

ARMISTICE GROUP PROTESTS RALLY FIREWORKS PLAN

Right when the Eugene chamber of commerce, park board, Business and Professional Women's clubs and about 20 other Eugene organizations were laying plans to beautify Skinner Butte, came announcement that the university students planned to rally down Willamette street to Skinner butte where the annual fireworks would be held for homecoming this year Wednesday.

Officials of the chamber, acting in behalf of organizations planning the beautification of the butte, hurriedly entered a protest to this idea Wednesday and at the same time published a letter received from C. V. Boyer, president of the university, stating he would be "glad to do what I can to prevent the students from making any fires on the butte."

H. E. Cully, secretary of the Eugene chamber, pointed out that plans to beautify the butte would not be helped any by having trash hauled up there and burned in a huge bonfire. In connection with the beautification program, the chamber addressed letters to high schools and the university, asking their cooperation in preventing fires of this type on the butte. Harry B. Johnson, principal of the Eugene high school, replied that their school did not favor such action and assured the chamber that students would not mar the butte by fires.

Following is the letter received from President Boyer:

"I shall be glad to do what I can to prevent the students from making any fires on the butte that will frustrate the efforts of the Park Improvement Committee to grow trees and shrubs in that district and thus improve the beauty of the city. I am glad you called the matter to my attention."

Secretary Cully, C. C. Olsen, assistant supervisor of the Willamette national forest, and Mrs. Frank Noma, Tuesday visited President Peavy, of O. S. C., and were assured that Eugene would be supplied all the trees desired for planting on the butte Monday, Nov. 12, during the Armistice day celebration here. This action will save at least \$250 that would otherwise have been necessary to spend to purchase trees for this planting, Mr. Cully said.

Gaylord Razing Is Marked By Rumpus

K. W. Collins was arrested on an assault charge Wednesday afternoon after he allegedly attacked N. R. Gaylord, whose Enclave hotel property was being razed by contractors after several weeks of contention over the city's razing order.

Gaylord protested when contractors appeared Wednesday afternoon to begin the razing, and started down the street. He reached into a bag he was carrying and Collins is said to have thought that he was reaching for a gun, and tackled him.

Chief of Police Bergman and Policeman Clair Larson were on hand to see that the razing was carried out "in an orderly manner." A good-sized crowd gathered to watch the tearing down of the old landmark.

Although Halloween pranks and about Eugene were unusually passive Wednesday evening, the elements decided to make up for it, and the city was treated with a brief but spirited wind and rain storm which toppled several trees and caused 10 fire lines between the hours of 5:30 and 7 p. m.

Although no severe damage was reported, several city electric light lines were down for a short time, and trees at several spots throughout town were blown down. According to Hobl Airways, the wind reached a velocity of 30 miles an hour at its highest point.

The storm apparently blew up from the southwest, and Florence, coast point, reported no unusual conditions. The fire department answered 10 calls during the time, but all of them were due fires, and nothing serious came up. Aside from the storm, the city spent a quiet Halloween and the wind and rain apparently discouraged pranks.

Cop Slayer Found Guilty in Seattle

SEATTLE, Nov. 1.—(AP)—With recommendation of life imprisonment for punishment, a superior court jury today found Edward Griffin, 20, guilty of the first degree murder of Police Sergeant John S. Donlan.

The jury reached the decision after nine hours' deliberation. The state had demanded the death penalty. The youth pleaded not guilty because of insanity.

Griffin shot Donlan May 20, when the officer surprised him prowling in his home. He was arrested at Los Angeles in August.

BALLOT MEASURES DISCUSSED BEFORE FACULTY, STUDENTS

Dr. James H. Gilbert, dean of the college of social science, explained the 20-mill tax limitation amendment, and Dean Wayne L. Morse of the law school and Dr. Fred N. Miller, head of the University health service, explained the healing arts amendment at a meeting of University students and faculty Tuesday night in the Craftsman's club.

Dean Gilbert in his analysis went over the tax amendment point by point, emphasizing in particular the great difference between the proposed Oregon measure and the statute now operative in the state of Washington. The Washington measure, in the first place, he pointed out, fixes the maximum at 40 mills, with the state assessed valuation at 46 per cent, while the Oregon measure provides at least for one-half and later three-eighths of that amount on not to exceed 50 per cent valuation. The dean explained that the pending amendment does not compel a 50 per cent valuation and anything lower could be fixed as a taxing basis.

Then, as another difference, the Washington measure is a statute which can be altered at need by the legislature, while the pending bill requires a statewide vote.

Summing up its defects, Dean Gilbert asserted that the proposed measure would cripple state, county, and city government; would wreck the school system, making no provision whatever for the support of high schools, and would leave no funds for the support of higher education. The net result would be that, at the very time when Oregon should normally stand on the threshold of a new development, the current, of desirable immigration would be cut off, since the right type of people will not go to a state that refuses to support its civilizing agencies. This might conceivably even affect the business of the Eugene realty dealers.

Dean Morse and Dr. Miller asserted that the healing arts amendment would have the effect of throwing the bars down to healers knowing nothing of the structure and functions of the human body and would cut off the medical division of the University health service, thus effectually cutting off its effectiveness.

Old Oregon State Journal Is Found

An edition of The Oregon State Journal, predecessor of The Register-Guard, which carried the story of the structure and functions of the human body and would cut off the medical division of the University health service, thus effectually cutting off its effectiveness.

The paper was dated April 22, 1895. It was published weekly at "Eugene City" by H. R. Kincaid. It was a four-page edition, with five columns to a page.

On the masthead under the list of subscription and advertising rates was the interesting notation: "Prices in Coln. Legal tender notes accepted only at current value."

COMMUNISM VS. CHRISTIANITY AS "WAY OUT" IS TOPIC

The world can not ignore the power of appeal to be found in communism. Communism is an economic way out to salvation and it should be studied intelligently and objectively, members of the Lions club were told, Wednesday, by Dr. Hugh Vernon White, education secretary for the American board of Foreign Missions in Congregational church. He is here from Boston, Mass., visiting Congregational churches in this section.

One of the important things today is "the way out," he said. There has been a decided trend in the world "to take the non-religious ways to solve the problem," he added.

Two of these ways were referred to as political and economic. Communism, he pointed out, comes under the economic ways.

"It is a tragedy in history that these ways out should have come from atheistic and material systems instead of from the church," Dr. White said. Communism is the first system to propose to humanity an absolutely rational treatment of the problem, he pointed out. Every individual is looked upon as one, an economic unit. To us that means a leveling down of society. However, we must catch the viewpoint of the millions who in all these centuries have been counted no more than "a vanishing fraction," and realize what it means to them to be counted as one, just the same as every one else, the speaker said. To them, communism means a leveling up, it was added. It is a hope to an overwhelming majority in the world, the idea of being one, Dr. White continued.

In America, it must be remembered, he said, success of the individual has been the big aim. Fundamentally, such an attitude is wrong. Advantages for some mean underprivileged conditions for others, and there can not be any underprivileged if there are no advantages obtained, he pointed out.

And so, he said, the appeal of communism sounds reasonable and just to those who have been the underprivileged.

"We must find a better way than communism, however. There are wrongs in communism and it is not the right way out," Dr. White continued. Man must be regarded more than just an economic unit. He needs a conception of himself as a being with possibilities of development. A right Christianity is the only way out because Christianity allows for sacred personality, it is a way of redemption and it allows a place for every person, too, the speaker pointed out.

Previously he spoke of the political way out for salvation, discussing nationalism and patriotism under this topic, pointing out how they were not the way to salvation. Nationalism, which is at its height in Germany, makes the nation supreme, even in religion, it makes a religion of the state. One big trouble is there are too many states in the world and the inevitable result under such a system is war and international anarchy and chaos, he said.
