Martin Group Rallies

The campus Martin-For-Governor club was to meet at the campus Y but Tuesday night at 7:30 o'clock when Hugh Earle, chairman of the Lane county democratic central committee, was to speak on behalf of Martin's candidacy.

Hugh Rosson, graduate manager at the university, will give a sum-

mary of the activity of those of the present republican candidates for legislature who have been to Salem before at the Thursday noon meeting of the Lane County Legislative association, it was announced by Mr. H. W. Titus, chairman.

Senator H. C. Wheeler, E. A. McCormack, Earl Hill and C. A. Huntington all are veterans in the legislature and Mr. Rosson will outline the work they did while at Salem. A county-wide representation is expected at the meeting.

Declares Martin True

Following is the statement released by Tuesday by Mr. Martin:

"As we are nearing the close of the campaign, I wish to make this appeal to the voters of Oregon: Consider well the platform of the candidates and the stand that they have taken and followed through; the sincerity of the men seeking office, particularly the office of governor.

"Whether or not I am elected governor, I intend to make it my business to go back of the man that is elected governor and keep faith with him just as long as he uses his best influence to give to Oregon what he has promised in his

"One of my opponents, General Martin, has been true to his statements all the way through his campaign. I have learned to admire General Martin for his frankness. He promised in the beginning that

he would follow the New Deal and work for the good of Oregon, making no promises of anything as far as I am aware to obtain votes, and standing squarely on what he believes to be right. Such a stand

from a sincere man as General Martin is worthy of due consideration. I certainly do believe that he is honest and conservative and will not work a hardship on the people of Oregon.

"According to the statement of Joe Dunne in the Oregonian of October 26th, Mr. Dunne has mapped out a plan that is wholly good for our people and if Mr. Dunne is elected, we want to make it our business to see that he carries

out the promises that he has made. He has incorporated in these promises the most of the reforms that all the other candidates have advocated. If he is sincere and will carry out what he advocates, it will make Oregon a very desirable

"Peter Zimmerman is advocating some very fine principles and I believe if he is elected he will put these principles into effect if it is humanly possible.

"For myself I am fighting for the

same principles that I outlined before any of my competitors declared his intention of becoming a candidate for the governor of Oregon.

A deep gash was inflicted on his forehead by a blow from the back of a baton. Patrolman Vernon Sapp was injured in the riot. Sapp was down by Pitt's assistance and he was taken to the hospital. Immediately others jumped on the officers, several kicking them. The patrolmen drew revolvers and fired over the heads of the crowd. One man fell, however, a woman. Patrolman Marshall Stanton had shot a man in the stomach who attacked an officer. The man never was found and officers believed he was rushed away by his companions. About 300 shots were fired.
