Digging had to be abandoned as the water came in so rapidly. The hole is located only a few yards from his house, is but 12 feet deep and 5 feet in diameter. In order to test out the capacity the Creswell fire truck pump was called into action and within forty minutes 7,000 gallons of water were pumped out. Chief J. H. Clark reports it is a veritable underground river and will not only supply Mr. Hudspeth with an unlimited supply of water but could be used for fire protection as well in that community where several homes could be served in case of an emergency.
