

MARTIN SELECTS BRAIN TRUST FOR LONG RANGE PLAN

engineer, Portland, Ed W. Miller, Coast Highway association manager, Marshfield, Jamieson Parker, American Institute of Architects, Portland, Philip A. Parsons, dept. of sociology, University of Oregon, William A. Schoenfeld, dean of agriculture, Oregon State college, and E. C. Van Patten of Ontario.

"Since the formal incorporation of this plan in state policy will require certain legislative action, I desire to express my appreciation of the voluntary support pledged in numerous instances by members of the next Oregon legislature," said General Martin.

Divisions Outlined
He asked the committee to report on executive, legislative and administrative procedure necessary to conserve and expand the use of all resources of the state by fully developed plans for industrial development.

"I refer to plans for the use of Oregon's basic resources of food stuffs, wood products, wool, clay and minerals; plans for the fullest use of power, land resources, transportation and housing; the purification of the streams and waters; for reforestation and prevention of fires."

"For the elimination of submarginal lands from agricultural use; for the consolidation of expensive government duplication; for a sounder fiscal policy for the state; for better educational health, and social facilities, and for the all-important long time budgeted planning of future public works."

Cooperation Sought
"To promote the public health, safety, morals, and general welfare by planning for the logical development and use of these resources by means of inquiries, investigations, surveys, studies, and research to obtain all relevant facts bearing upon these problems; to assemble and analyze the data thus obtained and with collective judgment and foresight to formulate plans to carry out these purposes."

General Martin asked that all citizens of the state "cooperate with the committee and with the advisory council, and I wish to express my appreciation for the generosity and public spirit that will prompt this service on their part."

The Red Cross, Mr. Gordon continued, "In addition to the great burden of relief work which this agency does, it has a large first aid program, sponsors learn-to-swim campaigns in many communities in the county, teaches life-saving classes, contributes to disaster relief, administers 400 old age pensions in this county, 60 mothers' compensation cases, and handles all veterans' aid work."

Mr. Gordon pointed out that the Red Cross has on its unemployment rolls 1200 families in Lane county who are and have been receiving either direct relief or work relief. Approximately this number will probably have to be carried over this coming year.

Families on unemployment rolls are first given direct relief, and then are put on work relief as soon as jobs can be found for them. Even after some member of the family has a job, the Red Cross must continue to work with the family, helping to make the wages go as far as possible, as well as working out other problems in the family.

State, federal and county funds are still inadequate to take care of all the relief cases which arise in a time of stress, such as the past four years, Mr. Gordon pointed out. In ordinary times the Red Cross does not have to give so much of its attention to relief problems, but "the cases are there, and we have to take care of them," he added.

Kardell Fined \$50 For Car Collision

Charles Kardell, living north of the city, was fined \$50 by Justice of the Peace Dan Johnston Wednesday on a charge of reckless driving and his driver's license was suspended for six months.

Kardell was arrested by state police Tuesday evening after an accident at the S. P. crossing north of Irving at 6 o'clock in which his car collided with one driven by Frank Simrock of Harburg.

the chopped prunes. Place remaining tomatoes on top of the prunes. Sprinkle with the other half of salt and pepper. Melt butter, add bread crumbs and spread over the top. Sprinkle cheese over all. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 45 minutes. Serve hot.—Mrs. R. O. Evans, 314 Adams street.

Apricot Marmalade
1 pound dried apricots.
2 oranges.
1 No. 2½ can of pineapple.
1 lemon.

Dash of salt.
8 cups sugar.

Wash apricots thoroughly. Grind and soak overnight in barely enough water to cover. The following morning grind oranges, lemon, saving all juice. Cut fine the pineapple, add it and the juice to the mixture. Stir in sugar, salt, and boil 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Pour into glass jars, cover with paraffin. Since this recipe requires no summer fruits it is an excellent one to make in winter.—L. E. McNeese, 1095 West Seventh, Eugene.

Prune Bread
Try this the next time you want

prune bread. Cook enough prunes in plenty of water so you will have two cups of pitted prune pulp and 1 quart of prune juice, add 1 cup of quart of prune juice, add one cup of either white or brown sugar, heat to lukewarm, add yeast, salt, and proceed as with any white bread.—Mrs. Hans M. "Sheriff's deputies, police, department of justice agents and investigators in my office are all working together in an effort to learn the motive for the homicide, as well as the party or parties perpetrating the crime."

NORMAN THOMAS WILL SPEAK ON FASCISM IN U. S.

Norman Thomas, noted socialist party leader and twice candidate for president of the United States, will deliver an address on "The Drift of Fascism in the United States" before students and faculty of the University of Oregon Thursday, November 15 at 1 o'clock. It is announced by Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel.

Thomas is now on a nationwide speaking tour and is appearing in all principal cities. His appearances are in no way connected with propaganda for his party, nor for any new or different "isms" it is pointed out. He is regarded by many, however, as one of the keenest students on causes and possible solutions of economic and social problems now before the American people, and is one of the leaders of a fast-growing group of thinkers in this country.

Facts and figures for his topic here have been gathered first hand in all parts of the country, and since Thomas is recognized as an orator of unusual ability, his appearance has aroused wide interest.

Thomas was the socialist candidate for president in 1928 and 1932. In 1924 he ran for governor of New York and twice was candidate for mayor of the city of New York. His followers have never expected him to be victorious in these campaigns, but have urged him to run as a means of calling attention to their sincere beliefs in their theories of government.

At present Mr. Thomas is executive director of the League for Industrial Democracy, and is contributing editor of "The Nation" and "World Tomorrow". He has also taken a considerable interest in immigration problems.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—(P)—Interior department approval was given today to a contract for \$112,015 with Dunn and Baker of Klamath Falls, Ore., for road improvement in Crater Lake National Park, Ore. The work is a public works project and provides for the grading of a mile and a half of road and widening about nine miles of the rim road. The contract specified the work shall be completed within 200 calendar days from the date of beginning work.

the "kind of security most people want is a real job in industry."

Hopkins scoffed at the idea that the nation hadn't the money to pay for a security program.

"It is ridiculous to think that out of the future national income, we can't get funds for benefits," he said.

Good to Be Retained
WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—(P)—Economic security was advocated today by Frank P. Graham, chairman of President Roosevelt's Economic Security Advisory Council, to prevent the nation from drifting "into unregulated self destruction."

"The old drift of society and the nations," he said, "led to the following results: The insecurity of peace in a world of armaments; the loss of homes in a society built upon homes; wide hunger in a land of plenty; child labor and sweat shops in the midst of unemployment; vast unemployment in a time of universal need; poverty and dependence after lives of faithful work, and disillusionment and despair in a world of youth and opportunity."

"Americans who, with scientific knowledge and mechanical device, have continued, will not long stand baffled and afraid along the social frontiers of a civilization which has not yet mastered the hazards of modern society."

Graham emphasized, however, that the good of an old order should be maintained, in creating a new.

"This security is not to be achieved through tyranny and the regimentation of a dictatorship," he said.

"It is not the security of the complacent privilege and power of the few, but the shared security of the many. It is to be a constitutional and lawful security through the co-operation of the government, management and labor."

"Real security never comes at a sacrifice of real liberty. The people must preserve the substance and spirit of the old liberties through a new security. An increase in economic security should mean an advance

PORTLAND, Nov. 14.—(P)—Unemployment compensation and old age pensions for workers in the lumber industry, as well as minimum wage scales and regulations, will be discussed at a three-day meeting of the board of directors of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen here next week.

W. C. Ruegg, president of the 4-L, said the 32d semi-annual meeting will be held Nov. 16 to 20. At a series of local and district meetings in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, California and South Dakota, resolutions and recommendations to the board were considered.

The directing board of the 4-L is composed of 13 employees and 13 employers of the west coast and western pine divisions of the lumber industry.

PORTLAND, Nov. 14.—(P)—Plans for a statewide democratic caucus to weld a structure for a house organization in the 1935 legislature were outlined last night at a meeting of Multnomah county representatives. The state meeting will be held here Nov. 24.

It was said three candidates have been prominently mentioned for the speakership. These were John E. Coater of Lincoln county; W. L. Graham of Multnomah; and Howard LaTourrette of Multnomah.

Democrats hold 38 of the 60 seats in the lower house.

Last night's meeting was called by John J. Beckman, chairman of the democratic county central committee in Multnomah.

"It is hoped," he said, "at the Nov. 24 meeting the democrats can dispose of the contest for speakership of the house and appoint some of the committee unofficially so they will be ready to go ahead with legislative business on the opening day of the session."
