A group of interesting miscellaneous dishes for out second day at the school—easy to make and good to eat. A thrifty homemaker, when possible, saves fuel. One of the most practical methods of saving fuel is to plan oven dinners.

Complete Oven Dinner

Leg of Pork
Brown Gravy
Buttered Onions
Green String Beans au Gratin
Franconia Potatoes Biscuits
Apple Tapioca
Coffee

Buttered Onions
2 lbs. small white onions.
1 tablespoon butter.
2 tablespoons hot water.
1 teaspoon salt.
Place all in baking dish and bake with oven meal.

Franconia Potatoes

Eight medium sized potatoes placed around meat. Peel potatoes. Wash thoroughly, salt, paprika and chopped parsley.

String Beans au Gratin

Method: Drain water from beans. Place layer of beans in baking dish. Sprinkle with flour and dots of butter. Add another layer of beans, flour and butter. Put grated cheese on top. Cover with milk. Season to taste. A suggestion of onion flavor is very desirable if liked. Bake with oven meal.

Oven Biscuits

2 cups Fisher's Blend flour.
2 tea. Rumford baking powder.
2 tablespoons sugar.
Grated orange rind.
1 teaspoon salt.
2 tablespoons Crisco.
3-4 cup milk.

Method: Measure flour after sifting. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar together three times. Cut in shortening until mixture looks mealy. Add milk. When blended, turn on slightly floured canvas and put or roll out one inch thick. Cut into biscuits. In each biscuit press a sugar lump which has been soaked with orange juice. Time 12 to 15 minutes.

Apple Tapioca

1-2 cup Minute Tapioca.
3-4 cup sugar.
1-8 teaspoon nutmeg.
2 tablespoons butter.
1-2 teaspoon salt.
Method: Wash Tapioca in cold water and drain. Add 2 1/2 cups hot water and boil five minutes, then add four apples quartered.
Put in baking dish and bake with oven dinner. Pudding alone will require about 1 1/2 hours to bake at 375 degrees F.

Imperial Cheese Sticks

Cut stale bread into lengths five inches long and 1/2 inch wide and thick. Brush over with melted butter and dip in grated cheese. Fry in deep fat until golden brown at 375 degrees F. Serve with salads. (Bread test—40 seconds).

Luncheon Salad

2 pkgs. Lemon-Jell-Well.
2 cups boiling water.
1 teaspoon salt.
2 cups Calavo pulp (sieved).
4 tablespoons lemon juice.
1 cup mayonnaise.
1 cup whipped cream.
Method: Dissolve gelatin in boiling water, stirring until dissolved. Add salt. When cool, add lemon juice. When ready to congeal, whip cream and combine with mayonnaise and Calavo pulp. Fold into first mixture. Turn into wet mold and place in refrigerator until set. Unmold and serve on crisp lettuce. No other mayonnaise is necessary.

Ideal White Cake

1/2 cup Crisco.
1 cup sugar.
2 cups Fisher's Blend flour.
3 teas. Rumford baking powder.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
2-3 cup milk.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
3 egg whites.
Method: Blend shortening and sugar, add alternately sifted dry ingredients and liquid (milk) to which flavoring is added. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into greased floured tin and bake 20 to 25 minutes in a 350 degree F. oven. Makes 2 layers or 2 dozen cup cakes.

Fritters

1 cup chopped cold meat.
1 tablespoon chopped onion.
1 tablespoon chopped parsley.
1-8 teaspoon pepper.
1-2 teaspoon salt.
1 cup Fisher's Blend flour.
1 egg, beaten.
3 teas. Rumford baking powder.
1-2 cup milk.
Beat eggs, add milk, flour, and baking powder sifted together. Beat smooth and add remaining ingredients. Use 90-second bread test for hot fat. Fry in deep fat until brown. Drain, serve with cream sauce.

Coffee Parfait

10 marshmallows.
1 cup coffee.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1 cup whipping cream.
Method: Heat coffee in top of a double boiler. Cut marshmallows in pieces and dissolve in coffee. Cool. Whip cream and fold into marshmallow mixture. Place in tray and freeze about 2 1/2 to 3 hours.

WIFE, FATHER CHARGED

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 17.—(AP)—Federal warrants charging violation of the Lindbergh kidnapping law were issued today against T. H. Robinson, Jr., his wife, Frances, and his father, T. H. Robinson, Sr., accused of the \$50,000 abduction of Mrs. Alice Speed Stoll.

The three warrants were issued by U. S. Commissioner Eugene Dallery at the request of District Attorney Thomas Sparks.

Sparks announced he would ask the death penalty for Robinson, Jr., Robinson, Jr., former inmate of a Tennessee insane asylum, is in flight from federal agents, presumably with \$40,450 of the ransom money.

Push Hunt Vigorously

Mrs. Robinson, seized last night when Mrs. Stoll was rescued by government operatives at Scottsburg, Ind., is in custody here.

The elder Robinson, a contractor of Nashville, Tenn., is held by federal agents there. He was named in the original ransom note as intermediary for payment of the ransom.

Mrs. Robinson will be arraigned late today before the United States commissioner and her bond fixed, probably at \$50,000.

A certified copy of the warrant against the elder Robinson was sent to Nashville for removal proceedings and his return to Louisville.

As one branch of the federal government moved to bring the accused kidnappers of the 28-year-old society woman to speedy justice another branch spread over the middle-west in a determined search for Robinson.

Search Four States

An "important development" was anticipated within a few hours although Harold Nathan, investigator for the department of justice, refused to say whether the trap for the kidnappers was about to be sprung.

Mrs. Robinson, young mother, can be charged with violation of the Lindbergh law because she handled the relay of the ransom money and aided her husband in the imprisonment of Mrs. Stoll in an Indianapolis apartment house, the government said.

As the search for Robinson, reported to be fleeing in a stolen Ford V-8 automobile with Illinois license plates, spread over four states the government agents announced that none of the \$40,450 in ransom had been recovered, although the serial numbers were known.

Mrs. Stoll was returned to her home by federal agents who intercepted a car in which she was being

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returned, at Scottsburg, Ind. In the car with Mrs. Stoll was Mrs. Frances Robinson, wife of the suspected kidnapper, and the Rev. and Mrs. Arnold Clegg of Indianapolis, who had acted as mediators in cooperation with the department of justice.

Garlic Mayonnaise Dressing

1 egg.
1 pint olive oil or substitute.
2 tablespoons lemon juice.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon mustard.
1/2 teaspoon paprika.
4 cloves garlic (chopped fine).
Break egg into dry, cold bowl and beat until smooth. Add oil to egg very slowly (a few drops at a time), as dressing begins to thicken, the oil may be added more rapidly, a tablespoon at a time may be stirred in. When dressing is thick and creamy add seasoning, continue beating until seasoning is thoroughly mixed with dressing. Keep mayonnaise in cool dark place.—Mrs. J. E.
