

LATE COLLECTIONS TO GOVERN STATE OF CITY FINANCES

With total collections to Aug. 31, 1934, amounting to 70 per cent of the current city levy as compared with a total collection of 74 per cent for the year 1933, Eugene's municipal coffers appear to be in greatly improved condition according to figures compiled by Recorder H. S. Bryson. What final figures for the year will show is dependent on how last half of the year collections hold up under the new tax discount plan. While the outlook is thought to be hopeful, the newness of the plan does not permit any estimates as to how nearly the rush of early payments approximates the total collection for the year, Mr. Bryson said Friday.

Collections, to the end of August, amounted to \$175,533.14 against a total levy of \$249,172.06, leaving a balance of \$73,638.92 to be collected. The amount collected included \$119,126.42 of the current levy and \$56,406.72 in back taxes. The improvement also is shown in payment of back taxes, the last figures showing \$270,721.92 outstanding as compared with \$280,342.27 at the end of 1933.

The early tax payments has improved the city warrant situation to the point where warrants are being taken up in about two months time, Mr. Bryson said. General bond interest warrants outstanding Aug. 30 amounted to \$14,192.50. Cash on hand in the fund was \$1,686.33, making the deficit \$12,506.17. Warrants to be issued against this fund for the remainder of the year will amount to \$18,447.26, giving a total need of \$30,953.43. Collections for the fund totaled \$46,710.65 to the end of August, leaving \$23,118.72 uncollected out of the level \$69,833.37.

Paving intercession bills unpaid totaled \$21,963.42. Cash on hand to the amount of \$10,500 left a balance of \$11,463.42 needed in the fund while nearly \$9000 remained to be collected from the levy for the fund.

Of the general bond sinking fund levy of \$30,000, but \$8400 remained to be collected on Aug. 30. Cash on hand in the fund at that time was \$42,500 and investments amounted to nearly \$340,000, giving a total of \$382,450.

An additional investment of \$3000 in sinking fund bonds was announced Friday by Mr. Bryson in the purchase of 4 1/2 per cent Portland bridge bonds to mature Oct. 1, 1936. The bonds, costing \$101.95, will return the city 3 1/2 per cent.

General warrants outstanding total \$35,400 on Aug. 30 of this year. Cash on hand, \$1080, reduced the deficit to \$34,320. Estimated warrants to be issued for the balance of the year amount to \$40,000.

General fund receipts to Aug. 31 were reported by Recorder Bryson as totaling \$109,005.86.

Lumber Production Increases in Week

SEATTLE, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Production by 550 mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association during the week ending Sept. 15 was 94,650,837 board feet approximately 13,000,000 over the preceding week, officials announced today.

Average production of the mills during 1934 was 77,515,925 feet per week, compared to 76,240,068 for the same period of 1933.

New business reported last week was 89,975,689 feet. Shipments were under production 9.9 per cent, sales under production 9.1 per cent. Orders booked were 12,500,000 feet, or 17 per cent, over the preceding week.
