

GERMANY FACING INDUSTRIAL CRISIS EXPERT TELLS F-D

BYD PARK, N. Y., Aug. 28.—Germany is in a critical economic condition, President Roosevelt was informed today by Prof. Alfred Pearson, former American ambassador to Poland, who recently returned from Europe where he surveyed conditions and discussed them with Chancellor Adolf Hitler.

Pearson said in the study he made at the White House for more than an hour, while Mr. Roosevelt listened intently to his views, not only Germany but Russia, Sweden and Norway as well.

"Germany has reached the state of economic collapse," he said, "and it is impossible to do anything but to improve the situation but it is not likely to be done."

Pearson said he talked with the president generally of European political conditions as he found them. He pointed out the chief executive committee over the forthcoming Saar plebiscite, pointing out that that committee contains more political dynasties than all others combined.

Turning to Soviet Russia, Pearson, professor of economics at Drake University, Des Moines, Ia., said that the economic principles of that government were being sidetracked by the steady growth of the military in that country in the last few years to the fact that Russia is becoming more like ourselves, a democratic government," he told Mr. Roosevelt.

Pearson reserved his highest praise for Sweden, he said, "that has had a war for 100 years is the best off in all Europe. I was keenly interested in studying its long range economic planning that has been going on steadily for a quarter of a century. Sweden, you know had had its share of war before we thought of it in our own country."

Rice-Tomato Croquettes
1 cup rice,
1 cup stock,
1 cup tomatoes (or fresh ones),
1 slice onion,
1 slice carrot,
1 sprig of parsley,
1 slice thyme,
1 clove,
14 teaspoon pepper-corn,
1 teaspoon sugar.
1 egg.
14 cup grated cheese.
1 tablespoon butter.
12 teaspoon salt.
Dash of cayenne.

Boil rice and steam in stock until has absorbed stock, add tomatoes which have been cooked 20 minutes with onion, carrot, parsley, thyme, pepper-corn and sugar, then add butter, salt, cayenne. Spread in a shallow pan. When cool shape in round forms, dip in crumbs, egg, and bread crumbs and fry in deep fat. Serves 12. Mrs. F. C. Swindall, 1275 Emerald street, Eugene.

Tau Room Style Croquettes
1 cups finely minced cooked chicken or meat.
14 cup chopped walnut meats.
14 tsp. salt.
14 tsp. celery salt.
Dash white sauce (thick).
Dash cayenne.
Few grains nutmeg.
14 tsp. lemon juice.
12 tsp. onion juice.
1 egg.
Few breadcrumbs.
Cooking oil.

Combine meat, nuts, seasonings and mix well and chill the mixture. Shape into croquettes, using a round-bottomed spoon for each. Slightly beat the egg and dilute with 1-4 cup water. Roll croquettes in crumbs, then in egg and then in crumbs mixed with 2 tablespoons finely ground nut meats to a cup of crumbs. Fry in deep oil hot enough to brown in 10 minutes. Drain on paper. TUITION FEES FOR NON-HIGH PUPILS TO BE CUT HERE

Reduction in tuition fees for students residing in non-high school districts and attending the Eugene high school and a tighter check-up on students required to pay tuition fees will be in effect in the Eugene school system this year, it was announced following a special meeting of the school board held at city hall late Monday afternoon.

In the audit of the district, prepared by Spencer R. Collins, several cases were revealed in which students who should have paid tuition fees were not charged these fees. The audit recommended that each principal keep a closer check on students with the view of collecting all tuition fees due the district. This will be done next year, H. R. Good, city school superintendent, announced.

Tuition costs last year were \$83.18 per pupil, but this year the cost will be less than \$75 per pupil.

Contracts with teachers have not yet been signed and were not considered at the board meeting, Mr. Good said. The regular meeting will be held Monday, Sept. 10, and it is likely the matter will be discussed at that time. However, it is probable contracts will not be signed even then, this matter possibly being postponed till the making up of the school budget in December. Meanwhile, in the event contracts are not signed, teachers will be considered on the same salary basis as last year.

The board voted to hire Max McKinney as instructor in the language department at Roosevelt junior high school.

16 TEAMS ENTER SOFTBALL TOURNAMENT

SALEM, Aug. 28.—Eight of the 16 teams entered in the state softball tournament to be held here this week, will battle on Sweetland field at Willamette university here tonight, for a place in the second round play. The remaining eight will play Wednesday night.

The tournament will be held on a straight elimination basis, one defeat putting a team out of the running. Heightened interest in softball this year brought about the formation of a number of city leagues, and the organization of the Oregon State Softball association. As a result four times as many teams will be entered in the playoff this year as in the first championship tournament held last year.

Oregon City won the 1933 state title over a field of four entries, which included also Portland, Eugene and Salem.

McMinnville and Lebanon will open the tournament, starting play at 7:30, followed by Oregon City vs. Piedmont Merchants, Portland, at 8:30, Pad's, Salem A team, vs. Albany at 9:30 and Milwaukie vs. Corvallis at 10:30.

Wednesday night's schedule includes Woodworkers, Portland, vs. Toledo at 7:30; Eugene vs. Kay's, Salem B team, at 8:30; Enke Dry, Portland, vs. Astoria at 9:30; and Bosso & Price, Portland, vs. Hood River at 10:30.

EDITORIAL—

Last week I had a short NRA talk with Donald Husband, local enforcement officer. This is the information I gleaned:

Whether or not a dealer desires he must become an NRA member, and he must pay assessments to help enforce NRA codes.

A dealer cannot sell any article at less than 6 per cent profit plus his cash discounts, and no dealer can meet another's price unless he has filed with code authorities, his intention of so doing.

The smallest fraction of a cent must be charged to the customer as one cent when figuring six per cent margins.

A dealer who sells for cash and does not run a free delivery is prohibited from underselling the credit and delivery merchant where the latter offers goods on a six per cent mark-up.

And Mr. Husband also stated: "If you do not do these things ordered by the code an injunction will be obtained against you and your place of business closed."

I do not deny Mr. Husband's ability, and I do not deny that the code demands these things, but I do not believe any true liberty-loving American citizen is in sympathy with such tactics. Nor do I believe that the higher courts will sustain such unconstitutional edicts of the New Deal.

These are some of the things that brought about the formation of the new "Liberty League," and as the people become wiser on New Deal doings it is quite probable that a lot of junking will be done—at least, if we are still to hold America as "The Land of the Free."

I am not operating a grocery store, but I have retained my right of free speech.
