

Egg Prices Up Saturday; Stock Market Sluggish

SWIFT'S, OREGON LAID EGGS RAISE LOCAL QUOTATIONS

Two concerns raised their egg prices Saturday morning in Eugene. Swift's jumped their buying prices one cent, as follows: 29 cents on extras, 26 cents on firsts, 24 cents on mediums, and 10 cents on crabs.

New wholesale prices announced by Oregon Laid Eggs were raised one cent on extra specials, 33 cents on fresh extras, both white and brown, 32 cents, two cents on standards, 27 cents, and two cents on crabs, 25 cents. Fresh mediums and pullets were not changed.

Local green broccolis was on the market for the first time Saturday, quoted at 5 cents a pound, buying price.

NOW AT ONE PRICE

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—(P)—The

spectacle of two grades of butter

being quoted at the same price is

at all unusual on the Portland Pro-

duce Exchange, but the price list

was caused more attention from both

retailers and consumers.

Both extras and standard cuts

have been listed at the same price

on the exchange, which being the of-

ficial quotation designated by the

state department of agriculture,

means that the producer of butterfat

receives less than he would if extras

were higher than standards, which

they are in practically every market.

Portland alone excepted.

Market for eggs showed a strong

tone with prices firm to higher. Most

sales of really fresh eggs were higher

for the week-end. Oregon Laid

Eggs and Poultry named an advance

in the buying price also.

Everything in the live chicken line

was showing a good call at the week-

end. Prices generally were being

well maintained for all offerings.

Call for turkeys, while seasonably

liberal all through the summer, but

early fall to date, was slowly gaining

locally with receipts moderate of

new crop while old crop continued

to hold its unusual demand.

There was a generally better tone

at the week-end for country killed

meats even though heavy calves con-

tinued more or less under pressure.

There was a cleanup of good lambs

and hogs were about steady.

Market for local tomatoes was

ruled weak with considerable car-

riage from day to day by wholesalers

have been unable to attract trade

since Californians arrived with their

threat of added competition since the

code was killed by officials.
