... Victorian Porches Easily Remodeled

... the Victorian scheme of things... porch was considered a principal

element in the design of a home. It was embellished accordingly, and placed, as a matter of course, on the street side. The modern trend is toward more simplicity and privacy, and many an old home can be made young by alterations on its porch.

Every town has dozens of examples of the well-built house with the kind of a porch, however, that offers as much privacy as the proverbial canary in a cage. This is the type of porch which has no railing, and no intermediate supports between the columns. One imagines that if he should tip just a bit too far back in the porch rocker, he'd land in the middle of the street.

To transform this kind of porch, use simple posts instead of the usual ugly corner columns. Add a railing, so placed that screening may be easily accomplished. Equally important, for this type of porch, is the development of the surroundings. Further privacy may be obtained by producing the effect of greater distance from the sidewalk. This is accomplished by a heavy planting of shrubs and low trees, which should not, however, tend to blanket the porch and retard the circulation of air.

A small area of the terrace thus protected might even be fenced to form an intimate inclosed garden.

an exhaust fan. A heavy duty range outlet (if an electric stove is used). A clock hanger convenience outlet. A convenience outlet for a dishwasher, and four additional convenience outlets.

Use could be readily found in the modern basement for: A ceiling or wall light for stair illumination, with a three-way switch. A laundry center ceiling light with switch at the laundry entrance, two laundry side lights, and two outlets for the washing machine and ironing board. A recreation room center ceiling light with switch at entrance or wall, and a convenience outlet for a floor lamp, radio or other item. A workshop center ceiling light and side wall light controlled from the entrance or wall, and two convenience outlets for machinery. Separate circuit for the furnace (if electrical equipment is used), and a ceiling light at the furnace.

Harrisburg Farmer Has Black Poultry

HARRISBURG FARMER... 8.... HARRISBURG, Oct. 6.—(Special)—Andy Christenson has one of the blackest farms in Linn county, although it is in what is sometimes called the white land district, five miles east of Harrisburg. Cause is 1200 dark colored turkeys and 1000 Black Minorca chickens. The turkeys were taken at the age of six weeks, the chickens when quite young, from incubator stock, and nearly all have thrived well. The farm has produced turkeys before, though in smaller numbers, but this breed of chickens is new.

It is planned to have the turkeys ready in the larger number, for the Thanksgiving market. As they eat more than eight sacks of feed a day, valued at about \$16, the owner hopes they will be in prime condition by the latter part of November. The chickens will be culled for laying hens, and it is expected that there will be 300 busy at the job this winter.

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DUN, BRADSTREET SAY YEAR'S LOWS IN BUSINESS PAST

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—(AP)—"Subsident progress has been made since mid-August to prove that the love of the year definitely are in the past and that the turning point for business has been reached," Dun and Bradstreet, Inc., said today in a weekly business review.

"With the beginning of the final quarter, business is showing stronger indications of expansion, for even though the present trend is indefinite, more ground is being gained than lost," the review said. "The upturn at present lacks the seasonal accompaniments of last year, because of the absence of inflationary stimuli, but it is broader, better fortified, and fraught with greater reserves with which to profit by advantageous developments."

Retail trade in the large cities has shown a quickening beyond early provisions made by merchandising managers. In a number of instances retail organizations have found it necessary to replenish goods from wholesalers with whom they have been trading infrequently, the review said.

"The large wholesalers and mail-order houses are deriving benefits from the improved agricultural incomes, particularly in non-drought areas," the review said. "Retailers in these sections report sales gains of 20 to 50 per cent over last year's in many items and are ordering accordingly."

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
