Two Destroyers, Plane Damaged in Naval Maneuvers

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Two navy destroyers were damaged and a naval airplane lost in two separate accidents during maneuvers 200 miles off Magdalena bay on the Mexican coast, radio reports received here disclosed today.

The destroyers Ellis and McFarland collided during a simulated night attack, the vessel, with 26 others, proceeding with the lights extinguished

at the time of the collision. The two damaged ships were taken in tow by tenders and were proceeding toward San Diego today.

The airplane of Lieut. Commander Thomas P. Jeter, noted navy speed flier, was lost but the pilot escaped injury when the plane was forced into the water after three planes brushed wings in midair. The other two planes in the accident were undamaged and the pilots succeeded in landing their ships on airplane carriers.

It is much more economical to fly at high altitudes with transport planes, particularly those equipped with supercharged engines.

TURNER, ALDRICH, PETERSON CHOSEN BY SPRINGFIELDERS

SPRINGFIELD, Nov. 7.—(Special.)—Election of a relative newcomer as mayor for the city featured the voting Tuesday and was a surprise to many citizens. E. H. Turner, who came here about two years ago to make his home, polled a substantial majority over W. A. Taylor and Clayton Barber.

Complete returns showed Mr. Turner received 403 votes, Taylor 249, and Barber 126.

The vote in the city was unusually heavy, being two-thirds of the total registration of about 1250. A total of 893 persons voted in the majority contest.

Taylor will retain his position on the city council, where he has two more years to serve. He has been acting mayor of the city since the death of W. A. Tyson two weeks ago. Mr. Turner will fill out the remaining two years of Tyson's term.

L. M. Peterson scored the most decisive victory in any of the city contests, receiving 384 votes for city recorder, as opposed to 42 for Mrs. Dodd Miller, 33 for E. E. Kepner, and 105 for W. G. Hughes.

Chester Aldrich will be the city's treasurer for the next two years, receiving 485 votes as against 258 for Mrs. Niel Pollard.

In the only contest for councilman position, the two-year term, P. J. Bartholomew won easily over John Pyle, 466 ballots being marked for him and 287 for Mr. Pyle.

Earl Thompson and E. G. Privat were reelected for the two four-year terms. L. D. Larimer was also unopposed for constable, succeeding himself.

Mr. Turner Wednesday morning expressed his appreciation to the voters who supported him and pledged himself to do his utmost in furthering the interests and welfare of the city and its citizens. He will be sworn in at the next council meeting, which will be held this coming Tuesday evening, Nov. 13.
