

# U.-O. Freshman Gridders Beaten By Southern Oregon Normal, 7 to 0

## POOR BLOCKING IS COSTLY TO DUCKS IN FIRST BATTLE

A big, heavy University of Oregon freshman football team lost to an equally big Southern Oregon Normal outfit Saturday on Hayward field, 7 to 0, in an evenly fought battle whose principal features were the line-smashing of the visitors and the inadequacy of the fresh blockers.

With several fine backs, all capable ball-carriers, Irv Schulz's Ducks might well have won the tilt had the interference been up to par. As it was, the SONS' big tackles, Howell and Svecic, continually brushed aside the Oregon blockers to mow down the ball carrier after short gains or no gains at all.

**Defense Fair**

The visitors, on the other hand, offered their backfield men excellent interference all the way, and but for the dogged defensive stand of the freshman line, considerably outweighed, the score might have been greater.

Where the Oregon varsity has shown a superiority this year in team-work with little emphasis on individual performance, the fresh team was characterized in Saturday's battle by outstanding work on the part of a few. Lasselle at left halfback played a fine game. Fast a good passer, brilliant kicker and heavy runner, he may prove of considerable help to Prink Callison next year. Browning and Homanini also looked good in the backfield, and John Hill at the quarterback post, with a little brushing up on blocking will be a valuable man.

**Carlson, Amato Look Good**

In the line Moore at center, Amato at guard, Shimomura at tackle and Fred Carlson, sub guard, turned in fine performances. Kenyon Skinner, big tackle, put up a valiant fight, but the giant Howell was a little too much for him. Carlson, who didn't get in until the last quarter, when Amato was nearly out on his feet, was impressive, and is apt to rate a starting post for the next game.

The fresh kicked off to start the game, and shortly after the tilt began Eagles, SONS fullback, kicked to Lasselle who returned it 35 yards to the Normal 38. Line plays failed to gain and Lasselle kicked over the goal. A few more kicks were exchanged, and then the visitors blocked a quick kick by Lasselle on their own 41. On a series of straight smashes, Brown by a bullet pass from the hands of Chief Cliff McLean, Indian star and quarterback, they marched to the Oregon 22, where McLean's second pass was intercepted.

**Penalty Disasters**

Oregon was penalized 15 yards for holding, and McLean took Lasselle's kick on the 50 and raced back to the Oregon 24, dodging 7 or 8 tacklers. McLean then lost two, but Braddock, who was the ground-gainer of the day, sheared off nine yards over guard. McLean made it a first down on the Oregon 14, and on the next play Braddock went over left tackle, straddling a hole so big the Oregon hand could have marched through for a touchdown. On a fake kick, Braddock knifed over guard for the extra point.

From that point on the game becomes strictly a kicking duel, with Lasselle, the Dick, pitting long punts against Braddock's towering kicks. Neither team ever entered dangerous territory again, though several long gains were reeled off.

**McLean Brighter**

The Oregon defensive forces tightened, and though unable to gain consistently, the Ducks at least stopped the SONS when they neared scoring territory. Possibly the outstanding performer of the game was Chief Cliff McLean, the former Benson Tech Indian star. McLean was far and away the trickiest broken field runner, while his passes were accurate in the main. Braddock carried most of the burden for the visitors, and they uncovered little but power plays. The Oregon ends, too, showed a lack of experience, and frequently were completely blocked out of the plays, both on the attack and defensively.

**COLEFAX, Wash., Oct. 20.**—(AP)—Four members of the Pendleton high school football team en route to the University of Idaho and University of Oregon football game at Moscow, were injured in an automobile collision here today.

The injured: Roscoe Gemmel, injuries to the spine and neck; James Carney, fractured pelvis, cuts and bruises; Joe Pulliam and Harry Calaterbos, both badly bruised and shocked.

## ELLIOTT CHOSEN TO MEET REYNOLDS IN THURSDAY MAT GO

Harry Elliott, the wrestling-referee, one of the most brilliant technicians and perfect stylists in the grappling game, has been selected by Promoter Herb Owen to meet Jack Reynolds, welter-weight champion of the world, in his appearance here Thursday night at the armory.

Elliott, who has twice wrestled Gino Kallio for the world's middle title, is in first class condition, and was chosen by Owen as the logical opponent for the champion, largely because of his versatility and speed.

**Self-Out Expected**

The bout will headline the local promoter's regular weekly show, and a strong supporting line-up is promised. Reynolds, who appeared here two years ago, will be making his first bow to Oregon fans since that time, and enthusiasts are urged to reserve tickets early in the week, as a sell-out is expected.

Mat fans who were told of Elliott's selection Saturday night greeted the choice with unanimous applause. The wrestling-referee has come to be recognized nationally as one of the outstanding middleweights in the world, and against Reynolds, with a slight weight advantage, he will have a better than even chance.

Gus Kallio, after meeting Elliott in Portland last year, said he believed the local grappler one of the two best men he had ever wrestled, naming Waino Ketonen as the other. Since Elliott defeated Ketonen here, being the only man on the Pacific coast ever to beat the Finn, fans can judge for themselves how he stands.

**Holds Featured**

With Reynolds featuring his famed rocking cradle leg split and Elliott capable of finishing an opponent with several brilliant holds, the bout should be far and away the outstanding match staged here since the champion defeated Wildcat Pett two years ago. The only other battle which can approach it in point of importance is the Jensen-Kallio tangle last fall.

However, Thursday night's battle should be much superior to that. Kallio spent most of the evening keeping away from Thor,

**PITT STADIUM, Pittsburgh, Oct. 20.**—(AP)—A slumbering golden giant Minnesota's mighty offense—awoke with a start late today and in fifteen brief, thrill-soaked minutes crushed Pittsburgh 13 to 7, knocked the Panthers out of the national title hunt for the second straight year, and trundled off toward new triumphs with 64,880 staring and gasping in the wake.

Like the ten thousand Swedes who jumped out of the woods at the battle of Copenhagen, the burly Norsemen rose as if from ambush in that final quarter, and in two tremendous blasts, scored two touchdowns, turned a rout into victory, and paraded off unbeaten in the title race, as dangerous as eleven as roams the countryside.

## FRISCO DONS HOLD STANFORD TO LAST MINUTE 3-0 SCORE

**KEZAR STADIUM, SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Oct. 20.**—(AP)—Its power halted for three-quarters by a fighting University of San Francisco football team, Stanford grabbed a 3-0 victory out of the fire today by a place kick in the game's closing minutes.

With Bobby Grayson and Bones Hamilton doing the work, the ball was advanced to near midfield where Frank Alustiza, Stanford's ace punter, broke away around left end and dashed to the Dons' 15-yard line.

**Kick is Perfect**

Hamilton plunged through to the Dons' eight-yard line and with one down left Moscrip dropped back to score a perfect field goal. His previous try from the 25-yard line in the second quarter fell short.

A desperate University of San Francisco team took to the air after Stanford kicked off following the field goal, but it could not get far as the Indians tightened. A fumble on their own 20-yard line cost San Francisco the ball and the game ended before Stanford could knock at scoring territory again.

Other matches on the card will include a 10 minute exhibition by Max Lake's two boys, Jimmy and Jerry; a 10 minute tangle between Cecil Fragg and Pete Gwyther, and a boxing battle royal featuring 5 glove-slingers.

## HAIL, BEAVERS! OSC TIES MIGHTY TROY IN L. A. GRID MEET

**MEMORIAL COLISEUM, ANGELES, Oct. 20.**—(AP)—Oregon State came from behind in the last minute of play today to tie the Southern California at six to six before a crowd of approximately 40,000 astonished spectators.

Southern California scored the first seven minutes of the game and for 53 minutes protected its slim lead against an alert and fighting team from the northwest. The Trojans seemed about to eke out a victory, and take a short step forward on the come-back trail, when the game exploded in their faces.

**Sub Ends Score**

Fighting desperately to stem Oregon State fired a long punt deep in Southern California territory. A Trojan back dashed over and knocked the ball down before it fell into the arms of Mike Campbell, Beaver end coming back and he sprinted across the line unmolested.

Oregon State did not have a punch to drive over touchdown from scoring position but its defense was alert after the game was on in earnest and its offense. The Beavers used quick kicks and lateral passes. Both failed at times, two quick kicks were blocked and some losses resulted from laterals but they kept trying and put on a great show.

**Propat Goes Over**

The first score came early in the first period. David Davis, an Oregon punt back to his best, fired a 58-yard line and Cliff Probst went into action with a ball. With the big back carrying the ball most of the time the Trojans advanced to Oregon State's yard line and then Davis fired a short forward pass to Cal Camp, the back being chased out of bounds on the five yard line. Propat then ran around right for the extra point with a kick from placement failed, the ball sailing under the crossbar.

After several Oregon drives had been halted, Hal Hager for Oregon State recovered Wotkyn's fumble on Southern California's 40-yard line before the end of the game.

**Conversion Falls**

Daneri threw a long pass intended for Campbell, Kuhn in and batted it down but it fell straight to Campbell who drove it down, running 25 yards to the end zone. Pangle's try for the extra point was a failure, the ball going wide as the crowd sat in awe and lost or only tied in the minute.
