

# PROBE OF FASCIST DICTATORSHIP PLOT WILL BE PUSHED

chief's reported charges that he had been approached by Wall Street brokers to head an army of 500,000 former soldiers and others to march to Washington and seize control of the federal government.

Chairman John W. McCormick of the house committee promised a thorough investigation, saying "We are going to get to the bottom of this matter and we are going to call witnesses and records that will bring out the truth—whatever that may be."

Chairman McCormick and Rep. Samuel Dickstein, vice-chairman, heard General Butler for more than two hours yesterday and said later that Butler had repeated most of the statements attributed to him in a newspaper story in which details of the "plot" were given. Both members said General Butler made it clear he had flatly rejected all proposals made by the "Fascist" group.

The charge publicly stated by Butler's attorney that Butler's story was a publicity stunt came from MacGuire, the bond salesman, who was named by the former Marine corps head as the man who urged him to head the Fascist army. MacGuire testified before the committee after General Butler, and on leaving the committee hearing, denied the truth of Butler's charges.

"Our attitude is that it's all a joke, a publicity stunt by Butler," said MacGuire. "His statements are untrue. There never was such a plot. Anything he says must have been made up out of whole cloth, out of his own mind."

Colonel Grayson M. P. Murphy, head of the brokerage house employing MacGuire, characterized the charges as "silly."

"Perfect Moonshine," General Hugh S. Johnson, former NRA administrator, commenting on a report that Butler had told friends in Philadelphia that Johnson was scheduled to be dictator, said:

"He had better be pretty careful. Nobody said a word to me about anything of the kind, and if they did I'd throw them out the window. I know nothing about it."

Thomas W. Lamont, partner in the firm of J. P. Morgan & Co., informed of a report that the Morgan firm was involved in the plot, said: "Perfect Moonshine! Too unutterably ridiculous to comment upon." Butler's testimony was reported to have been that MacGuire approached him last summer and told him the financial backers of the movement had subscribed \$5,000,000 "to lay on the line" and could raise another \$50,000,000 if need be.

# Building Campaign Headquarters Will Be Opened Shortly

With campaign headquarters for the better homes campaign here scheduled to be ready for occupancy in one week, plans are being laid for an open house at which the public will be invited to inspect the location in the Bank of Commerce building, it was announced Wednesday following a meeting of the executive committee of the campaign. The open house will be held in about two weeks.

Graham Smith, local architect, has been engaged to draw plans for the headquarters room which will be located in the north side of the building. The rear of the room will consist of panels, each one with a special design for the purpose of demonstrating what can be done along this line.

In the rear of the room will be space to committee meetings and other gatherings in connection with the campaign. Committee plans to designate certain days upon which different phases of the building industry will have a display showing their wares.

In order to raise funds to pay expenses of the office and other campaign costs, it was decided to publish a directory of the building trades industry of this city.

It was reported the canvass of the county, for the purpose of determining what renovation and new building may be done, was making good progress with nine men at work in Eugene three in Springfield and one in Junction City. These canvassers have been authorized to take pledges of work that will be done.

The publicity committee of the campaign will meet at the Del Ray cafe Thursday noon at 12:30 o'clock.

# JAPANESE REFUSE TO MODIFY DEMAND

examiners to make a report on their findings. Other creditors were presented from filing similar suits by a temporary restraining order issued by Federal Judge John P. Barnes. The circuit court suits asked a determination of who are creditors and details of the alleged unsatisfied liabilities.

Notable Hold Stock Both bills set forth that the loan was made the Central Republic Bank and Trust company, which subsequently merged with the City National Bank and Trust company, following Dawes' resignation from the RFC chairmanship.

The bank borrowed \$30,000,000 June 29, 1932, and \$50,000,000 Oct. 6, 1932. The unpaid balance, with accrued interest, totals \$90,000,000, the suits allege. Dawes resigned June 6, 1932. Considerable amounts of stock were said to be held by Greek merchants in Chicago. Other stockholders were said to include: Ruth Hanna McCormick Simms; John Barton Payne; John W. O'Leary, former president of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce; and Gilbert Porter, attorney for Samuel Insull.
