

## EL TROJAN COMES TO LIFE, DEFEATS WEBFOOTS 33 TO 0

by running 34 yards to Oregon's 46-yard line with a punt, twice reversing his field along the line of march. With Workins and Warburton doing the ball-carrying, the Trojans moved to Oregon's 17-yard line and then Warburton passed to Ward Browning over the goal line for the second touchdown and again Clemens kicked the goal.

**Too Much Warburton**  
With two touchdowns in the second period, the Trojans rested temporarily on their laurels although Warburton contributed another dazzling dash, nullified, however, by a penalty. The little quarterback caught an Oregon punt and ran it back 37 yards, past the point from which the ball was kicked but Southern California was caught holding on the play.

The winners cut loose in the second half and the tiring visitors could not hold them.

Warburton was the Warburton of 1933 as he dashed 29 yards returning a punt early in the third period and then passed to Bob Fubner for 30 yards to Oregon's 25-yard line and from this point the trip goalward was made by easy stages. Workins finally going over for the touchdown.

On the next kick-off, Warburton ran 52 yards and then passed to Clemens on the 24-yard line. The Webfoots braced and stopped this drive but Dave Davis came in for Warburton and starting on his own 23-yard line, found a hole at tackle and ran 77 yards for another touchdown. The fifth touchdown was scored when Maurice Van Vleet, finding deep in his own territory to pass, was rushed and let a hurried toss go. The ball bounded into the arms of Al Cunningham on the ten-yard line and it was no chore for him to trot over the goal line. Southern California was penalized for holding on the try for point and had to try it again, this time without success from the 17-yard line.

**First Downs Equal**  
Southern California, threatening throughout a dismal season to come into its own as an offensive power, displayed a smart drive today. The Trojans threw four and completed three passes today. The defense still left something to be desired but the maroon-clad lads seemed definitely on their way.

Although the team from Eugene made as many first downs as the winners—11 all—Southern California stopped the advance when Oregon seemed about to score on the Trojans for the first time in four years. As it was, the Trojans' excitement remained unblotted by the Webfoots.

It was the first time Southern California had played a home game in the rain in ten years. The heavy track did not seem to inconvenience the players, only two fumbles marring the play and one of these resulted from a bad pass.

nel consists of 17 republicans and 13 democrats, but the action of two of the republicans, Peter Zimmerman and W. E. Burke, is uncertain. It is being reported they were for the democratic aspirant, A. C. Dickson. Against these two, the Portland republican is known to have at least two democratic votes reasonably certain.

The recent action of Earl Hill in throwing his support to Representative John Coater is believed to have assured the democrat of election as speaker of the lower house. Thus the set-up at the next legislature probably will be a democrat governor and speaker with a republican senate president.

Governor-elect Martin has indicated he will have a definite program of legislation to be submitted to the legislature in January and republican legislators have decided to assist this democratic program before giving any consideration to a program. Thus, if the democratic party formulates a program, it is assured of every consideration in the coming legislature and as things stand now it is likely the program offered by the Oregon Bourbon party will have little trouble going through unless it is of such nature that the republican members of the legislature feel it is patently unsafe.

**Revenue Measure Due**  
Of greatest importance in the coming legislature will be revenue measures designed to bolster the financial status of Oregon. All revenue and taxation measures must originate in the lower house and with the house predominantly democratic, it naturally follows that the democratic program probably can be pushed through that department. Incidentally, the set-up in the house has changed as of

ficial counts revealed that instead of a 37 to 23 majority, the democrats actually scored a 38 to 22 majority. While the republicans possess the majority in the senate, the democratic program will not likely be blocked there, in the opinion of Senator Wheeler, who returned to Eugene Saturday after attending session of the state emergency committee, of which he is a member.

**Tax Relief Plan Likely**  
"If the democrats can formulate a program, there is little doubt but that it will go through the legislature and the democratic party can thus accept credit for what is done," Senator Wheeler said.

So far there is little indication as to what sort of a program will be presented. Rumor has it the Portland Realty Board, sponsors of the 20-mill tax limitation measure, which went down to ignominious defeat at the hands of the voters recently, may sponsor some plan for property tax relief, possibly similar in some respects to the 20-mill measure.

As the Lane county democrat, C. F. Hyde, was elected to the legislature on his campaign for this measure, it is believed he may take an active part in such legislation if it is forthcoming. There is not definite enough information on this matter yet to determine whether it will be part of the regular democratic program.

**Knox Law Due For Shot**  
Since everyone is awaiting announcement of the democratic program, few legislative measures have been discussed to date. However, the perennial dispute over automobile license fees, drivers' license fees is expected to appear and it also is rumored that an attempt will be made to take the motor vehicle department away from the secretary of state's office and create a new department to handle this work.

**Ski Jump Will Be Constructed By Skyline Club**  
BEND, Ore., Nov. 17.—(AP)—A ski hill designed as a duplicate of the famous ski jump at Lake Placid, New York, is planned by the Skyline club, central Oregon outdoor organization, with assistance from the forest service.

The slope of the north face of the cinder butte, 10 miles south of here, offers a site for a hill of the dimensions of the Lake Placid jump, and no trouble will be required.

The ski track will be gouged out of the side of the mountain, with the skiers sliding down a trench to the take-off and sailing down over another broad trench to a fan-shaped landing area.

The landing area is in a natural amphitheater, on the side of which thousands of people can view the ski jumpers, from the take-off to the finish.

Plans for construction of a Lava Butte ski course second to none in the Pacific northwest does not mean that the Skylineers are to abandon their winter playground in the McKenzie foothills, west of Sisters, Sam C. Steele, president of the organization, reported.

The Skylineers, one of the largest outdoor organizations in the northwest, has 223 active members.

## GLEEMEN CONCERT TICKET SALE NOW STARTED IN CITY

The house to house canvass of the city to sell tickets for the annual Gleemen winter concert, December 9, is underway in full swing by members of the Welfare League.

The League is sponsoring the Gleemen in the concert, all proceeds from the program to go to carry on the work the League is doing for the needy of Eugene and Lane county. The League hopes to realize enough from the concert that another benefit will not be necessary this year.

Following the house to house canvass tickets will go on sale downtown just preceding the concert. Mrs. W. H. Chapman, Mrs. C. D. Donahue, and Mrs. George Schaefer are the general committee in charge for the concert from the League. The League membership of 40 has been divided up into teams to conduct the ticket sale.

This will be the first home appearance of the Gleemen for the season and an exceptionally fine program is being arranged for the concert according to John Stark Evans, director. The Gleemen each season bring out the largest concert crowds of the year here.

This is the second year the Welfare League has sponsored the chorus in concert.

The League was organized Dec. 2, 1930, with the purpose of carrying on work of a civic and charitable nature. The League is anxious to stress the fact that it does not duplicate the work of any other charitable organization, but makes an effort to help those people who are not able to be helped by the organizations, but are in dire need of assistance.

The League is composed of 40 members, and each member is required to give a minimum of six hours time monthly. In addition to the thousands of hours given in time, there has been a total of \$3,018 spent for charity by the league. There are absolutely no salaries of any kind paid to members of the Welfare League—everything given by its members is gratis.

The projects which have been sponsored by the League are a sewing school, which is conducted every Thursday morning for the purpose of assisting people in making new clothing, and remodeling things which they all ready have, and where used clothing is also distributed, the well-baby clinic, which is held every other Wednesday morning. Through the cooperation of the local medical society there is a doctor in attendance at the clinics, and parents who would otherwise be unable to have a competent source from which to receive advice regarding the problems of keeping their children healthy and strong are given this opportunity through the Welfare League.

League members contact many families in Eugene who are in need of particular help, and make every effort to give them every possible assistance. At the present time the League is sponsoring two children in the development room for handicapped children at Roosevelt high school, and it is the group's intention to do more towards this work if the proceeds from the Gleemen's concert are sufficient to allow it to do so. The League has also made cash donations to many worthy causes, such as the Waverly Baby home in Portland, which has an average of between 15 and 20 children from Lane county, the second largest enrollment in Oregon.

Through cooperation with the State Tuberculosis society the Welfare League first brought the school nurse to Eugene, and until this year when the school board is standing all expenses of this position, paid one third of her salary and expenses. Every year the Welfare League has undertaken an extensive Christmas program. Boxes of food, clothing, toys and little things which go to make a cheerful Christmas have been distributed to families who might otherwise have not had any Christmas at all.

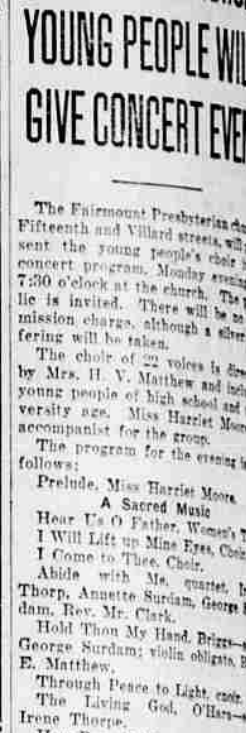
