

FIRE PREVENTION PROJECT PLANNED FOR 4-H CLUBS

Announcement of the annual fire prevention project in the schools of Lane county and the letter writing contest held in connection with it, was made Thursday by R. C. Kuehner, county 4-H club leader.

Public school pupils are being asked to write a story of 250 words or more on the work they have done in the way of fire prevention during the past year and membership certificates in the Lane county 4-H fire prevention club will be issued to each boy and girl turning in a story. Every boy and girl in Lane county is eligible to compete.

A set of requirements is being sent out by Mr. Kuehner as follows:

1. Become familiar with the more common fire hazards.
2. Fill out a report blank checking the hazards about their home, and those eliminated.
3. Have the report signed by a neighbor.
4. Write a story of 250 words or more on the work you did.

A letter is being sent to the teachers in the county, suggesting that the 250-word story that is required in the project be used as a language lesson before it is sent in.

In addition to this, certificates of merit will be issued to each school having 100 per cent of all boys and girls nine years and over completing the required work and a 4-H fire marshal's badge will be awarded to the champion boy and girl turning in the best record and story. All records and stories are to be turned in by December 1, it is announced.

The aim of the project is to acquaint every boy and girl in Lane county with the fire hazard common to the farm and home and to assist them in saving the loss of life and property and to prevent injury.

COMMISSION WILL HEAR ASSESSMENT APPEAL ON FRIDAY

The hearing on appeal of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company on the assessment of its sawmill plant, logging railway and rolling stock at Wendling will be held by the state tax commission at the courthouse in Eugene Friday at 10 a. m., according to notice received by Ben F. Keeney, county assessor, Thursday morning.

Because of such short notice, an attempt was made by County Judge Fred Flak and Assessor Keeney, members of the county board of equalization, to have the hearing postponed but without success. Judge Flak was due to attend a meeting of the county courts of the laid grant counties with the state planning council in Portland Friday but he will be compelled to remain in Eugene for the tax hearing. County Clerk Dillard is the other member of the county board of equalization.

The board fixed the assessment on the Booth-Kelly's "improvements." In other words, the mill and plant at Wendling at \$40,330; the logging railroad and spurs at \$32,400; locomotives and rolling stock, \$18,000, and logging camp equipment and machinery, \$108,679, making a total assessed valuation of \$199,409. The company asked for a reduction of 33 1/2 per cent, but the petition was denied by the board and an appeal was filed later.

The company is further asking for a reduction in its assessment on certain improvements at its Springfield mill property, according to Assessor Keeney. The reduction asked for is from \$1500 to \$500 on an office building and several other structures and a large dry shed.

I can't remember if he was east recently or not," was her answer to a query concerning a trip east reportedly made by Scott and Miss Hartienne.

While state and county officers were methodically shoveling about on the Scott place, federal agents were in the house minutely ransacking all the belongings. If any further "finds" are made they will be reported to C. C. Spears, department of justice agent, now in Roseburg, special agents here said.

BANK DRAFTS FOUND

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 8.—(AP)—Recovery at Medford last night of \$1,400 of the Orschell ransom payment together with \$4,000 in bank drafts made payable to Clara Feldman, suspected fugitive conspirator in the kidnapping of the Oklahoma oil man in July 1933, was reported here this morning by C. C. Spears, special agent for the U. S. department of justice.

The \$5,400 found last night at Medford is in addition to the \$1,360 discovered here upon the person of Alvin H. Scott who is in the local hospital in a semi-conscious state as the result of a skull fracture suffered in an automobile accident near here November 2.

The money found by department of justice men last night had been buried in the yard surrounding the house where Scott and Miss Margaret H. Hartienne, his housekeeper, a sister of Clara Feldman, have been residing on the outskirts of Medford.

To Be Arraigned Here

The bank drafts discovered in the cache at Medford, Spears stated, were drawn on a Denver city bank and were made payable to Clara Feldman, said by the federal officers to have posed as the wife of Albert L. Bates, one of the men sentenced to life imprisonment for participation in the kidnapping.

Spears left this morning for Medford where Scott's 23-year-old son and 21-year-old daughter are reported to be held in custody for questioning.

Jack Summersville, U. S. marshal, arrived in Roseburg last night and served warrants of arrest on conspiracy charges against Scott and Miss Hartienne. The latter, it is stated, will probably be taken before U. S. Commissioner E. O. Immel at Eugene within a few days for arraignment and will then be removed to Portland prior to being taken to Oklahoma City. Scott will be removed from the local hospital and taken to Oklahoma as soon as his condition will permit. He is still in a critical condition at the hospital, it is reported, being in a semi-conscious state. He has occasional rational moments, his physician, Dr. E. J. Wainwright reports, but has a complete loss of memory.

SCOTT HEARS CHARGE

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 8.—(AP)—Alvin H. Scott, charged with conspiracy in the Orschell kidnapping case, today asked guards why his name was mentioned in the newspaper. The man, who has been in a semi-conscious state, since receiving injuries in an automobile accident here Friday, has occasional rational periods, according to his physician, Dr. E. J. Wainwright of this city.

It was during one of these periods that he picked up a newspaper this morning and read the account of his arrest. He appeared to be unmoved for a few minutes, it was stated, and then his dazed condition returned and he turned from the newspaper to a voters' pamphlet. However he reread the news account several times during the morning but apparently failed to grasp its full import.

He evidenced interest last night as the warrant ordering his arrest was read to him by U. S. Marshal Jack Summersville, but in his dazed state apparently did not realize the nature of the formalities. His first rational comment on the matter occurred this morning as he read newspapers.

Federal guards have been posted about his room in the hospital and will be maintained until his condition permits removal to Oklahoma City.
