

CONFIDENT GAELS LOSE BREATH TO NEVADA'S WOLVES

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Suffering that morning-after feeling—aftermath of a farewell party to which the guests brought bricks—the Gaels of St. Mary's gathered the shreds of their dignity about them today as they sped toward New York and their intersectional football battle with Fordham next week.

And the cause of it all was a fighting little band of University of Nevada Wolves, who didn't seem to realize, they were 10 to 1 underdogs and rose up yesterday to whip the Gaels 9 to 7 and turn a scheduled "breather" game into the most astonishing upset for western football has seen in years.

Taking to the air in the first period, the Wolves rang up a touchdown against a Gael second string which Coach Slip Madigan had started, hoping to save his regulars for the intersectional contest.

The Wolves couldn't stop the charge of the Gael first stringers in the second period and yielded a touchdown but they did stick doggedly, a point behind their opponents, until the final quarter. Then a penalty and a pass gave them the ball on the Gael 20 yard mark, and Big Tom Cashill, Wolf center, droppedkick a perfect field goal for the winning points.

STATERS WIN OVER COLUMBIA, 39-12

BELL FIELD, Corvallis, Ore., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Oregon State college ran wild over Columbia university of Portland, when the teams met in a non-conference game here Friday afternoon. The final score was 39 to 12 in favor of Oregon State.

The Heavers got off to an overwhelming three-touchdown lead before the end of the first quarter, and thereafter it was pretty much a question of just how large the score would be.

Taking the ball immediately after the kickoff, the Staters carried it straight down the field for the first touchdown. Then, while Columbia still was trying to get their defense organized, Swanson, Orange right-half, took the kick-off and dashed 77 yards for a second touchdown. The quarter ended shortly after Jimmy Duerli, left-half substitute for the disabled Norman Franklin, broke through the center of the Columbia line and rammed down the field 66 yards for the third touchdown of the period. The Beavers made good only one of their three tries for conversion.

Both of Columbia's touchdowns came as the direct result of passes in the third quarter.

Oregon State made 246 yards net from scrimmage and 15 first downs to four for Columbia.

Eugene High Wins At Klamath, 19-6

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Eugene high school's football aggregation passed its way to a brilliant 19 to 6 victory over the Klamath Falls high team on Modoc field here Friday afternoon.

find mysterious Mrs. Voudrouh, named as having carried to Aix en Provence the pistol which killed King Alexander and Louis Barthou, and giving it to Petrus Kelemen, the assassin.

Well dressed, 24, described as a Czechoslovakian, the woman was said to have carried to Aix, where she, Kelemen and an aide stayed the night before the assassinations, two deadly automatic pistol-machine guns, of a new type, holding 20 bullets each, and the ammunition for them.

Six hours before Alexander and the French foreign minister were shot at Marseilles, police said, Marie handed the pistols to Kelemen.

She disappeared, and Kelemen's aide went to Fontainebleau, near Paris, to join two others who were detailed to kill Alexander here if Kelemen failed, police said.

A man known as "The Delegate" entered the case today as the fifth man in the Marseilles plot—possibly the man who gave the final word for the killings.
