

OAKLAND TURKEY SHOW JUDGES ARE ANNOUNCED HERE

Judges for the Northwestern Turkey show to be held at Oakland, Oregon, December 12 to 15, have been chosen by the board of directors, it was announced Saturday. They are: Live show, E. C. Branch, Lee's Summit, Missouri; H. P. Griffin, Bozeman, Montana; Dressed show, Prof. F. E. Fox, Corvallis, and M. H. Shook of Roseburg. These are experienced judges who have served for the last ten years.

The directors also voted to give the 4-H club boys and girls free entry fees for their club turkeys. Each exhibitor in these classes will be allowed to enter one young tom, and one young hen. Each bird will be judged by itself, that is, Bronze against Bronze, Bourbon Red against Bourbon Red, etc. Five breeds are in the club show, the other three being Narragansett, White Holland, and Black.
