"In return, the truckmen agreed to submit differences to a board of arbitration to consist of a truckman, a truck owner, a union man and a disinterested person. They agreed not to suspend work during these negotiations and they specifically agreed not to engage in a sympathy strike."

McCracken declared truck companies were rated as common carriers and that when the Swift company requested them to deliver freight it was their duty to do so.

"The truckmen's strike has tied up every truck company in the state acting under state permit," McCracken said.

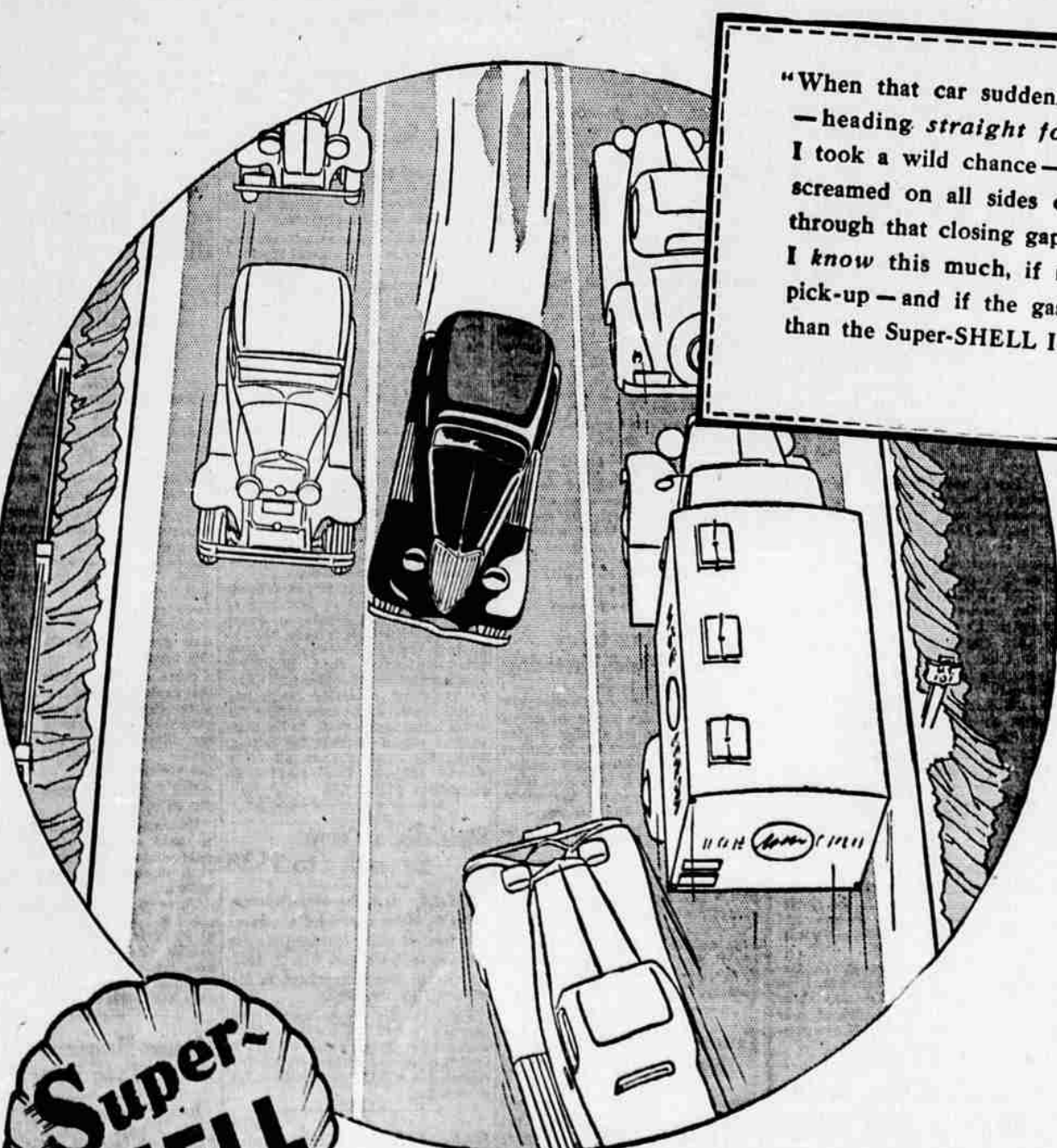
