Dunne Motorcade Due
Supporters of Joe E. Dunne, republican candidate for governor, plan a busy Friday and Saturday, with a motorcade for the candidate, meetings and radio talks over KORE.

Mr. Dunne will arrive Friday in Junction City at 11 a. m. He will deliver a short address to the people there at the noon hour and, following luncheon, will leave under escort of automobiles for nine of the more populous precincts in western and southern Lane county. Lastly Mr. Dunne will attend the meeting of the Women's Division of the Lane County Republican Central Committee at headquarters in Eugene at 2 p. m. of that day.

Approximately \$53,000,000 of the securities was sold instead of the \$50,000,000 originally announced. The obligations are guaranteed by the government both as to principal and to interest.

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BANKERS REPEAT WITH PLEAS FOR BALANCED BUDGET

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will avail themselves of the comprehensive banking facilities which both government authorities and bankers are recommending that they utilize," it added.

The demand for a balanced budget said the association recognized that emergency expenditures were at times called for in the interests of human welfare.

F-D Seeks Stabilization
"Understanding statesmen," the resolution said, "meet such emergencies as they arise, but at the same time make it clear that expenses can not be allowed to exceed income indefinitely."

Some high officials of the association said the bankers had hoped the president would comment on the budget in his speech last night.

Out of President Roosevelt's address there arose today clear indications that the administration hopes for international harmony on a policy of arriving at price stabilization "as quickly as possible."

In a speech in which he challenged the banking fraternity last night to speed the flow of credit, the president included this paragraph:

"With respect to international relationships, I have been glad to note the growing appreciation in other nations of the desirability of arriving, as quickly as possible, at a point of steadiness of prices and values. This objective of a greater steadiness we have constantly kept before us as our national policy."

Special significance was attached to this because sources close to the administration expressed the belief it was one of three salient points in the speech. They did not elaborate on it, however.

Pledge Is Withheld
The remarks on price stabilization are not a pledge for currency stabilization which many bankers desire. Many of the 4,000 delegates who crowded constitution hall to listen regarded the speech as leaving the door open to whatever monetary strategy may be deemed feasible to attain the desired price level and then keep it stable.

It was recalled that the president has expressed a wish for a dollar that would remain steady in purchasing power over a long period—in other words, a managed dollar.

Another point stressed in administration quarters today was the president's remark that bankers are not equal to nor independent of the government.

He said "the old fallacious notion of the bankers on the one side and the government on the other as more or less equal and independent units has passed away."

"Government," he said, "by the necessity of things must be the leader, must be the judge of the conflicting interests of all groups in the community, including bankers. The government is the outward expression of the common life of all citizens."

TAX LIMITATION STORY

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ments for public works to cities in states which have not adopted needlessly drastic constitutional or statutory tax limitation laws."

A case in point is the recent decision of Secretary Ickes to recall two allotments from Indiana where the 15-mill limitation law is in effect with little prospect of modification or repeal. The allotments were tentatively made to East Chicago and Rushville, Indiana, on condition that the tax limitation law were repealed or modified so as to insure the solvency of the borrowing units.

The proposed Oregon constitutional amendment is more rigid than the Indiana law now in effect. While the Oregon measure gives full power to levy such sums as are necessary for debt service on obligations incurred before passage of the amendment, any interest, sinking fund obligations or amortization charges on debt contracted after the passage of the amendment, must come out of the meager allowances made to taxing units under the 20 mill provision.

With levies insufficient to meet operating expenses, bonds would not prove acceptable securities to the P. W. A. authorities in Washington.

Considerable sums have been spent by Oregon cities in making preliminary surveys, preparing plans and applications. The projects are in many cases urgently needed and would relieve labor conditions in unemployment centers. "In the light of the financial standards set by P. W. A. for borrowing units the action of the Washington authorities is easily understood. Many cities in Oregon with applications pending will watch the outcome of the vote on the 20 mill limitation with more than usual interest," said Dr. Gilbert.

FLOOD CONTROL IS HELD FOUNDATION FOR DEVELOPMENT

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here that state participation in any comprehensive flood control project must await recommendations from the federal government as to details of the necessary enabling acts.

3—That federal legislation undoubtedly will be based on the findings of the U. S. engineers as to the economy of the program.

4—That federal and state appropriations should be sufficiently large to cover the U. S. engineers' recommendations as to the amount of work to be done.

5—That recommendations as to the survey now under way by the U. S. Army engineers appear of doubtful value before the completion of these surveys.

Mr. Russell declared the association hoped to have the engineers' report completed by the time of the Spokane meeting which will be presided over by Marshall Dana, of Portland, director of the Northwest Regional Planning Commission.

Development Hindered
Cutting of timber in federal lands, constituting 40 per cent of the Willamette watershed has added to the flood control problem. Mr. Russell reports says. The report continues that development of this valley will add to the market for timber cut from these lands.

In discussing agricultural development, the report lists 29,000 farms in the valley, averaging 110 acres each. Nearly a million acres of good farm land can now be used only for part-time pasture, due to winter floods while a few generations ago virtually all this land was under cultivation.

With canned goods produced in this valley commanding top markets throughout the country, the possibilities of future development with the removal of the flood hazard is believed unlimited.

Seen Bonneville Tie
