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Wendling CCC Camp Enrolls New Men

WENDLING, Oct. 8.—(Special)—With the end of the third enlistment period and the beginning of the fourth the Wendling CCC camp is making ready for re-enrollment of old men and enrollment of new.

The allotted strength of the company is 200 men—161 juniors and 39 woodsmen or local experienced men. A junior enrollee is one between the age of eighteen and twenty-five who cannot qualify as a specialist in any line of work. A woodsman, on the other hand, has no age limitation but must qualify as a specialist in one or more fields such as carpenter, cook, timber faller, saw filer, etc. The company strength at present is 172 men, 135 juniors and 37 woodsmen. Ten juniors and one woodsman will be discharged the tenth of this month to take up work in civilian life and in the next few days about forty new men will be enrolled. Most of them will be juniors from Multnomah, Clackamas, and Washington counties. The others will be local experienced men.
