

JAPANESE ADOPT LARGEST BUDGET FOR ARMY, NAVY

ed in vain to keep the defense appropriations within the limits of the current budget.

The navy was given 530,000,000 yen and the army 490,000,000. Details of the defense allotments were not revealed. The navy had demanded 171,000,000 yen for new ships, 70,000,000 for their maintenance, 44,000,000 for modernization of warships, 34,000,000 for expansion and maintenance of the air force and 15,000,000 yen for new weapons.

Major army requests were 101,000,000 yen for new weapons and munitions, and 70,000,000 for expansion of the air force.

In a broadcast to patriotic organizations of the country Koki Hirota, foreign minister, referred today to "the absurd limitations imposed by the Washington and London naval treaties" and said Japan "is anxious" because of them.

Japan, he said, would abolish capital ships if the other powers would agree.

U. S., BRITAIN AGREE

LONDON, Nov. 23. — (AP) — An authoritative source stated today that the United States delegation to the preliminary naval conversations have virtually abandoned hope of reaching a naval agreement, at least for the present, with Great Britain and Japan.

Although the conversations will continue, it was said that the Americans feel that there is no possibility of a compromise agreement being reached. The United States delegates believe that the next step will be a denunciation of the Washington treaty of 1922, forcing the five signatories of that treaty—the United States, Great Britain, Japan, France and Italy—to start from scratch in a consideration of the idea of naval limitation.

U. S., Britain Agree

The Americans expect to be home by Christmas.

The British and American delegations agreed between themselves today to insist on the continuance of the principles of the Washington naval treaty of 1922.

The representatives of the United States and Great Britain met together and decided to insist on the continuation of the principles of the Washington treaty, the third party to the conversations, for a further explanation of why the Asiatic empire thinks it should have as large a navy as either the United States or Great Britain.

Equality Grant Out

Both the Anglo-Saxon delegations made it clear that they had no intention whatsoever of granting Japan the tonnage equality which she demands.

(Under the Washington treaty of 1922 Great Britain, the United States and Japan agreed that the first two nations should have navies equally large while Japan's navy could be 60 per cent as big as either of the others. This ratio 5-5-3 ratio is the fundamental principle of the Washington treaty and one to which the Japanese object as inequitable, Japan claiming the need of as large a battle fleet as the other two nations.)

meeting it was stated that no common front had been decided upon on any formal basis that the delegations were equally opposed to the Japanese demands.

Reduction Hope Held

The meeting was attended by Norman H. Davis and Ray Atherton, counselor of the American embassy, for the United States and by Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald and Sir John Simon, foreign secretary for Great Britain.

Despite the deadlock in the negotiations, the British and United States representatives said they were far from abandoning hope that some sort of an agreement for reduction of naval armaments by the three great sea powers might be reached.

Although realizing fully the difficulties they indicated they hoped that the Japanese would make concessions from their demands for outright equality.

Russian Air Fleet First

The war budget voted today is nearly 300,000,000 francs less than that of last year, but there was no emergency appropriation then such as that granted today. Last year's war budget was 5,974,188,000 francs (at that time approximately \$358,000,000). Navy and air budgets are separate matters from that of war.

"The Russian air fleet is the first in the world," Archimbaud said. "Ours comes next. We may be trailing for the moment with the understanding between the two countries."

He declared he had no wish to alarm the country, but that he was merely presenting "facts and figures."

"Russia has a strong and well-equipped army which she offers us in case of conflict with Germany," stated Archimbaud. "Reischguthner, Hitler of Germany does not observe the (Versailles) Treaty."

Old System Returns

"Russia gave us the first warning and an understanding is arranged between us."

working, well coached Eugene aggregation in the conclusion of a season spotted by only one defeat.

The tilt will be more than a football game between two teams. It will be a battle between two student bodies, two groups of alumni, and the many Eugene fans whose lines of division are sharply drawn. The fight will be entirely on the gridiron, and in the stands and after the game only good sportsmanship will be in evidence. But the rivalry is none the less keen.

On a basis of past scores and comparative performance, the big Purple team coached by Fritz Kramer will go into the game a heavy favorite. Eugene has lost but one game. University high has dropped several. But, like the Oregon-Oregon State clash and the Yale-Princeton battle, pre-game dops means little and the breaks of the game are apt to be the deciding factor.

Eugene will have a slight weight advantage over the University high eleven, both in the line and in the backfield. With the field promising to be wet, this will give Eugene a substantial edge. Downtown betting odds will favor the Purple by nearly 3 to 1. But fans may rest assured they'll see a football battle and no walkover.

The coaches have announced their starting line-ups. For Eugene, Walls and Wright will start at end, and will be opposed by Booth and Captain Don Brace for University high. Loomis and Smith will hold the Purple tackle berths, against Jensen and Rush for the Golden Tide. Swindell and Mehl have been named as guards by Kramer, with Taylor and Art Soward slated to oppose them.

Kenny Bowser will be at center for Eugene, against Fred Booth for University high. The Eugene backfield combination will be made up of Warner at quarter, the diminutive, snake-hipped speed artist, Lloyd Malos, at left half, Doc Taylor at right half, and Ernie Robertson at full.

To match this combination Jean Eberhart will have Mountain, last of the famed Mountain brothers, at quarter; Rex Soward, spark plug of the University high attack, at left half; Ray Soward at right half; and Bob Goodpasture, line-smashing full-back, in that position.

Eugene will have an advantage in substitutes, with nearly twice the reserves the campus club can put on the field. Officials have been selected, with Bill Goodwin as referee, Stan Summers as umpire and Aus Colbert in the head-linesman assignment.

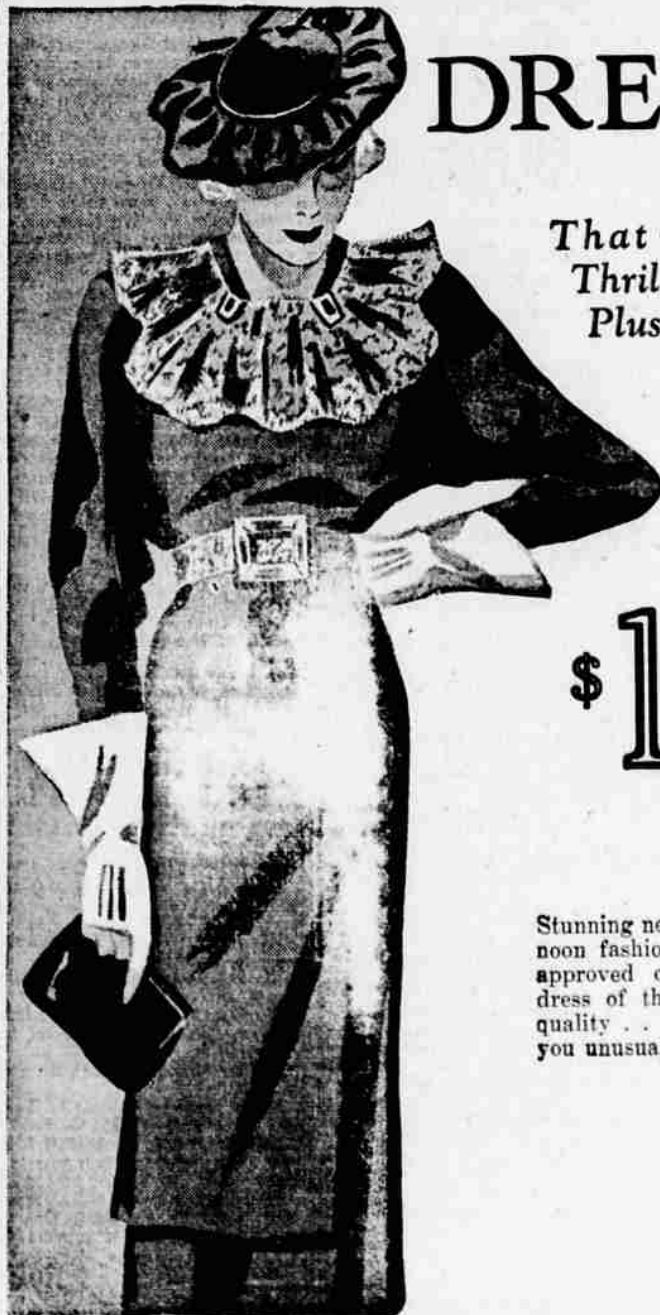
