

SAFECRACKERS ARE IDENTIFIED AS PAIR WANTED BY TEXAS

Hawkins ducked his head and the hammer struck him a glancing blow on the chin. Before Hawkins could get back into the scrap, the two bandits had escaped through the door, entered a car bearing a Texas license, parked on Oak street with a third man at the wheel, and roared off into the night.

Window Thought Broken
Hardisty chased the two men through the door in time to see the car start and throw a heavy object at the rear window of the car, a sedan. City police, state police and Sheriff C. A. Swartz and one of his deputies hurried to the scene and commenced investigations. They found the combination of the safe had been knocked off and said the yeggs undoubtedly would have got the safe open shortly if the two employees had not interfered. Entry to the store was made by prying open a window on the Oak street side.

Near the safe officers found a steel punch which had been used to punch out the combination. Another employee of the Carlson, Hutton and Hay establishment, remembered seeing the same punch to two men earlier in the day.

Checks Discarded
Officers said the men probably entered the store, purchased the tool and while doing so, looked over the situation.

Safes at the New Service laundry at 830 High street, and the S. H. Finegan shop on High street had been opened in the same manner attempted at Carlson's place, police said.

At the laundry the handi obtained \$30.00 in cash and took from the safe payroll checks amounting to \$550. The checks were found later at the rear of the laundry, thrown into a corner.

At the Finegan plant the yeggs obtained \$27.10 in cash and \$30 in checks, which they will not be able to cash, officers said.

The Valley Chevrolet company plant was entered sometime during the night, the intruders entering the parts department where they obtained several parts, police said. It was not believed this job was perpetrated by the same group.

May Be Wanted in Texas
One of the yeggs is believed to be Robert Lee Pringle, wanted by the United States postoffice department for holding up and robbing a star route mail carrier near Newburg, Tex. June 4, 1934. The government is offering a reward of \$2000 for his arrest.

Grant Treat, special deputy sheriff at Florence, who was in Eugene Thursday, remembered that he had a circular containing the picture of the Texas holdup and suggested the possibility that he might be one of the men who entered the Carlson, Hutton & Hay store. Sheriff Swartz took his copy of the picture to the store and Hawkins and Hardisty, who had the struggle with the burglars, identified the picture as being that of one of them. The sheriff and a state police officer also took the picture to the Midway auto park, where the yeggs stayed Wednesday and they, too, were quite positive in their identification.

CHANGES FORECAST
NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—(AP)—A merging of the most liberal self-control code features of the national recovery act and the least stringent provisions of the anti-trust laws under a new super-board to guide business has been envisioned as the logical successor of the national recovery administration by Donald R. Richberg, executive director of the National Recovery council.

Speaking before the convention of the Associated Grocery Manufacturers of America last night, the man usually considered as the president's first assistant, urged creation of a new federal body to combine the most needed functions of the NRA and the federal trade commission to advise and control the American business world, less hampered by legislation.

Flexibility Stressed
The first principle of permanent NRA legislation, he said, should be "to preserve the flexibility of code making" so that industries themselves could establish the conditions best suited to their success and themselves eliminate rigid standards that would be unfair in their uniformity.

Richberg said that for the future NRA the advisability of fixing minimum wages and maximum hours had been demonstrated, provided they were left flexible and subject to improvement by collective bargaining.

The new setup as foreseen by Richberg also would contain the proscription of "admittedly dishonest business practices," the national collection of trade statistics; and the maintenance of fair competition by the restraints imposed by the anti-trust laws, relieved by the principle of natural competition.

RATE HERE 50 CENTS

Relief workers have always been paid a minimum wage of 50 cents an hour, according to Earl Drew, Lane county manager of the SERA, this being the prevailing wage paid laborers during the past few years. Mr. Drew went to Portland Thursday afternoon to confer with members of the state relief committee and expected to obtain further information as to the wage scale.
