The next business session of the lodge will be November 1, at which time nomination of new officers will be held.

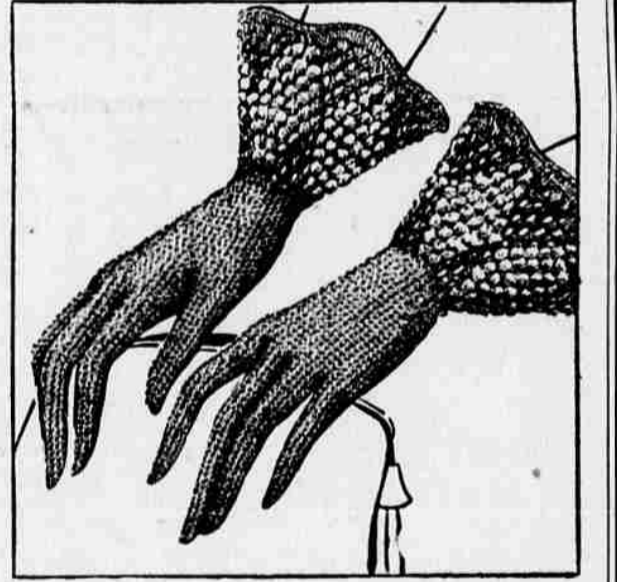
