

NOME TURNS FIRE INTO CHANCE FOR RE-PLANNING CITY

NOME, Alaska, Sept. 21.—(U.P.)—Replanning a new Nome business district, to arise in the ashes of the fire which swept this historic mining town Monday, was planned today by the city general committee, appointed by Governor John Troy.

The committee, with legal authority of the territory, met with property owners in drafting plans for a new city. Plans worked out with the road commission will be presented to the governor for approval.

Meanwhile men hired by the home relief committee, headed by Rev. Norman Mackey, cleared debris of the fire from the blackened streets.

Normal governmental functions were resumed today when district court convened in the abandoned pioneer mining company building. Official records in the safe of the destroyed courthouse were believed undamaged, but the vault had not cooled sufficiently to be opened.

The crew of the coast guard cutter Chelan, first vessel to reach Nome since the fire, policed the town and worked on temporary coast guard headquarters. Captain Zeulser of the Chelan placed his boat and crew at disposal of the general committee.

President's Gold Policy Plays Part In Trapping Rogue

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt's monetary policy supplied police and federal agents the weapon which broke open Lindbergh kidnaping mystery.

When Mr. Roosevelt nationalized the nation's gold stocks, he ordered that gold should no longer circulate as money. Both the metal and gold certificates were called into the treasury.

This was the reason a filling station operator became suspicious when Bernard Richard Hauptmann offered \$10 gold certificate in payment for gasoline. This suspicion started the police inquiry which identified the certificate as part of the ransom money.

Orders For Pine Showing Increase

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 21.—(U.P.)—New business totaling 42,864,000 feet was reported by the Western Pine association for the week ending Sept. 15. This was a 4 per cent advance over the total for the previous week, but one per cent below the 3-year weekly average for September.

Shipments for the week amounted to 46,131,000 feet, and production was 46,477,000 feet. For the corresponding week a year ago the mills reported orders of 45,970,000 feet, and production of 53,388,000 feet.
