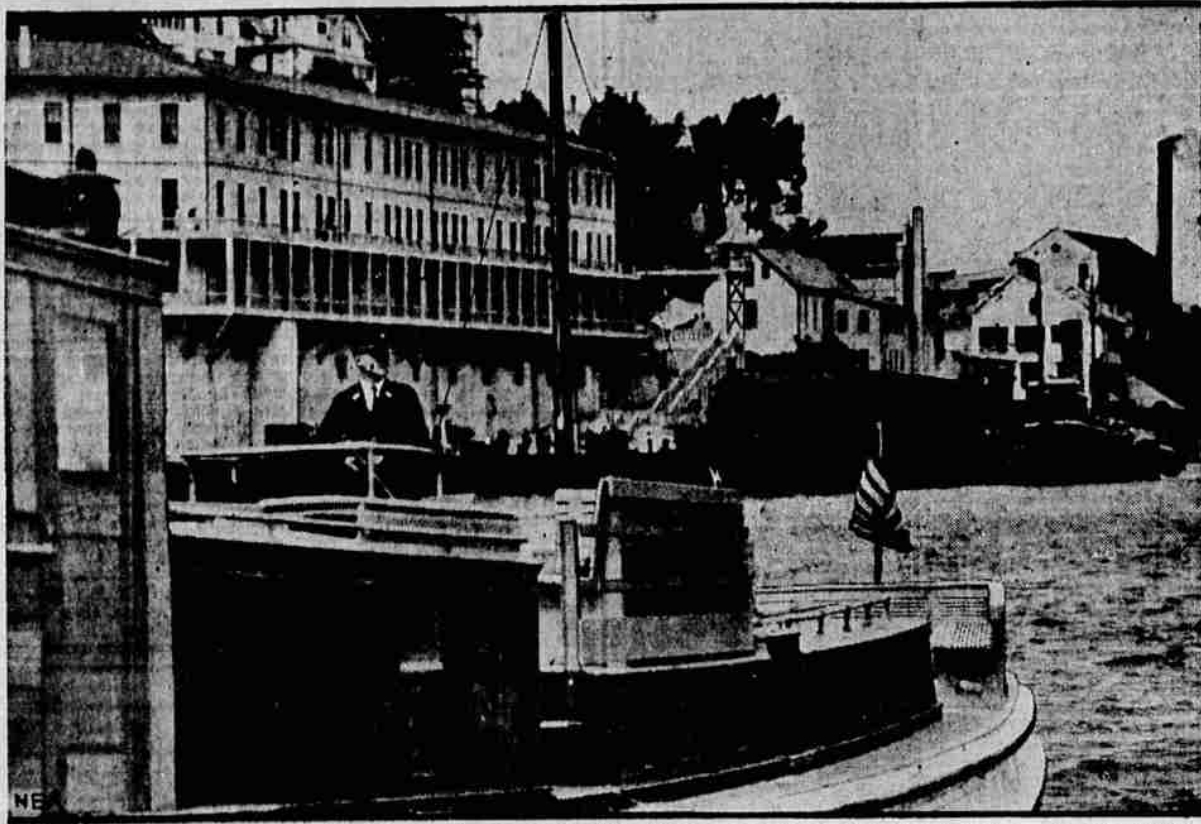
Purchases of cattle totaled 3,668,360 head of which approximately 2,309,000 head had been paid for up to August 25. The average price paid per head was about \$13.53.

Payments by states included: Oregon, purchase \$9,698, and benefit \$5,025; Idaho, \$41,041, and \$20,745; California, \$133,295 and \$69,537; Montana, \$1,384,780, and \$7,333,507.

Senator Hiram Johnson, republican independent supporter of President Roosevelt, is generally rated the winner of both democratic and republican nominations for senator in California.

The democratic race for the gubernatorial nomination, however, in which Upton Sinclair, former socialist, is a prominent candidate, has administration leaders worried. They fear that if he is nominated, the reaction among old-line democrats might bring defeat of the eleven democratic house members in November.

Senator Hubert Stephens, up for democratic re-nomination in Mississippi, has three opponents—former Governor Theodore G. Bilbo and Representative Ross Collins and State Senator Frank Harper. The nomination is equivalent to election. South Carolina does not elect a

What! No Bacon For Breakfast! Hog Prices Up

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—(U.P.)—Hog prices, which for three weeks have shown a sensational upward trend, opened the new week today with a further advance of 15 to 25 cents to a new top price of \$7.75 a hundred pounds, the highest since early in 1931.

Only 17,000 animals were received, compared with 21,000 a week ago and 49,000 a year ago. Observers said farmers showed a greater tendency to withhold supplies, and the resultant shortage was one of the principal factors in the price increase.

The rise was reflected in the increased price of fresh pork. Loin was quoted at \$22 to \$24 a hundred pounds wholesale; two weeks ago the price was \$12.50 to \$13.50.

Cattle also showed increases as demand for high grade steers and yearlings became more intense. Prices were 15 to 25 cents higher. The top was \$10.50 for 1500 pound steers.

Senator C. C. Dill Claims Senatorial Frank Use Is Okay

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 28.—(U.P.)—Senator C. C. Dill insisted again today he was within his rights in using his senatorial frank in obtaining information from radio stations for his speech to be delivered next month before the National Association of Broadcasters.

The senior senator from Washington also denied rumors and reports that he planned to start a radio press bureau after his speech, scheduled for Cincinnati, Sept. 17.

"Certainly I used my frank in sending letters to radio stations," Dill said.

"I thought it was public business, and I am still of that opinion. I may want to offer an amendment to the communications bill, and I may want to make a speech in the senate as well as before the National Association of Broadcasters."

"I am still chairman of the senate committee on communications and will be until January. Naturally, I am vitally interested. But I have no desire to start a radio news gathering service."

It has been rumored for some time that Dill planned to follow up his Cincinnati speech with efforts to sign several radio stations in organization of a radio-news service.

The senator, who will not be a candidate for re-election this fall, said he believed radio stations were entitled to more news from newspapers and press associations, and that they would gladly pay for it.

Also, prices are reported to have improved recently in Bradford, Eng. Estimated receipts of domestic wool at Boston, reported to the Boston Grain and Flour Exchange during the week ending Aug. 25, amounted to 282,000 pounds, compared with 3,054,300 pounds during the previous week.
