

EUGENE'S LIQUOR STORE DOES NEAR \$40,000 BUSINESS

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 21.—(AP)—In the results of liquor commission sales and agencies are "unusually high" state department officials said today.



Reports received reveal that operations have been conducted in business fashion, it was declared.

Books of the Eugene store show total sales from its inception to August 22 totaled \$38,515.10. Resident permits issued during this period numbered 1,566 and non-resident permits, 308. Purchases amounted to \$43,514.71. There was a \$351 mark-down in stocks.

Albany store sales from April 19 to August 2 totaled \$9,035.35. There were 455 resident permits sold and 44 non-resident. Stock purchases aggregated \$12,850.00.

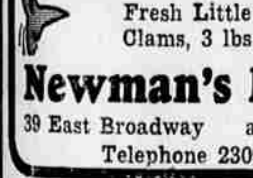
Sales of the Astoria store from its opening until August 9 amounted to \$30,080.90. Resident permits numbered 1,188 and non-resident 211. Resident permits cost \$1 annually, and non-resident ones 50 cents. Astoria purchases for the period covered totaled \$38,182.93 and mark-downs aggregated \$461.65.

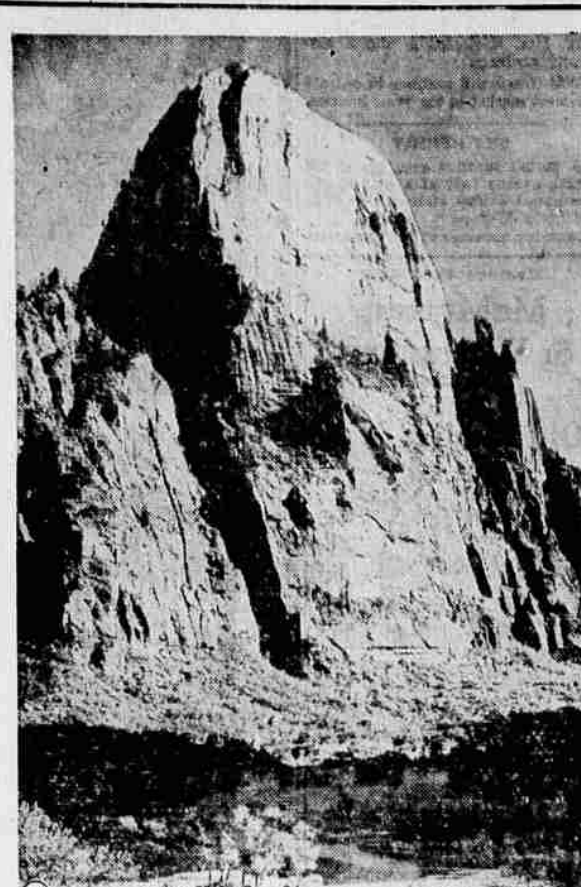

41 CAMPS

SINCLAIR "EPIC" SWALLOWED WHOLE BY STATE DEMOS

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Upton Sinclair's Epic plan by which unemployed would be placed on idle farm land and in defunct factories to produce their own necessities, was embodied virtually in full in the platform overwhelmingly adopted by the democratic state convention here last night. The vote was 113 to four.

Among those voting in favor of the platform to which only one minor amendment was added in the convention as a whole, were George Creel, chairman of the convention and a man who ran second to Sinclair for the democratic gubernatorial nomination, and United States Senator William Gibbs McAdoo.

Cheering broke out after virtually every paragraph as Sheridan Downey, democratic nominee for lieutenant governor and a member of the platform committee, read the platform.

It opened with a declaration of faith in President Roosevelt and the New Deal, carrying through with a denunciation of communism and all other
