

SLASHES IN LIQUOR TAXES PLANNED TO OUST BOOTLEGGERS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Slashes in federal liquor taxes and import duties to eliminate the bootlegger will be proposed in the next congress by a group of representatives who led the repeal fight.

The fact that the treasury has not reaped the harvest of revenue expected from liquor sales and the continuance of large-scale bootleggers prompted the move.

Proposals to restore the old domestic rate of \$1.10 a gallon on 100 proof liquor, and to slice the 45 a gallon tariff by 50 per cent are being considered by experts attached to the house ways and means committee.

Secretary Morgenthau has indicated he is opposed to any reduction in the existing \$2 domestic tax. He is seeking to kill the illicit traffic by a large force of internal revenue agents.

The representatives plan to await developments in Morgenthau's campaign. If it is successful between now and Jan. 1, they may delay their drive for lower taxes. Should he fail, the leaders say they will push for a reduction.

The point to the recommendation of J. H. Chester, Jr., director of the alcohol control administration, who said the bootlegger could be eliminated by lowering imports.

RENOVIZING LOAN RULES CLARIFIED FOR HOME OWNERS

lender and borrower. This note requires the signature of the borrower, and (except in special cases) if the borrower is an individual and is married, also the signature of wife and husband. No other co-signers or endorers are required.

4. How much may I apply for? From \$100 to \$2000, depending on your income or ability to pay for improvements on any one property, and in connection with not more than five properties unless approved by the Federal Housing Administration at Washington.

5. How long may the loan run? For any number of months up to three years, although this time may be extended in exceptional cases by special permission of the FHA.

6. What security do I need? That you have an adequate regular income and a good credit record in your community.

7. What assurance need I give? (a) That you own the property. (b) That the income of the signers of the note is at least five times the annual payments on the note. (c) That your mortgage, if any, is in good standing and that there are no other past due encumbrances or liens against your property. (d) That you will use the proceeds solely for improvement of your property.

8. What if I have been unable to pay up on my mortgage, or on my taxes? Then apply to the Home Owners' Loan Corporation, another government institution designed to help home owners in distress.

9. What is the cost of this credit? The lending agency may not collect, as interest, discount or fee of any kind, a total charge of more than \$5 on each \$100 of the original face amount of the note. This actually averages about 5 1/4 per cent interest.

10. How do I pay the note. By making regular, equal, monthly payments until the note is paid in full. If you are a farmer, however, you may make seasonal payments, although not less than once a year.

11. May the owner of any kind of property apply? Applications will be considered for credit to improve one-family, two-family or other residences; apartment buildings; stores, office buildings, factories, warehouses and farm buildings.

12. Where do I make payments? Your regular installment payments may be made in person at the place of business of the lending agency; or by mail; or as otherwise arranged. Make no payment to any governmental office or organization.

13. May I pay the note in full before it matures? Yes, at any time. And if you do so a reasonable rebate will be allowed for repayment, if charges have been collected in advance.

14. May I make more than one payment at a time? Yes, as many as you wish, but such payments should be in exact multiples of the agreed payments—that is, if monthly payment is \$10, larger payments should be \$20, \$30, etc., not odd sums, such as \$18 or \$25.

15. What if I am late in making my payment? If you are more than 15 days late, this tardiness incurs an extra expense on the lending agency; therefore, the financial institution should be reimbursed in part at the rate of not more than five cents for each dollar due. If you keep on being delinquent in your payments, the financial agency will have to take legal steps to collect all that is due on your note, and that will cost you an additional sum including (1) earned interest at 6 per cent a year (2) "late charges"; (3) court costs, including fees paid for issuing, serving and filing summons; (4) attorney's fees not exceeding 15 per cent of the amount collected on the defaulted note; (5) handling fee of \$5 for each note, if judgment is secured, plus 5 per cent of the amount collected after return of unsatisfied property execution. And all this in addition to the principal due.

16. What if I want to pay, but can't? The FHA has provided a plan whereby you can extend your note so as to make smaller monthly payments, or you can get a new note on the unpaid balance, for as long as three years.

Lane county stamp collectors who wish to get first day cancellations on the new Crater Lake stamp are urged to send 10 cents in coin and a self-addressed 6 3/4 envelope to Edward E. Bryan, secretary of the Lewis and Clark Stamp Society of Oregon, general delivery, Crater Lake, Oregon.

The stamps will be issued on Sept. 5. Envelopes should be mailed to Mr. Bryan before Tuesday, Sept. 3, in order to be on hand for the first day cancellation. The Crater Lake stamp is the first special stamp to be issued in the history of Oregon.

seasoned meat, grated cheese or a vegetable in cream sauce. Press the potato around the filling. Beat the egg whites slightly, dilute, roll the croquettes in flour, then in the beaten egg and then in seasoned bread crumbs and fry in deep fat. Any left over meat or vegetable is good in this kind of a croquette.—Mrs. James A. Welch, 1307 Lincoln street, Eugene.

Spinach Croquettes
Chop fine about a pound of cooked spinach. Season with salt and pepper; add the yolk of one egg and enough fine white bread crumbs to make a stiff mixture. Form into cakes, dip in a thin fritter batter and fry. Serve with a garnish of scrambled eggs which have been lightly sprinkled with chopped parsley. This dish is often the piece de resistance of a simple luncheon.—Mrs. M. C. Hack, 558 Sixteenth avenue east, Eugene.

Oyster Croquettes
25 oysters
1 cup oyster liquor
1 cup cream
3/4 cup butter
1/2 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon salt
Few grains cayenne
1 tablespoon minced parsley
1 egg

Simmer the oysters in the liquor until the edges start to curl, then drain and chop very fine. Make a white sauce of the butter, flour, cream and oyster liquor. Add the seasonings and parsley and pour over the beaten egg mixed with the oysters. Chill until thick and just before using dip out by the tablespoonful, dip in crumbs and egg and fry in deep fat until well browned.—Mrs. C. L. Huffaker, 1819 Fairmount, Eugene.

Cheese and Rice Croquettes
1 pound soft cheese
2 cups cold boiled rice
2 tablespoons melted butter
1 egg

Add egg, butter and a dash of salt and pepper to rice and mix well. Form cheese into small balls. Cover these with the rice mixture on all sides so the cheese will be inside the rice covering. Form into balls. Dip in fine crumbs, beaten egg and again in crumbs. Fry in hot deep fat. Serve with cheese sauce.—Mrs. Grace Kerley, 1272 1/2 Patterson, Eugene.

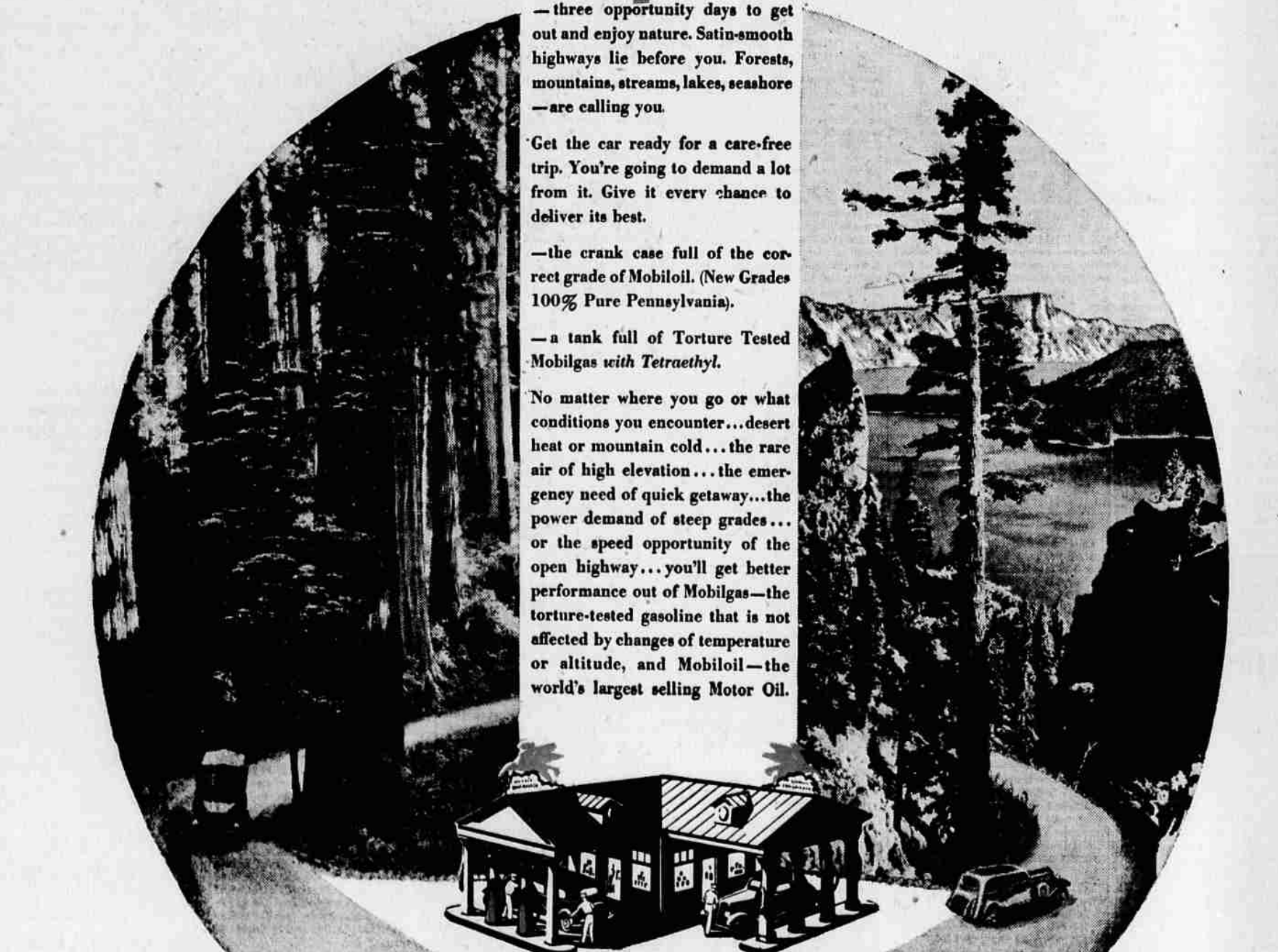
