SHELTER CAMPS IN FOREST FINISHED

Four attractive shelters have just been completed on Skyline trail and adjoining trails in the high Cascades, according to C. C. Olsen, assistant supervisor of the Willamette national forest. He has just returned to his office after a trip of several days to that section.

One of the shelters is located on Mink lake, one on Cliff lake, one on James creek near to the South Sister and the fourth at the snowline camp near to the North Sister.

A new loop trail extending from the Skyline trail south of Horse lake from Cliff lake past Mink lake is being completed and good headway is being made on the Belknap Springs-Clear lake road. One can drive as far up as a point a quarter of a mile from the Middle falls, Mr. Olsen said.
