First Building Erected

There will be a general cast of Indian men and boys, Indian girls, pioneers and their wives, students and the church choir.

The church when first organized was more of a class. Then the church edifice was erected in the city of Eugene where today stands the McDonald theater, Tenth and Willamette streets.

Descendants of Solomon Zumwalt tell how he took his ox team and went out in the Lane county woods to get the timbers that went into the construction of the little white church.

On December 5, 1888, was dedicated the second Methodist Episcopal church building on the same site as the first building, Tenth and Willamette streets. Rev. H. K. Hines, then editor of the Pacific Advocate and later a pastor of the local church, preached the dedication service.

Wife Declares Faith
Foley previously has indicated he would adjourn the case to permit the prisoner's extradition to Jersey on more serious charges, but he declined today to discuss this possibility.

At Trenton, Attorney General W. J. Ferguson commented:

"I do not believe any trial in New Jersey could properly be held before Nov. 1."

Hauptmann was brought from his cell in the Bronx county jail to the courthouse during the morning for a visit with his wife. The prisoner's wrists were shackled.

Four guards were present for the 15-minute meeting, at the end of which Mrs. Hauptmann reaffirmed her belief that her husband is innocent.

"Not for a minute have I doubted he was innocent," she said. "I am more firmly convinced than ever. Please, I have found out a lot of things since they arrested him."

Fisch Absolved
"I the police tell the truth, everybody will feel like I do, that Bruno could not have done that horrible thing."

Mrs. Hauptmann was asked if she could remember what she and her husband were doing on the night of the kidnapping and on the night when Dr. John F. Condon turned over the \$50,000 ransom money in a Bronx cemetery.

"If I could only remember three years back, it would be such a help," she exclaimed.

The district attorney reported he was ready to absolve the late Isador Fisch from complicity in the extortion case. Hauptmann has asserted Fisch gave him the ransom money discovered in his garage.

Juevos con Chile

6 chile peppers
1/2 onion
1 cup water
1 cup uncooked rice
2 tablespoons butter
1 clove garlic
1 teaspoon salt
6 eggs

Boil peppers 20 minutes, drain, remove seeds and chop fine. Shred onion and garlic and fry in butter until transparent; add rice and water and cook slowly until tender, adding more water as needed. Add chopped pepper and eggs beaten lightly with the salt. Cook until eggs are scrambled and serve at once.—Mrs. Elma T. Havemann, 1300 Alder street, Eugene.

Mexican Chili con Carne

2 pounds beef, ground
1/2 pound onion, ground
2 cups chili beans
1 can tomatoes
6 cloves of garlic, ground
10 bay leaves
1 tablespoon carmenia seed
1 tablespoon oregano sage
10 chili peppers, ground
Put bay leaves, garlic, carmenia seed, and sage and peppers in small sack and tie. Fry onion and meat a rich brown. Put in kettle with sack of spices and boil for three or four hours. When beans are cooked tender, add beans and tomatoes to meat, season with salt and a little cayenne pepper and cook for about an hour. A large amount of this can be made at a time and canned.—Mrs. J. D. Fountain, Elmira.

Tamales

Paste:
1 pound lean beef
1 pound lean fresh pork
Cover with 3 or 4 quarts of cold water. Add 8 cloves of garlic, 2 good sized onions, and salt to taste. Cook until meat is very well done. Strain meat from broth and grind to a paste. Grind or cut up 1/2 pound of suet very fine. Heat in a large iron frying pan until suet turns yellow but do not brown. Add 1 onion and 3 cloves of garlic minced fine (when all particles of suet have become clear). Add meats and fry about five minutes. Add slowly 4 or 5 tablespoons of chili powder. If wanted hot, add 1/2 tablespoon of cayenne pepper. Add 1 large cup of broth and simmer while preparing dough.

Dough:
To remainder of broth add 1/2 pound suet, ground fine; 1 quart of strained tomato juice; 2 tablespoons of chili powder; salt to taste, and bring this to a boil. Add slowly to boiling broth 3 or 4 cups of yellow corn meal and cook same as corn meal mush. Cook at least 20 minutes. Line pan with dough; bottom and sides. Put meat mixture in center. Scatter ripe olives through meat mixture and cover with dough. Bake in a moderate oven for at least one hour.—Mrs. I. R. Huelshoff, 206 20th avenue west, Eugene.

Chili Beans

3 cups red Mexican beans, uncooked
1/2 pound bacon, chopped and fried light brown
1 onion, diced
1/2 pound ground beef
Salt, pepper, chili powder to taste

MAHONEY HOLDS POWER BALANCE FOR CANDIDATES

the fellow he thinks will do him the most good. So if you can tell the man he really is helping most, maybe you can get a line on the leading candidate, the next most appropriate phrase being "So What?"

There was considerable talk going around not so long ago to the effect Mahoney would support Zimmerman. Maybe he will. He might even favor Martin finally, but that doesn't seem likely. And just to get it on the record it is herewith declared that if Mahoney's talks, whatever they may sound like on the surface, actually react favorably on Dunne's campaign, there are those who will not consider it unintentional.

Mahoney may post a series of questions to the candidates, based on his program, and then support the one who gives the best answers, say some of his followers. Mahoney is sponsoring the organization of "Mahoney Clubs" throughout the state and his literature warns that if the next governor "fails to keep the faith" there will be sufficient voting power in these clubs to exercise a re-call. Even if Mahoney can't be governor, it seems he wants to have some say in the running of this state. Maybe he even wants to be utilities commissioner, or something.

On the night Mahoney takes to the air, Sam Brown, General, who was defeated in the republican primaries, also plans to make a radio speech. What he will say is not revealed. He campaigned as a progressive, but it is unknown whom he will support.

Political activity was noted in Eugene and Lane county during the past week as various groups, organized for the aid of one candidate or another, started official action. Republican women started a series of political teas and bridge parties at campaign headquarters Saturday, the meetings to be held each Saturday afternoon till election.

Campaigning for city offices was expected to start a little later and nothing was heard from city candidates during the week.

Cal Bryan, running for city recorder, announced his resignation as treasurer of the Lane county chapter of Oregon Republican clubs, and Robert M. Fischer, Jr., was appointed to fill the position.

Registration of voters at the county clerk's office closed Saturday night, the office remaining open till 9 p. m. A last minute rush to register was reported, but no check on the number of voters will be available for a day or two, County Clerk W. B. Dillard said.

At the May primary election there were 28,240 registered voters in Lane county, 17,107 republicans, 9,781 democrats, 663 independents and the remainder divided between socialists, prohibitionists, progressives, communists and the liberty party.
