

MAPLETON BRIDGE DEDICATION DRAWS BIG CROWD SUNDAY

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to be one of the best in the history of many such dinners served by coast citizens. As each person filed past the serving tables located under the western approach of the new bridge, a large slice of perfectly baked salmon, a cup of clam chowder that would have been a credit to Chief Oscar of the old Waldorf, potato salad, bread, butter and coffee were served.

Here's the Data

H. Beck was in charge of the dinner while Lester Monte, head cook at the Mapleton CCC camp in charge of that phase of the affair. Ladies of the Mapleton chamber of commerce assisted in the serving.

Here's a few statistics. There were 1020 slices of salmon and they were gone before quite all of the crowd had been served. Only 800 persons had been expected and the Mapleton group gave themselves, as they thought, allowance for plenty of extras, but actual number of persons who came surprised them somewhat.

To make those 1020 slices of salmon 70 ocean-going Silversides and Chinook salmon willingly sacrificed themselves in the nets of Mapleton chamber of commerce members. Likewise, as a tribute to the industriousness of the Mapleton citizens, 10 gallons of tasty clam chowder permitted themselves to be metamorphosed into chowder. Sixty gallons of coffee went along to make the salmon and clam feel at home and 30 pounds of butter and 200 loaves of bread just went along to make it complete.

And how much do you think the meal cost? Averaged to each person, each meal served cost 4.563 cents.

George H. Johnson, secretary of the Mapleton chamber of commerce, was in general charge of the event.

Fisk Dedicates Bridge

Paying tribute to early settlers and pointing to the new bridge as an index of the progress of development in the county during the past years, Judge Fred Fisk, Lane county judge, dedicated the new bridge at Mapleton today. In discussing the bridge itself, he said it had cost the county \$12,000 with CCC labor valued at \$40,000. In addition, the government, with CCC labor, had built roads on the east side of the river at a cost of \$35,000. The bridge is 850 feet long, 216 feet being under cover, with approaches 488 feet long. It is 80 feet over the low water mark and it all piling in the structure were laid and to end it would reach three miles, there being 16,500 linear feet.

Judge Fisk pointed out the bridge was at the west end of the proposed Route F and he predicted the construction of this road in the not distant future.

Captain R. S. Shertzer, commanding the Mapleton CCC camp, paid tribute to the members of the camp who did the work on the bridge and sketched the work of CCC camps in other parts of the nation.

No Trouble, Says Martin

General Martin reminded his hearers they dwell in a "forgotten valley," but assured them the president in the White House had remembered them and wanted to help them develop their natural resources. "You people here want a harbor," he said. "There is no reason why you cannot have a harbor if you go about it in the right way. I assure you there will be no trouble in getting federal funds to create a 14-foot channel from Mapleton to the sea and with that done, you should shortly see shipping a reality in the Port of Siuslaw."

General Martin took occasion to hit out at critics of the federal spending policy, asking his hearers how they expected the return of prosperity to this country unless money was spent.

In mentioning the work of the CCC movement, the democratic candidate declared that beyond doubt "congress will enact a law making the CCC a permanent institution before the present emergency law expires next March." He also stated he believed it would be thus with many of the laws recently passed, inferring that other phases of the new deal would be made permanent through congressional enactment at the next session.

Turner Makes Bow

R. R. Turner, democratic candidate for congress seconded General Martin's statement regarding the possibility of developing the Siuslaw harbor, declaring that the only reason the harbor had not been developed before was because "you have not worked along the right line." Pointing out that the present occupant of the White House was sympathetic to the west, he admonished his hearers to see to it that they were represented by people who could command the ear of the president.

"If you wanted something from Governor Meier, you wouldn't send Rufus Holman after it would you," he said, urging that democrats be placed in office to assure themselves a hearing with the president, since the next two years were going to be democratic years in Washington.

Walter Ransom, director of the Eugene chamber of commerce, represented that group at the dedication and spoke in favor of the proposed

Route F, declaring the Eugene organization was strongly behind the movement and would cooperate with Mapleton in getting it built.

E. A. McCormack, candidate for the Lane-Linn senator, discussed the two-party system of government, holding that under the two parties the United States had developed the best government in the world.

Benjamin H. Inman, editor of the Mapleton Bee "with a stinger a mile long," and candidate for post commissioner of the Siuslaw, urged the united support of the county on plans to develop the port.

Following the program, candidates for county offices were introduced by Roger Ball, master of ceremonies, who also introduced the other speakers.

The Eugene I. O. O. F. band, under the direction of Frank Spicer, played a concert before the lunch and then played several numbers interspersed through the program in the afternoon.

ENGINEERS SHOT

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, Oct. 8.—(AP)—This Basque city, where heavy fighting was in progress Saturday, was calm but thoroughly frightened today, with rebel snipers peppering occasional shots at soldiers on patrol.

Two locomotive engineers were taken from trains and shot to death by strikers outside the city yesterday. In consequence no local trains were running in the Basque country.

The streets of San Sebastian were deserted except for army patrols. All stores were closed.

TAXIS BRING FOOD

HENDAYE, France, Oct. 8.—(AP)—A food shortage at Orun, a Spanish border town, was being relieved today by relays of French taxicabs which took bread and meat over the frontier.

Two of the cabs were fired on and stoned by leftists last night, but there were no casualties.

John M. Smigley, 75, Dies Monday

John M. Smigley, a resident of Oregon for a half-century, died at his home at 1051 West Sixth avenue Monday morning. Mr. Smigley came from San Francisco to Portland by boat 50 years ago. He has lived in the Eugene vicinity for the past 22 years, operating a farm near Crow much of that time.

Mr. Smigley was born in Philadelphia on April 7, 1859, and came west to San Francisco with his parents. Mrs. Smigley died in 1909.

He leaves two sons, Fred Smigley of Crow Stage and Carl Smigley of Marshfield; three daughters, Mrs. Rose Gates of Springfield, Mrs. Kate Lee of Portland, and Mrs. Elma Levan of Eugene; seven grandchildren, and one great grandchild; one half-brother, Henry Lechner of Veneta.

Services will be held Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock at the Branstetter-Simon chapel. Interment will be in the Gates cemetery.

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APPEAL PLANNED ON CODE RULING

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 8.—(AP)—U. S. District Attorney William McClannahan today was preparing an appeal from the decision of Federal Judge Harry B. Anderson that price-fixing under the lumber code was illegal.

Judge Anderson in his decision Saturday held that "Any price-fixing is the antithesis of competition, fair or otherwise—and there is nothing in the national industrial act to show that such was the intention of congress."

The very term "fair competition," Judge Anderson ruled, "negatives any such construction."

Judge Anderson's decision was regarded as far-reaching in that it may affect other codes under the NRA.

The judge's decision enjoins federal officials from prosecuting lumber dealers for selling below the prices specified by the national lumber code.

Crow and Lorane To Vote On School Boundary Changes

A plan of Lorane and Crow high school districts to exchange certain territory will be voted upon by the people of the districts in the near future, it was announced after a meeting of the county board Monday.

Petitions from both districts to release the territory involved were acted upon favorably by the board and first the voters will act upon that proposition and if it carries they will vote upon the annexation of the land to the respective districts.

The petitions call for the release of about three sections from the Lorane district, to be added to the Crow district, and five sections to be transferred from the Crow district to the Lorane district. No date has yet been set by the board for the elections.

A petition to transfer a small tract of land from Scharen district, No. 9, to Spencer Creek, No. 104, and one to transfer a tract from No. 22, Spencer Creek to 125, LeBlau, were denied.

A delegation from district No. 77, Golden, appeared before the board to ask that certain parts of lapped district 110 be added to their district and the board took the matter under consideration.

Housewives' Forum

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ed). Butter a baking dish, put in a lining of cornmeal mush and turn in the seasoned meat. Cover with remaining mush, dot with bits of butter and bake one-half hour in a moderate oven—Mrs. A. L. Alderman, 484 East 14th, Eugene.

Tamale

Start with 5-quart kettle for this recipe makes 40 tamales. 50 cent shank soup bone, 50 cent shoulder veal or pork (as preferred). Add 6 medium onions, 1 medium button garlic, 5 medium sized carrots. Outside stalks and good leaves of 1 bunch celery, 12 or 15 small dried red peppers. Put all through grinder and boil with meat for 3 hours or until meat slips from bones. Take out all meat and bones. Take out 1 quart of broth and set aside. Season the broth with salt and add 12 cups of corn meal (yellow preferred). The kettle should be full for the 40 tamales. Simmer for at least 2 hours to cook cornmeal. When meat is cold cut into small bits with sharp knife. Add 2 tablespoons flour and 2 teaspoons rounding full of chili powder to the 1 quart of broth saved. Season with salt and use more chili powder if you like. Add this gravy to the meat. Tame butter wrappers or corn husks to roll them in. I use butter wrappers. One can buy them at a print shop. Take one spoonful of corn meal mush, then one of meat with gravy and another of mush. Stick in ripe olives 2 or 3. If you like, roll and tie each end. To reheat steam for one hour. Will keep for several days when cool. If using chicken, omit the carrots. An 8-pound chicken makes 24 large tamales—Mrs. Elbert Bede, Cottage Grove.

Estilo Seco

Boil a pint of pink beans until tender. Put in a frying pan a heaping tablespoon of lard and butter mixed. Drain the beans and put into the hot fat, add a sliced onion, button of garlic, salt and a red chili pepper. Stir and brown slightly. Ten minutes before taking from the frying pan add 7 tablespoons grated cheese. Serve with this slices of hot buttered toast—Mrs. M. Johnson, 591 West Broadway, Eugene.

Tamale Scapple

Simmer a 4-pound hen with a clove of garlic, a teaspoon of salt, and a bay leaf on the stove until tender. Then strain off a pint of the liquid. Add a tablespoon of olive oil, salt to taste, bring to a boil and add 1 cup of yellow corn meal. While this is cooking chop the chicken meat and mix with it 1-3 cup of ripe olives, chopped, 1/4 cup raisins and a cup of chili sauce. Line a casserole with the corn meal mush, fill the center with the tamale mixture, cover and bake for about 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Mrs. T. F. Pendergast 551 West Eighth avenue, Eugene.
