

GOP LEGISLATIVE CANDIDATES ARE HELD QUALIFIED

committee of the house at the last session, probably the most powerful committee in the legislature. He was vice-chairman of the highways and highway revenue committee and was a member of the bills and mailing committee, commerce and navigation, railroads and transportation and ways and means committee. In addition, Mr. Hill was mentioned as speaker at the last session and was so respected by his colleagues that he was again given prominent mention in this respect for the coming session.

With this area particularly interested in education, Mr. Rosson stressed the advantage through having Shy Huntington as vice-chairman of the house education committee at the last session. In addition he was a member of the important assessment and taxation committee, election committee and game committee, all having important bearing on affairs in this community.

Discussing Mr. McCormack as a candidate for the senate, he received his record in the house, pointing out that he was chairman of the house taxation and revenue committee, through which came all legislation pertaining to taxes. He was vice-chairman of the committee on utilities through which group came legislation pertaining to agriculture, peddler laws, inspection bills and other measures affecting the farmers of this community. He was likewise a member of the banking and corporations committee and of the committee on counties and cities.

While Howard Merriam has not been in the legislature and therefore has no legislative record, Mr. Rosson pointed out that his background as a successful farmer, his wide experience in state affairs through his connection as member of the important state horticultural board, and his active interest in state highway affairs fitted him to take the vacancy left by Mr. McCormack's shift to the senate.

Declares Men Qualified
"Considering Lane county as an institution and its legislative delegation as the board of directors, can you find a group of men better qualified to fill this position this year?" the speaker asked. "Lane county must be prepared to recognize an ever present problem in connection with the university in this city and with this problem, as well as the other major problems confronting Lane county, I think you have been wise in your choice or representation for this county."

Dr. M. C. Harris, former chairman of the Lane county republican central committee, also made a short talk in behalf of the candidates, pointing out that "this is a good ticket and would be a good ticket even if they were Democrats."

Dr. James H. Gilbert, of the university, made a short talk on the 50-mill tax limitation measure and pointed out that higher education faced a crisis in the coming legislature. If the schools are saved, it will be by friends of education who are sent to the legislature, he declared.

Dr. H. W. Titus, chairman of the Lane County Legislative committee, presided at the meeting and introduced the speakers.

Zimmerman Is Heard
Peter Zimmerman, independent candidate for governor, told approximately 700 persons who crowded the Rex theater Wednesday night that he would urge the next congress to pass the Townsend old-age pension bill if he were elected governor.

Speaking on "The Townsend Plan and Human Rights," Zimmerman emphasized his platform plank of "Human Rights Above Property Rights," and pledged his hearty support to the plan.

"The Townsend plan is, in my opinion, the best plan that has yet been devised to take care of our aged and needy people, and should I be elected governor of Oregon, I would feel it my duty to urge upon congress the passage of a law in line with this plan," he said. "I believe that the people of our country who have reached the age of sixty years should receive a pension sufficient to take them from the field of competitive labor, increase the buying power of our country, and adequately maintain and sustain them in comfort in their own homes, where they may enjoy some of the luxuries of life in their declining years."

"This plan will open new fields of labor for our young people and will allow additional opportunity for others now idle to find lucrative and self-sustaining labor, and take them from the roll of charity and forced unemployment relief."

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funds available to care for the aged through increased inheritance taxes, income, excess profits, gifts and stock sales, that are not paying their just share of taxation. Haybarker, vice-president of the state federation; Richard L. Neuberger, chairman of the Zimmerman committee on the campus; Charles H. Paine, divisional organizer of the Townsend plan; and Rev. Ernest Whitcomb.

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SAAR DISPUTE IS SIGNAL FOR NEW WAR SCARE TALK

but the war scare then died quickly in the face of political opponents' charges that the military party was "beating the drum" to get appropriations and unify the nation in the midst of internal dissension and economic distress.

A warning to the people that the government is hiding the truth of the "German danger" was published recently by Raymond Bechler, a well-known newspaperman and a friend of the late Marshal Foch.

Three days later Pétain asked an emergency appropriation of \$50,000,000 francs (about \$32,000,000) outside the budget, and he and newspapermen gave figures designed to show the "menace" from Berlin.

French preparations to send troops into the Saar territory if the League of Nations' governing commission asks help centered attention on the disputed region, where violence might be the starting point of another war, often publicity said here to be "inevitable."

"PLAYING WITH FIRE"
BERLIN, Nov. 1.—(AP)—A semi-official German source, answering reports that France is preparing for possible occupation of the Saar territory, warned today that France is "playing with fire."

The Deutsche Diplomatische Politische Korrespondenz, mouthpiece of the government, in an editorial headed "Playing With Fire," said:

"Under no circumstances could peace and order be enforced in the Saar with military force by a power which is a party to the Jan. 18 plebiscite."

"Occupation of the Saar, under whatever pretext," the newspaper said, "will constitute a challenge to Germany and would amount to rape of territory under league's trusteeship. Even playing with such an idea should be sharply discontinued by the whole world."

"Responsibility for such an action, which would revive anxiety of a Ruhr invasion in time, must rest upon those who permit it," the newspaper said.

CHURCHILL JOINS IN

WOODFORD BRIDGE, England, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Winston Churchill, former chancellor of the exchequer of Great Britain, declared today in a speech to members of his constituency that Germany was rearming "secretly, illegally and rapidly."

In his speech, Churchill rapped the national government for failing to speed up its program for air defense. "A reign of terror exists in Germany in order to keep secret the feverish and terrible preparations they are making," declared Churchill. "Even in organized military machines alone, Germany will have overtaken us before another year has passed."

"The Germans also have civil aviation with enormous reserves of pilots and airplanes, many of them faster than our fastest military machines."

street and blew down the Zimmerman-for-governor banner on Willamette street.

From 7 a. m. to 1:15 p. m. Thursday it rained nearly a third of an inch in Eugene, 30 of an inch being recorded. During the night .14 of an inch came down.

The high wind fanned many fires into fiery activity and the Eugene fire department made nine runs for flue fires Wednesday evening. All flue fires apparatus was pressed into service to meet the demand, trucks barely getting back to the station before they started out again. In one instance, all trucks were out and the first one back found a call waiting for them.

Limbs blew down on power lines in the city during the early evening. Wednesday, causing lights to flicker and go out for a few minutes. They were out only a few minutes, however. A half-dozen places were struck along the lines in town. No trouble was reported from up the McKenzie line to the summit and the McKenzie pass area averse out for a time. Thursday, without reports available from those sources during the afternoon as to weather conditions.

STORM WARNINGS UP
PORTLAND, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Small craft warnings were continued at all Oregon and Washington coast stations today as fresh to strong winds were predicted for today and tonight. Intermittent rains yesterday and last night added .29 of an inch to Portland's precipitation total.

WIND RECORD BROKEN
ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 1.—(AP)—As if haunted by the mischievous spirits of Halloween the month of October celebrated its departure last night by establishing a new wind record for Roseburg, which holds the lowest average wind velocity for any weather bureau reporting station in the world.

Scattering more debris than did the Halloween celebrants, the wind late yesterday reached a maximum velocity of 32 miles an hour, breaking the 24-mile per hour record of October, 1927, which was equalled in October of last year.

Although the maximum velocity continued for only five minutes, the breeze maintained for approximately an hour, with an average for the period of 25 miles per hour. The strongest blow ever recorded by the weather bureau station here was 38 miles per
