Idaho Senator Confers With Hopkins Aide About Aid Wastage

NEW PLANS STUDIED

Larger Use Of Small Shops Discussed In Making Jobs For Jobless

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Senator Borah (R., Idaho), turned over to the federal relief administration today his charges of "shameless waste" in the disbursement of federal relief funds.

The Idaho senator submitted his charges in a half-hour conference with Dallas W. Dort, chief investigator of the federal administration.

Dort hurried back to report to Harry L. Hopkins, relief administrator, refusing to disclose what procedure would be followed.

After the conference with Dort, Borah told newspapermen they had "talked over the charges and agreed to proceed along certain lines."

"I don't think there will be any differences between Mr. Dort and Mr. Hopkins and myself about the matter," Borah said, with the youthful Dort nodding assent.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Some republicans and democrats were talking today of a compromise on the soldier bonus issue, but there was no indication President Roosevelt had changed his opposition to cash payment at this time.

'Arizona Navy' Ready To Take Militia To Dam

PARKER, Ariz., Nov. 13.—(AP)—State Senator Nellie T. Bush, Arizona's only licensed woman river pilot, had the "Arizona navy" docked here today to carry national guardsmen to the Parker dam site where they are to patrol the martial law area proclaimed by Governor B. B. Moore in his Colorado river controversy.

"The Julia B. and the Nellie-Jo, the best river craft in this district, are at the disposal of the guardsmen," Mrs. Bush, veteran Yuma county legislator, said.

Last spring when Governor Moore sent national guardsmen here in the capacity of "observers" to prevent encroachments on Arizona Mrs. Bush's boats became the "navy."

Mrs. Bush especially is interested in the martial law edict of the governor for only recently she and her husband Joe Bush and his brother, Wesley, who operate the craft, protested to the war department over construction of a pile bridge across the Colorado river because it would "bottle up the navy."

"We do not think it fair for this bridge to be constructed across the river," Mrs. Bush said. "It will impede our free passage up and down the stream."

MARKS DECLARES STANDARDS UNHURT

Asks Pay Restoration For Teachers With Other State Employees

PORTLAND, Nov. 13.—(AP)—With a reduction in all income of 41.2 per cent, Oregon's system of higher education operated during the past four years at a reduction of \$5,735,041 compared with the preceding four-year period.

Furthermore no immediate return to the level of income prevailing before unification of the system is contemplated and budgets are being prepared on the basis of the current operating level with no expansion but "on the assumption that the full income for higher education under the millage laws will be available."

This statement was transmitted Monday to Governor Meier by William L. Marks, president of the state board of higher education. The letter covered the activities of the institutions for the past two years.

President Marks reminded the governor that the board requests that members of administrative and teaching staffs receive the same treatment as to salary restorations that may be accorded other state employees by the next legislature.

After describing the unification of Oregon's higher educational facilities, Marks observed that "While future readjustments no doubt will be necessary, the present situation is not a disaster."

POWER FIGHT LOOMING FOR NEW CONGRESS

Roosevelt Program Due To Meet Opposition From Utility Firms

SURVEY IS RELEASED

Figures Furnish Yardstick For Costs In North-Eastern States

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The Roosevelt administration is seeking to mass the resources of government behind a power offensive that may lead to an historic fight before congress.

On the one side are those who demand cheaper electric power and more drastic regulation; on the other are those who warn against government in business and declare that attacks on power companies are a danger to private industry and investors high and low.

TVA Under Attack

While the White House made public a survey contending electricity users in northeastern states could save \$104,000,000 in their power bill, one phase of the opposition to the administration's hydro-electric program cropped out in Cincinnati.

Calling the Tennessee Valley Authority "the vision machine," Appalachian Coals, Inc., began what it described as a nation-wide campaign of opposition to the hydro program. The organization, a marketing agency for nearly 80 per cent of the southern bituminous mine field, said coal furnishes cheaper electric power than

October Fire Loss In Eugene Is \$482; 29 Calls Reported

With property valued at \$156,900 at risk by fire in Eugene during the month of October, actual loss totaled \$482.76, in which insurance totalled \$457.76 was paid, it was revealed in the fire department report for October, prepared Tuesday for the state fire marshal.

Total insurance on the properties at risk by fire totaled \$90,000.

The department made 29 runs during the month, one being a false alarm and one being a rural run. The department spent \$34 hours in actual service, used 715 gallons of fire extinguisher and ran up 18 feet of ladders.

In inspections to 11 Eugene schools on fire prevention work, the following results for elapsed time in the fire drills were reported:

Whitewater school, 60 seconds; Frances Willard, 45 seconds; Lincoln school, 55 seconds; Condon school, 40 seconds; Washington school, 35 seconds; Edison school, 45 seconds; St. Mary's, 35 seconds; Theodore Roosevelt, 65 seconds; Woodrow Wilson, 70 seconds; University high, 55 seconds; Eugene High, 60 seconds.

JAILED FOR CRITICISING NAZIS!

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The Home Owners' Loan corporation announced today consideration of additional applications for loans will be suspended until further notice because of the fear that funds might be exhausted.

The corporation has more than 400,000 applications pending. In the light of its experience in refinancing mortgages on 650,000 homes which required approximately \$2,000,000,000, the corporation board decided today to cease accepting applications until it sees how far the remaining \$1,200,000,000 of capital will go.

"In view of the fact that applications from loans now in hand are far in excess of the present resources of the corporation," said a board statement, "and the continued handling of new applications is interfering seriously with the prompt disposition of the receipt of additional applications will be suspended until further notice."

The remaining \$1,200,000,000 at the disposal of the corporation is expected to care for some 400,000 applications now pending. A large part of them are well advanced in the process of examination and approval and probably will be completed and the loans closed by February or March next.

Maybe The Scientists Can Stop Eligibility Squabbles

BALTIMORE, Nov. 13.—(AP)—has progress been made toward solving the mystery of its function, said Dr. Rowntree, whose experiments have lasted 20 months.

The speeding up of growth and precocity over generations of rodents treated with the extract led to a prediction the substance would be beneficial in studying diseases afflicting certain races and localities for generations.

In spite of the phenomenal growth of the young rats, their tissues were not injured and the animals became normal adults, Dr. Rowntree said.

"Most conditions producing overgrowth usually slow down sexual development, but in our work we have not found this so, which is contrary to the usual law of genetics," he said.

Dr. Leonard G. Rowntree, director of the Philadelphia Institute for Medical Research, said offspring of rodents treated with the substance had, after several generations, teeth at birth, far shortly afterward and could swim and climb when two weeks old
