ALIBI HELD SMASHED
WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The Washington Star said today that two secret witnesses had shattered the alibi offered by Bruno Richard Hauptmann to prove he was not the "John" of the Lindbergh kidnapping.

The Star said in a story by Rex Collier that one of the witnesses understood to be the so-called "mystery woman" with whom District Attorney Samuel Foley of the Bronx has held a number of private conferences. The other is her husband.

The paper added: Questioned as to his whereabouts on the night of the ransom payment, the stolid German carpenter, after some hesitation, said he had spent all that day and night at the home of a certain couple in New York City.

Danny Hauptmann there "Previously he had declared he was working in New York City as a carpenter on the day of the actual kidnapping, March 1, 1932, and that he spent that evening at his home in the Bronx. Mrs. Hauptmann corroborated these statements.

Investigators succeeded in locating the couple designated by Hauptmann and they flatly denied that Hauptmann had been at their home or in their company at any time of the day or night of April 2, 1932, when "Jafie" handed the box of ransom money over a cemetery hedge to a man resembling Hauptmann.

"On further interrogation, it is said, the man and woman gave authorities some important information regarding Hauptmann and his friends, the nature of which has not been disclosed. Officials have indicated, however, that this information has a vital bearing on the damaging case being conducted against Hauptmann by the prosecution."

BEND, Ore., Oct. 2.—(AP)—September set two all time weather records in Bend this year—the highest temperature and the most snow in the 20 years in which records are available. A mark of 97 degrees was reached on September 3, three degrees above the previous high recorded in 1922. Snowfall of one and a half inches was recorded on September 24, most of it melting as it fell. The next day an eight year record was broken when the mercury dropped to 23 degrees.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Fred Davidson, 34, died yesterday at Salem General hospital after receiving a broken neck when his speeding roadster crashed into a steel bridge on the peninsula road east of Salem early Sunday morning. Clarence Wolf, suffering from two skull fractures, one at the base, today continued in a critical condition as a result of the accident.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Increase of 236 per cent in debit checks for the three Salem banks was noted today in a chamber of commerce compilation. The total for September, 1934, was \$32,583,025, as compared to \$9,710,250 for the same month a year ago.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 2.—(AP)—The explosion of a bucket of boiling tar claimed its second victim late Monday when Richard Maycock, 77, died of burns sustained in the explosion. His sister, Mrs. Stella Wisniewski, was killed instantly.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 2.—(AP)—The state supreme court today affirmed the conviction of Jacob Silverman, an ex-chapman of manslaughter. Silverman was convicted in Columbia county for the slaying of James Walker on April 23, 1926, was sentenced to three years in the state penitentiary and fined \$4,000.

GENERAL

ABRIDGED, England, Oct. 2.—(AP)—A London-Paris passenger plane crashed in the rain over the English channel today, apparently after an explosion, and carried the seven persons aboard to their deaths. Aboard the plane were two Americans, Alfred Desanno of Philadelphia. The others were the British pilot and three French and two British passengers.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Ten boxes of a secret high explosive, known as "polmol," enough to lay the entire city of Bridgeport in ruins, was stolen today from the powder reservation of the Remington Arms company. The explosive, a pen green powder, the formula of which is known only to three munitions experts here, was taken during the early hours of the morning, it was said.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Delay of still another day in the supreme court's ruling on whether David A. Lamson, convicted wife slayer, should have another trial, was announced this morning by Chief Justice William H. Wages.

SEATTLE, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Although lacking badly, the motorship Allak, midway between Dutch Harbor, Alaska, and Puget Sound, was in no immediate danger, coast guard officials believed today. The new coast guard cutter Albatross, making her first run in the open sea, raced to the assistance of the Allak, about 1,000 miles from Seattle.

wages, retirement provisions, care of widows, etc.

Industry vs. Trade Unions
Some of the resolutions revived the old battle over the organization of the federation's executive council. The proposed measures express the view that the management will be made more representative of the workers if it is approximately doubled.

The demand for vertical organization rather than horizontal—that is, the banding together of workers by industries, rather than trade unions—made its expected appearance. A resolution sponsored by R. F. Lowry and Florence Hanson, delegates of the American Federation of Teachers, claimed vertical organization would give labor a more effective voice in the large scale, mass production industries. It would have the federation prepare for industrial unions by framing specific charters for such groups.

The company union issue was raised in a resolution by Delegate John P. Frey of the metal trades department. He asserted company unions sprang up after enactment of the national industrial recovery act "in open violation of Section 7-A of the act." He charged "an evident determination on the part of many employers to ignore and to violate section 7-A" and called upon the federation to father legislation "which will more definitely make it an illegal action for any employer, directly or indirectly, or through his agents, to in any manner interfere with the form of organization his employees may choose."

Insurance Plan Up
Other resolutions were designed to give negro workers industrial and organizational rights "independent of the accident of color."

A group of resolutions dealing with economic problems concerned with the national crisis standing against the unionization of free fighters. One resolution dealt with the Norfolk, Virginia, situation, and another with that in Atlantic City, New Jersey. Another asked for an 8-hour day for firemen.

One of the resolutions on unemployment insurance would put the federal government on record as "unfavorably opposed to any plan of unemployment insurance, state or federal, which is based on the principle of separate company reserves," and demands that only such plans be considered as call for one fund for the nation or state, "in which all employees in the state or nation should contribute" and to which they could look for compensation. The convention would be asked to "declare itself vigorously in favor of a system or compulsory unemployment insurance."

Local Firm Wins In Supreme Court

The Oregon supreme court at Salem Tuesday affirmed the decision of Judge G. F. Shipworth of the Lane county circuit court in the case of R. N. Miller and E. Rubenstein, doing business as the Yillawette Plumbing Supply company, against J. J. McCarthy and Noble Brewer.

This was a case wherein the plaintiffs sued to recover property and won the case in court here, the defendants appealing to the higher court.

TRADE RELATIONS BETWEEN CAL.-ORE. DISCUSSED TUESDAY

A "reciprocal trade relations" between Los Angeles and Oregon products was sketched for a group of business men at the Eugene Florence and Mapleton Tuesday noon at the Osburn hotel by James F. Bone, domestic trade commissioner of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce.

"Los Angeles spent money for Oregon products in 1933 to put \$18 into the hands of every person in this state," he declared. "The total sum expended was \$17,110,532."

"As Los Angeles grows industrially, it consumes more Oregon products," Mr. Bone stated. "Last year we increased our purchases of Oregon potatoes over 100 per cent. We also increased our purchases of Oregon apples, pears, cherries, plums, prunes, grapes, cattle, eggs, lumber. This is evidence of the growing trade between Pacific coast states and also demonstrates the fact that as Los Angeles manufacturers sell more goods in Oregon, they, in turn, create in Los Angeles a greater consuming market for the products of Oregon farms and forests."

"Over \$15,000,000 worth of Oregon wood and paper products came into Los Angeles last year, giving concrete evidence of the dependence of the southern city on the Pacific northwest for these products. Los Angeles consistently ranks second to New York in value of building permits which means that Oregon lumbermen have one of the nation's best lumber markets close at hand."

Mr. Bone pointed out, further, that he is making a survey to develop a greater reciprocal flow of trade between Los Angeles and this city on a basis of harmony.

"Many products not made in Oregon are now being purchased in the East and Los Angeles is making a bid for that business. As the leading industrial center of the west, it is our responsibility to sell our goods in the west and buy western farm products and raw materials in order that western money will continue to circulate here and further develop our area," he said.

Mr. Bone pointed out that Oregon merchants were being urged to buy at the Los Angeles market those goods not produced in Oregon and in turn, asked for more Oregon products to be shipped into Los Angeles.

The group discussed the possibility of shipping produce from western Lane county to Los Angeles, taking the material through the port of Siuslaw.

Captain Stitt to Retire After 37 Years in Service

Capt. Lyle Stitt, in charge of the U. S. Coast Guard station near Florence, will retire from active duty after 37 years service. It was announced Tuesday. Definite date of the retirement was uncertain; but it will be within a few days.

Capt. Stitt became prominent in the public notice here four years ago when he took a life boat and three men out to sea to effect a rescue from the Helix B. Stealing, which floundered at sea.

The life boat was caught in a terrible storm and was forced to remain "outside" for three days. Most of his small crew was seriously sick and the task of handling the small boat fell on the captain's shoulders. For virtually the entire time, he clung to the small wheel and kept his craft from plunging onto the rocks.

"Of course, I could beached her, but that's no way for a seaman to do," Capt. Stitt always said in describing his experience. "It was perfectly safe so long as the waves and the sea were calm. Most of the boys begged me to beach her, but I decided to hold on till the storm quit."

While these shores felt considerable apprehension for the lives of the men in the small boat, Capt. Stitt declared the exploit "safe enough."

The captain and his wife will move to California where they have a home and where the captain will spend his retirement.
