

Oregon, Gonzaga To Meet Saturday Afternoon In Season's First Tilt

TWO ELEVENS MAY TAKE TO AIR FOR TOUCHDOWN PUNCH

An early season thriller, so unusual in football, is in store for Eugene football fans when Prink Callison's 1934 Webfoot eleven opens the season against the ever dangerous Gonzaga Bulldogs tomorrow afternoon on Hayward field. The contest will start at 2:30 o'clock.

Mike Pecarovich's Bulldogs, victims of the Webfoots for the past two years, are openly laying for Callison's outfit. Reports from Spokane indicate that the Bulldogs are planning to open up with a smooth-working aerial attack in an effort to score.

Ducks Weakened
Oregon, weakened by the loss of several star players, will put a makeshift eleven on the field. Bob Parke, co-captain and left halfback, will be the only veteran in the backfield while the line includes only two members of last year's team, Alex Eagle, tackle, and Butch Morse, star end.

Callison's choice of a starting lineup includes Con Fury, center; Roy Gagnon and Andy Horney, guards; Eagle and either Pat Fury or Del Bjork, tackles; Morse and Budd Jones, ends; Halph Terjeson, quarter; Parke and John Reichsmann, halfbacks and Frank Michak, fullback.

Reserves Missing
The usual procedure in opening games of running in reserves throughout the tilt will probably be missing tomorrow. In the first place, Oregon has very few capable reserves, and the strength of the Bulldogs will very likely make it necessary to keep a regular eleven on the field as long as possible.

Gonzaga's colorful offensive attack is built around Kenneth "Ike" Peterson, two year veteran halfback who shines both as a passer and an open-field runner. Peterson's backfield cohorts will all be veterans. The Bulldog line, riddled by graduation, will be composed mainly of sophomores.

Bishop is "Comer"
Bob Parke, Maury Van Vliet, Walter Beck and Ray Lopez, the latter two

men newcomers, will do the Webfoot passing. Ralph Terjeson and Johnny Reichsmann are expected to lead the way for Webfoot plays as the blocking backs.

A hard battle for the fullback post, apparently won by Frank Michak, may result in the use of Dick Bishop, former Eugene high star, in Mike Mikulak's old post. Bishop's line smashing tactics in practice has stamped him as a comer.

FENTON SUBDUED BY HEAVY CHAMP, LOSES TO SPAIN

Thirty-five hundred wrestling fans thronged McArthur court Thursday night for a treat rarely offered to mat addicts—a view of the heavyweight boxing champion of the world in the role of grappling referee. The sight packed a double wallop, for Maxie Adolph Baer, the titlist, proved the first referee capable of forcing Lightning Rod Fenton to get in and wrestle, paving the way for Don Pascual Castillo's first victory over the badman.

The main event bout topped a four-bout card, and the customers left satisfied with having obtained more than their money's worth. In addition to the champion, they had been introduced to Buddy Baer, called by Max the coming heavyweight champ, and had seen eight top-flight middles in action.

Maxie "Takes Over"
Maxie had the Lightning Rod under control from the start, and moved him out of his corners with monotonous regularity. When Fenton resisted, Baer administered a back-hand slip that sent the Canadian three quarters of the way across the ring. After Castillo had apparently weakened the bad man with a series of spongers, Fenton suddenly rose from the mat to batter down the Spaniard with a series of drop kicks for the first fall.

The second tumble went to Spain in four minutes as Dan Pascual rocketed Fenton with four off-the-ropes spongers, then pinned him. The fans sat up hopefully as the last canto got under way, obviously wishing for a tangle between Fenton and the champion.

It failed to materialize, however, and Castillo annexed the deciding fall in five minutes with a Boston crab, climaxing another flurry of spongers.

Jackson Injured
Baer made a short address over the radio, and was instantly swamped with autograph hunters. The champion signed as many as he could then broke for the dressing room.

In the preliminary bouts, Antonio LeBlanc scored one fall victory over Cowboy Heinz in the opener, winning in 16 minutes with a body slam. Bulldog Squaredel Jackson lost to Jimmy Black, newcomer, who more than lived up to expectations. The Grand Avenue Caveman, introduced from Skagway, Alaska, won the only fall of the match, forcing Black to put the mat in 13 with a dexterously placed kick to the face, followed by a hammerlock. He then did his best to eliminate Harry Elliott as referee, but the arbiter proved too much for him, and finally planted the Bulldog in the ring-sides. His back was injured in the fall, and he was unable to return to the ring, Black winning by forfeit.

In the only clean bout on the card, Mickey McGuire and Wayne Stumbaugh went to a 30 minute draw in a match featured by clean, scientific grappling. McGuire took the first fall in 14 minutes with an Indian deathlock, and the second was won by Stumbaugh in 10 with a backward body slam.

Weight and left are expected to lift the University of Idaho grid destinies out of the conference doom that this season, if one believes what Coach Leo Calland says.

Despite the loss of Wee Willis Smith, midget quarterback, now with the New York Giants, prospects are most encouraging.

For one thing, the line between the tackles averages 200 pounds. With Herschel Swan at center, Alfred Berg and Charles Wilson at guards, Bob McCue and Harold Klimb at tackles, and Norman Iverson and George Rich at ends, the Vandal forward wall is experienced and heavy.

Norby Big Loss
If Elbert Inman fills Smith's shoes (which is highly improbable), Calland must still worry about plugging the blocking half hole left by John Norby's graduation. It was Norby's blocking that paved the way for many of Smith's long runs, and his sterling defensive work that staved off many touchdowns.

Paul Herz, two year letterman under study, will probably get the starting call. Russ Honsowetz is an outstanding candidate for the other half, while 200-pound Theron Ward handles all his own way at fullback. The season opens for the Vandals with the Washington game at Seattle Sept. 29. The University of Oregon will be met at Moscow Oct. 20. On Nov. 29 Idaho will journey to Omaha to play Creighton.

Stansberry Gony
At Montana Coach Benny Oakes has a much less optimistic outlook, but expects a fine spirit of enthusiasm and co-operation to give the Grizzlies a fairly successful season.

Montana likewise lost a stellar ball-carrier, this one being Bob Stansberry, who showed his fleet heels to almost every foe. His place at halfback will be taken by Arthur Caven, a member of the 1931-32 teams. Leland Story will probably fill in at fullback, while the other posts will be filled by such promising ball carriers as Bill Hilleman, Cal Emery (a two year veteran), and Henry Blastic. Frank Vesel and Harold Duffy are better than fair prospects.

Guards, Tackles Needed
The line will be built around rugged George Sayatovich, center par excellence. Ends furnish no worries as Oakes can call upon Naseby Rhinestone, colored player; Herbert Brandenburg, Al Heller, and Louis Hartwell. The guards and tackles are wide open, and will probably be filled by newcomers.

Included in the Montana schedule are Oregon at Eugene, Nov. 3, and Oregon State at Corvallis, Nov. 17.

ST. LOUIS CARDS CUT GIANT'S LEAD

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—(AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals, back in action after three days of wet weather illness, lopped half a game off New York's National league lead and today are only three and a half games behind.

St. Louis beat the Braves twice yesterday. The Cards won the opener from Boston 4-1 behind Tex Carleton's three-hit pitching and downed the Braves, 1-0 in the nightcap.

Pitcher Carl Hubbell of the Giants won his own game against the Reds, 4-3, when he singled in the ninth against Vargez.

The Phillies scored their third victory over Chicago in four games, 9-7. Brooklyn completed a four game sweep over Pittsburgh with a 2-1 victory.

New York's Yankees reduced Detroit's American league lead to five and a half games by beating the Tigers, 11-7, this gave the Yanks an even break in their four-game series. Cleveland scored its third win in the five-game series with Washington, 6-1.

Philadelphia made it five straight over the White Sox, 6-5.

St. Louis broke even in the four game series with the Red Sox by winning the final contest, 4-3.

STRANGLER LEWIS DOWNED BY LONDOS

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Before a record-breaking crowd of 32,000 wrestling fans here last night, "The Strangler" Lewis went down to defeat before Jim Londos, generally recognized as a heavyweight title-holder. Lewis was slammed to the mat with a crotch hold, with Londos leaping on him like a cat to apply a punishing hammerlock and a three-quarter Nelson. The fall came after 40 minutes and 27 seconds of wrestling, during which Lewis was the aggressor and held a good lead on points.

Previous to the fall, Londos picked up the 240-pound former champion, raised him over his head and slammed him to the mat. Lewis attempted to squirm over on his stomach, but Londos quickly applied his hold and held fast while Lewis groaned in agony and his face turned ashen white under the punishment. Londos, with ever increasing force, finally applied the crusher that forced Lewis' shoulders to the mat.

In a 10-round boxing match which followed, King Levinsky, Chicago heavyweight outpointed Art Sykes, Elmira, N. Y.
