

# FAMOUS SCULPTOR DESCRIBES "DREAM MUSEUM" IN TALK

A "dream museum" which turned out to be a practical suggestion for art appreciation for every campus or community in the country, was described Monday night by Lorado Taft, famous American sculptor, who addressed a large and enthusiastic audience of University of Oregon students, faculty and townspeople.

Mr. Taft's "dream museum" would simply be a carefully lighted room of great works of art, well arranged repository for such a collection, he pointed out, could be ennobled for a fraction of what just one original would cost.

As important as the collection itself would be the way in which it would be arranged and managed, Mr. Taft said. The casts should be arranged in historical order, kept clean and neat, and particular attention paid to lighting effects. An orderly arrangement, he pointed out, would make it possible for people to view the objects systematically, and thus avoid "museum fatigue" which so often arises from trying to see a great deal in a disorganized place.

A museum such as he described would not only develop art appreciation on the part of students and others, but would be of great aid in encouraging those who aspired to be artists. Mr. Taft said, since he bears a genuine love for the beautiful in sculpture, Mr. Taft was particularly emphatic on lighting and position of art objects. With slides he illustrated how the effect sought by the artist could be ruined by placing a statue in a poor light. His illustrations also depicted the development and growth of art from early times.

There is nothing more to say about "One Night of Love" at the Heilig. Adjectives ordinarily employed are entirely inadequate in describing any musical achievement so far above the ordinary. Thousands of Eugeneans are describing it as the finest picture they have ever seen, musical or otherwise. Grace Moore, the famed opera star, sings the lead, while Tullio Carminati does his finest work in the male lead.

## 125 Pound Tumor Is Taken From Negress

DALLAS, Texas, Nov. 21.—(AP)—One of the largest tumors known to medical science was removed today from the abdomen of Sophie Johnson, 350 pound negress. The operation was considered a success and, if the patient withstands the shock, surgeons said she probably will recover.

Originally, the giant growth weighed 125 pounds but by drainage during the last few weeks its size was reduced to about 70 pounds.

The negress was on the operating table for almost three hours.

Loading was continued with three gangs.

The measure provides for "controlled expansion of the currency and immediate payment to veterans of the face value of their adjusted service certificates."

## Kingfish Says He's Going Out West On "Late" Honeymoon

BATON ROUGE, La., Nov. 20.—(AP)—United States Senator Huey P. Long, Louisiana's political dictator, who plans to run for president in 1936 on a third party ticket, announced today he was leaving for the west on a honeymoon that will be 21 years and 7 months late.

"I'm going so far," the "Kingfish" said, "it will take a \$10 postage stamp to reach me. We're going out west." Indicating he was through for a while with lawmaking and campaigning, which have kept him on the go since he returned to Louisiana from congress last summer, the "Kingfish" declared he and Mrs. Long would leave tomorrow.

"Mrs. Long and I never had a honeymoon and we're going to have one now," Long said. "I'm fulfilling a promise I made."

"I'm getting out of Louisiana," said the "Kingfish" making no secret of his plans to run for president on the strength of his creation of a model state out of Louisiana with the powers of his dictatorship.

# OREGON BAR WILL STUDY CHARACTER OF ALL APPLICANTS

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Nov. 21.—(AP)—A step designed to make the legal profession of Oregon "the guardian of the liberties and rights of our people," was announced here today by Circuit Judge James T. Brand, newly-elected president of the Oregon State Bar association.

Judge Brand revealed he had appointed Will H. Marsters of Portland, chairman of the committee which will investigate the character of every applicant for admission to the Oregon bar, and will recommend against the admission of anyone found not to possess the required character. Other members of this committee are John C. Kendall and Thomas G. Greene, also of Portland.

The Marshfield jurist said the bar association is fully cognizant of the fact that those who need the aid of an attorney must depend as much on his character as on his learning, and that the group would make every effort to safeguard the interests of its clientele.

Candidates for admission to the bar of Oregon will have every opportunity for a fair examination and full hearing, Judge Brand said. The name of anyone in question will not be revealed until such time as the supreme court proceeds to determine the worthiness of applicants.

The new plan under which candidates are to be thoroughly investigated has been established with the aid of the supreme court, Judge Brand revealed. The high court will order a hearing whenever this is considered necessary.

## Real "Husky" Is Given Fraternity

A real husky pup, who has the distinction of having been born in the center of one of the volcanoes in the famed Valley of Ten Thousand Smokes on the Aleutian islands, has been presented to Kappa Sigma fraternity of the University of Oregon for a mascot. The pup is now quartered on the Latourette farm near Oregon City.

The dog is one of seven that was born on the last expedition of the noted Father Hubbard, who has spent much of his time exploring the Valley of Ten Thousand Smokes. The men drew straws for choice of the pups and George Getty, who presented the dog to the fraternity, won first choice and "Athen," as the husky has been named.
