Man Arrested For Portland Officers

fat, flour and milk. Season with salt, pepper and cayenne. Add flaked cooked salmon and lemon juice. Cool mixture. Shape into croquettes (cones or cylinders). Roll and crumbs, egg, put crumbs again, and fry in deep hot fat (325 degrees) until brown. Any cooked fish may be used in this way, although most varieties will need additional seasoning, such as a dash of Worcestershire, a chili sauce, or chopped parsley or chopped pickle.
To serve: Arrange salmon croquettes (the cone shaped ones are most attractive) on a large platter around creamed peas. Around the salmon croquettes place crisp potato chips and around the edge of this thick slice cut from peeled tomatoes, and garnish outside edge with parsley or watercress. A fine dish for a stag dinner.—Mrs. W. R. Armstrong, 1392 W. 11th avenue, Eugene.

Chicken Croquettes
2 tablespoons butter.
2 tablespoons flour.
1 cup milk.
2 teaspoons salt.
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce.
1-8 teaspoon paprika.
1-8 teaspoon pepper.
1 tablespoon chopped parsley.
2 cups chopped chicken.
2 eggs.
Melt butter in saucepan; add flour and cold milk slowly, stirring until smooth and creamy; add seasoning and parsley. Boil 3 minutes. Add chicken, mix well, and pour out on platter to cool. When cool enough to handle take a large spoon of the mixture in floured hands; shape into balls, cones or oval cakes and put into cold place until firm. Roll in bread crumbs, then in eggs beaten with 2 tablespoons cold milk, then in bread crumbs. Fry in deep hot fat, and drain on brown paper.—Mrs. A. E. Daughtry, route 2, Eugene.

Chicken Croquettes
2 cups chopped cooked chicken.
3-4 cup thick white sauce.
1-2 teaspoon salt.
Dash of paprika.
1 egg yolk.
1-4 teaspoon celery salt.
1 teaspoon lemon juice.
Combine chicken, sauce and seasoning. Stir in egg yolk. Shape, roll in cracker crumbs. Fry in deep shortening.—Mrs. A. E. Daughtry, route 2, Eugene.

Fowl Croquettes
Boil 2 fowls weighing 6 pounds each, till very tender; remove skin, fat, and bones. Cut into small pieces, salt and pepper to taste. Shape oval in jelly glass or mold. Fry in lard like

doughnuts until brown.—Mrs. George D. Heitman, 338 Madison, Eugene.

Egg Croquettes
Make a very thick white sauce of 2 tbs. fat, 4 tbs. flour, 1 cup milk, 3-4 teaspoons salt and 1-8 teaspoon pepper. Add to it 4 hard cooked eggs, chopped fine, 1-4 teaspoon salt and 1 tablespoon chopped parsley. Chill. Shape into croquettes, roll each in fine bread crumbs, dip in well beaten egg diluted with 2 tablespoons cold water, and roll again in crumbs. Fry in deep hot fat until a delicate brown. Serve hot with cheese sauce or tomato sauce.—Mrs. C. L. Huffaker, Eugene.

Japanese Draw Naval Disarmament Plan For London Confab
TOKIO, Aug. 29.—(AP)—After a day long conference, the "big three" of Japan's government were understood to have reached an agreement today on Japan's naval policy, including a proposal for substantial disarmament.
Premier Katsuo Okada, Naval Minister Mineo Osumi, and Foreign Minister Koki Hirota participated in the conference.
The disarmament proposal, it was understood, would be offered in event United States and Great Britain proposals for naval limitation in the forthcoming conference proved unacceptable.
The conferees gathered closely the details of the program pending its presentation to the full cabinet and then to Emperor Hirohito for approval.
The Japanese program will be carried to London by Admiral Yamamoto, who is scheduled to reach the British capital Nov. 3. Under this arrangement there will be ample time for the Japanese to hear the American and British plans before offering their own.
The report that the program included a disarmament proposal appeared to bear out articles printed last week in the vehemence press. They said the government leaders were agreed on a plan limiting signatories of the naval treaty to 300,000 tons. This would cut Japan 250,000 tons. A spokesman at the time called the report "ridiculous."
Godfrey Brothers Home From Chicago
George H. Godfrey of the University of Oregon new bureau and his brother, Verne Godfrey, manager of the Colonial theater, returned Tuesday evening from a 10-day trip to Chicago. They went back by train, but returned in an automobile. They came back by way of Yellowstone park.
"The drought situation is every bit as serious as described in the news accounts," George Godfrey said. Asked if he had taken any pictures, he said there was nothing to take a picture of.
However, the people were found to be optimistic in that section, much encouragement being given through the federal relief program.

Prisoners Start Return to Work
PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 29.—(AP)—One hundred of the more than 1,100 convicts in Eastern penitentiary who have gone hungry almost 24 hours because they refused to work, went back to their duties in the prison today after conferences between prison officials and delegation of inmates.
Authorities said in the return of the men to the rag shop, remodeling kitchen and boiler room indications of a break-up of the "strike" of the convicts.

WIRTH MAKES BID FOR LANE'S VOTE IN GOVERNOR RACE

Establishment of a state auditor, abolishment of many of the present tax collecting agencies and combining that function with the state police offices, higher salaries for school teachers and old-age pensions are keynotes in the gubernatorial platform of H. E. Wirth, independent candidate for governor, who was in Eugene on Wednesday.
With G. I. Maxwell, Melford, one of his campaign aides, Mr. Wirth hopes to organize a Lane county Wirth for Governor club and will spend the next two or three days here consolidating his strength.
Candidate Wirth displayed the usual campaign assurance of his support, claiming a lead in eastern Oregon counties and other sections where farmer and labor votes predominate. He makes a special plea to the farmer vote, much of his platform having to do with beneficial planks for the farmer.
In touring the state, the Wirth workers declare they find people everywhere expressing a feeling of dissatisfaction with the gubernatorial material in the party field and as a result are turning to Wirth.
Martin is regarded as too old and is feared because of his militaristic mind, Wirth campaigners declare. Dunne they dismiss as simply part of the old political set-up while Peter Zimmerman they discount as being too radical. J. Silverman—well nobody knows anything about him so they don't count him at all.
Declaring the state's financial system antiquated and in need of progressive revitalization, Mr. Wirth proposes the establishment of a state auditor, to be appointed for a term of four years either by the governor or by the legislature. In function, the state auditor would be similar to the U. S. comptroller, he declares.
The taxation theories of Wirth are somewhat novel in that he advocates surrender of tax collections to the state police. He would eliminate much of the present tax collection system as a part of his proposal to abolish property taxes and substitute manufacturing and sales taxes, collected by state police, the later organization being broadened to handle this phase.
"We must stop borrowing money, we must buy money," is one of his platform slogans. "By buying money I mean we must pay for money with individual services. As long as we continue to borrow money, which must be repaid with interest, our financial system will continue unsound."
Wirth believes colleges ultimately should be on the same basis as elementary and high schools, with students getting "real free" education.

He insists, however, that curricula standards should be maintained on the present high level.
"I believe in a minimum salary for elementary teachers set at \$125 per month, paid on a 12-month basis," he says. "Teachers should have one month of vacation, with the other two months being devoted to preparation for their instructional work."
Touching on old-age pensions, Wirth declared he was not advocating the Townsend plan, but believed all persons should stop work at the age of 60, with heads of families receiving a pension of \$100 per month and single men receiving from \$50 to \$75 per month depending on circumstances. A revolving fund should be set up in the state for this purpose, the fund being perpetuated by contributions from beneficiaries, he says.
Wirth is concentrating on the farmer-labor element, insisting that only by placing purchasing power in these groups can Oregon progress. He advocates one party composed of "labor, farmers, pen-pushers and the man working in the ditch," with a standing arbitration board consisting of 25 representatives to handle strike and other labor problems.
"We must get away from politics and get down to statecraft," he states. "The financial bosses dictate the policies of either political party so it is up to the voters of this state to get behind a man with no political or financial strings attached to him."
Wirth is opposed to the Knox liquor law, favoring local option, but opposing the return of the saloon. He favors state aid in developing the natural resources of the state and declares that by bringing industry and people to Oregon, this state will be able to take care of its own problems.
