

OREGON EKES OUT 8 TO 7 VICTORY OVER UTAH TRIBE

the end of the half checked the drive on the Oregon seven-yard line.

Webfoot's Block Punt
A recovered fumble gave the Ducks the ball in Utah's territory early in the second half and they marched to the redskin three-yard line, but Danny Savich, Utah's sensational guard, stopped Van Vleet with a three-yard loss on fourth down and Utah took the ball. Arnett kicked out of bounds on Utah's 40-yard line, but the Ducks were offside and were penalized five yards. On the next play, Arnett's punt was blocked and a safety resulted.

After a somewhat hapless 10 minutes of play in the final period, Call, who weighs only 145 pounds, dashed off a tackle for his 50-yard sprint, only to be brought down on the Oregon five-yard line. Joe Rinaldi, halfback, plunged through center on the third play to give Utah a touchdown and big Sid Kramer, halfback, added the extra point with a perfect placement.

More Webfooters Hurt

Five of Oregon's first string men were injured in the Utah game, according to word sent by Ned Simpson, end on the team.

Co-captains Butch Morse and Bob Parke both were listed among the day's injured. Morse suffered with a pulled stomach muscle and Parke with a bad instep.

"Lamp" Walker, Alex Eagle, and Ralph Terjeson were the other three injured. Walker was perhaps the worst injured with a cracked rib. Eagle tore a ligament above the right knee while Terjeson banged himself up with his old injury.

"The altitude made it bad in the second and fourth quarters as the team began to tire out, otherwise we had the ball game well in hand. The fumbles were costly in the third quarter as two scoring drives petered out in this means," Simpson added.

"Utah has a fine team. All the gang declared it was the toughest one played yet this year. The weather was clear and hot."

"Reischman scored touchdown. Walker and I blocked the kick which resulted in the safety for us. Rinaldi scored for Utah after Call ran 50 yards to our seven. Lopes and Van Vleet, each played sweet ball. Frye, Rinaldi, Carter all looked good," Simpson's telegram concludes.

the ranks with the bootleggers, saloon keepers and others. It takes time, but not very much time. "Consider also the fact that we were assured that with the return of liquor unemployment would vanish—we know it to be a fact that there are many more unemployed than there were one year ago. We know that there is an increase in motor accidents of at least 25 percent in Oregon, with less gasoline being consumed and fewer cars on the road."

"Consider also that some of this liquor which brought Oregon \$400,000 caused such a row in one home that the family broke apart over it and will never be reunited. It cannot. If it were your son that had the accident mentioned above would \$400,000 repay you for the loss of his character and his life?"

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M'ARTHUR STATES METERED WATER RATES MORE FAIR

use in Eugene. Fresno evidently consumes a large amount of water, especially for irrigation, and I am sure that a part of it must be charged to wastage due to flat rates. On the subject of waste of water, the superintendent of the Fresno water department states:

"You will appreciate that a great deal more water is used by our consumers under the flat rate than would be used with meters, and naturally a great deal of waste of water results; that is to say, lawns, and especially park strips are often flooded until a good deal of water is wasted in the gutter."

Area Cost Figured

"Very naturally the cost of all this wasted water has to be paid for, but, of course, not necessarily by the party who wastes it—thanks to the flat rate. If Eugene were to use this method, the wastage resulting therefrom would very soon exhaust the entire reserve supply of the water system. Practically all authorities agree that selling water through meter is the most equitable, fair, and honest method of distributing the costs that exists."

"Fresno's water is pumped from 47 wells. The commercial and industrial consumers are metered, but the residences are served by a flat rate. This rate is 95c from November 1 to May 1. From May 1 to November 1, for the irrigation season, the following additional charges are made for irrigation water. Minimum, 45c for which 75 sq. yds. are allowed; each additional sq. yd. costs 1/2c. Bills are payable monthly through the entire irrigation season. This, we see, is a flat rate based on the area to be watered."

12 Laws Studied

To see how the cost of irrigation in Eugene compares with the cost in Fresno, I have had measured the area of, and checked on the water used, during 1933-34 to irrigate 12 lawns located in different parts of Eugene. These include the better-kept lawns, some of which have heretofore merited special mention in the press. To determine the water used during the irrigation season, the average amount per month used during the winter season has been subtracted in each case. While the amount used in the off-irrigation season varies for different customers, it is quite uniform for the same customer. I feel that this method is a fair way of arriving at the amount of water used for irrigation purposes.

"The 12 lawns referred to, for the purpose of this discussion, will be numbered from 1 to 12 and referred to by number. The results of the study are shown in the attached tabulation."

Rates Here Lower

"A study of this table reveals a startling difference in the costs of irrigation in Eugene and Fresno. Thus, No. 2, who used water freely (nearly 30" in depth over his lawn), paid only \$14.90 in Eugene and would have paid \$30.00 at the Fresno rate for the season. Notice also, that No. 2's all-year cost in Eugene was \$30.65, whereas the charge at the Fresno rate would have been \$42.30. In every case (and these cases were selected at random without knowing in advance how they would compare) the cost for irrigation in Eugene is very much less than in Fresno. In only two cases, and that in a very slight

amount, is the cost for the entire year less in Fresno than in Eugene. "The Water Board has worked to get the water rate for Eugene low enough so that anyone might use water freely at reasonable cost. In Eugene, through the ordinary 5-8" meter, the cost for the first 1,000 cu. ft. per month at the residence rate is \$1.60. This compares very favorably with other towns in the Northwest. Above 1,000 cu. ft., the Eugene charge is 5c per 100 cu. ft., or 50c per 1,000 cu. ft. I have yet to find any city in the Pacific Northwest which offers its residence users so low a rate for irrigation. "In Eugene, the average family
