ROMANCE IN DAY'S WORK

THE word "romance" is a strange one. It usually conjures up visions of men who live lives of danger and action—soldiers, cowboys, explorers, sailors, and so on; too often we forget that the greatest romance of all is sometimes to be found in a life which, to all outward seeming, is prosaic and uneventful. One is reminded of this by news of the recent death of Dr. William Campbell Posey, noted Pennsylvania ophthalmologist.

Dr. Posey spent his life combating diseases of the eye; and a short time before his death he wrote a short article for "The Sight-Saving Review," telling of the romance he had found in the long fight to keep people from losing their eyesight. He told of the German physician, 150 years ago, who first suspected that infection in a child's eyes at birth could be the cause of blindness, and who vainly tried to persuade his colleagues of the truth of his theory. He had no success. Physicians kept on explaining to harassed parents that their children had lost their sight because of peculiar atmospheric conditions, cold drafts, unbalanced conditions in the alimentary canal, and the like—and newborn children kept on being stricken with blindness.

Then Dr. Posey went on to carry the story down through the years. He told how the old German doctor was vindicated, some 80 years later, when another German doctor showed the world how to save the sight of thousands of infants annually by dropping a 2 per cent solution of silver into the eyes of newborn babies. He told how other specialists devised equipment to make happier and easier the lives of people born with weak or defective eyes; how special methods of care and training were drawn up to fit those who did lose their sight for useful, normal existence; how hospitals and clinics were founded to prevent blindness; how means were found of preventing many injuries to the eyes; how a vast mass of knowledge of diseases of the eye was compiled, to make the task of saving eyesight progressively easier.

And in all of this Dr. Posey found an absorbingly romantic story—as the rest of us can do, also, if we get rid of our preconceived notions about what romance really is.

In the age-old struggle to make the hard lot of human beings a little brighter and happier there is romance enough to satisfy the most ardent. All we need is someone like Dr. Posey to make us see it.

THE WIKIPI ARTIFACTS

(The Bend Bulletin)

THE attention of scientists from all over the world would be called to this Central Oregon country if it could be demonstrated that beneath the volcanic ashes and the glacial gravels there had been found stone tools made and used by men who lived here before the glaciers flowed down from the heights and the volcanoes spewed out their pumice and ash.

The remarkable find of artifacts in a test pit at the Wikiipi dam site may lead to just such a demonstration if later searches in the vicinity turn up other artifacts under conditions that meet the requirements of scientific proof. It is unfortunate that the present find does not meet such requirements though no blame attaches to the finders that it does not. Science, to accept such a find, must know absolutely all the details. Nothing can be left to assumption or supposition.

It is in such finds, of course, that science has learned about ancient man. The fragment of skull found in Java was supposed to show a link between man and the ape. Its owner was given the formidable name of *Pithecanthropus erectus* but recently the ape connection has been doubted.

It was in digging gravel for road construction in England that the Pittdown skull was found and the skull of the Heidelberg man came from a clay pit in Germany. More recently the Peking man's skull was found in a cave in China. This discovery resulted from exploration. More often the find comes about, as in

the case of the Wikiipi find, because man is digging around in the ground on other business.

Further exploration at the Wikiipi site should not be difficult. It is to be hoped that it may be carried on soon and under proper scientific auspices so that there may be absolute certainty regarding any further find. Of course, there may be none and then we shall be left to surmise what the actual fact may be regarding these artifacts. Whatever the result we may be grateful that Messrs. Brown and Isackson caught these objects in their excavation and that their own experience and interest led them to realize they had something of unusual interest.

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Congressional candidates this fall are going to suffer from chronic curvature of the spine from holding their ears to the ground.

If you are secretary of a Society for the Building of Public Roads to the Doors of Men Who Have Invented Better Moustaches, you'll get an attentive ear for your plan from your congressional candidate.

The rush of responses to the American Federation of Labor's questionnaire on labor legislation is a good index of this receptive frame of mind.

Within a week of sending out letters to the 800-odd congressional candidates in the November election, more than 100 replies had been received, and they're flooding in at the rate of 25 or more a day.

This is a new departure in A. F. of L. tactics—getting pledges in advance to support specific things. Formerly the A. F. of L. scanned a candidate's past record, and supported or opposed him on that. Only once before, when they got advance pledges on the Norris anti-injunction bill, did they work in the present way.

Most of the replies thus far have been favorable right down the line of questions on old age pensions, unemployment insurance, work security, health protection, 30-hour week in codes, and public works appropriations.

The National Association of Manufacturers also is circulating a set of "open questions" to congressional candidates which, though more general than the specific A. F. of L. queries, plainly seeks to influence candidates against the "social security" program and other New Deal measures.

Devising any intention to pledge specific candidates to specific measures, the chamber questionnaire takes a back-handed slap at the A. F. of L. poll by referring to such tactics as "un-American and unwholesome domination by maneuvered minorities."

Watch for the report at the A. F. of L. convention on the controversy with Father Coughlin over his alleged employment of non-union printers and builders at his Royal Oak Shrine of the Little Flower.

The unions, many of whose members sent contributions to Coughlin, were very sore over the reversed radiator's unwillingness to go down this line with them on his labor policy.

REAL RICH IN THIS RICK
 One of the more effective of the rising number of pleas for the consumer was made here by Prof. Joseph M. Klamon, adviser to Missouri's Attorney General Roy McKeltrick.

Professor Klamon is also a member of the consumers' council out there, but pointed out acutely that he couldn't appear as such because NRA wasn't backing up the council with hard cash when it came to sending delegations to Washington to make their protests.

Though the protest was made to Deputy Administrator Frank Hecht of the coal code, over coal price-fixing in the St. Louis area, Klamon rapped the NRA as countering the spending of thousands by code authority to raise and fix prices, but allowing the consumers' council to decline to "wear widow dressing" and the status of a Missouri "without pride of ancestry or hope of progeny."

MORE PRESSURE FOR CONGRESS
 The capital will see quite an influx this winter of the type of legislator, once more common today, whose idea of a great contribution to national problems was to stink about wearing long hair, a heavy fur coat, a five-gallon black hat, unpressed trousers, and a political air.

One Percy J. Gansaway announced that he will wear cowboy chaps and spurs about the Capitol. The eminent Theodore Bilbo, with his promise to "raise more hell than Huey," is the fellow who believes he can tell whether a man is a republican or a democrat by the bumps on his head. The supposition being that right now the one with the most bumps is a republican.

Anyway, the point is, don't pay much attention to this sort of thing. Washington doesn't.

Those who have seen every conceivable sort of freak come to congress from the cold corners of the country know that such senseless small stunts on national legislation.

AN EDITORIAL ON HEALTH

ALTHOUGH society has grown quite a bit wiser in its attitude toward victims of venereal diseases, there still is some hesitation on the part of such victims to apply for immediate and authentic medical aid.

As a result, serious consequences may come from cases that could be cured if treated quickly.

In the case of locomotor ataxia, particularly, treatment to be beneficial must be immediate. If a person with this condition delays seeing a responsible physician for any length of time, the damage to the tissues of the nervous system is so great that not much can be done.

However, under any circumstances, active and intensive treatment may be helpful.

Although only from 2 to 5 per cent of people who have syphilis, the most serious venereal disorder, eventually develop locomotor ataxia, it is now well established that every case of locomotor ataxia develops from syphilis.

There is some evidence to indicate that a special form of spirochete—the organism which causes syphilis—is responsible for locomotor ataxia. It is believed to reside in the nervous system.

The condition usually develops from five to 20 years after the original syphilitic infection, but, of course, it may appear at almost any period after infection.

Majority of cases of locomotor ataxia occur in men over 40 years of age, although cases do occur in women and even in children.

Symptoms of locomotor ataxia by which the doctor makes his diagnosis are rather definite. In the first place the reflexes, like the knee jerk, begin to disappear.

Reason for disappearance of these reflexes is the fact that the disease attacks the path in the spinal cord along which stimulation for the action ordinarily travels. There are changes in the reactions of the eyes and also in stability of the body.

Severe pains which develop in locomotor ataxia are sharp, stabbing, shooting ones, occurring most commonly in legs and arms. These dart from place to place and last for one or two seconds. They are so characteristic that they are called lightning pains.
