 standard gray of the Japanese schools. When a body was claimed, stoic and tearless parents would carry the form of their child away in their arms.
 Damage in the stricken territory will total approximately \$125,000,000. Damaged power wires stopped water pumps of the city and threatened a water famine. Military depots supplied food for 200,000 persons.
 Damage to many factories created a social problem as thousands of persons were thrown out of work. The home ministry announced the death total as 943, but this figure was considered low in view of the count of

other agencies, including Nippon Dempo.
 It was estimated that 6500 houses were flooded and 53,000 damaged. Two hundred schools were destroyed.
 All residents were photographed by Turkish officials during the last census in that country; they are to be fingerprinted at the next census.
 The "Step Pyramid" of Egypt is estimated to be 6000 years old, making it the oldest large structure in the world.
