Friends planning on sending cooked foods or other supplies are asked to call us at 2069 a. m. than we may make our plans accordingly, and prepare, from these donations, our dinner for 150 to 200 individuals. Some small cash donations are needed also to buy needed articles which are not donated. We trust our friends will aid us in our efforts to bring some cheer to the less fortunate ones of Eugene. There will be a special Thanksgiving service in the hall in the evening at 8 o'clock. A special speaker is expected for this meeting."

Men of the transient camp are to be given a good wholesome meal, but turkey is not on the menu, according to L. F. Koch, superintendent at the camp.

Several other church services will mark the day. St. Mary's Catholic church is to have mass at 8 a. m. St. Mary's Episcopal church will hold its Thanksgiving communion at 10 a. m.

The killer's body was found Clegg kept the fact a secret for hours, even from Chicago detectives and suburban police who in mid-afternoon still had no word officially of the gruesome discovery.

Meanwhile Coroner's juries at Elgin and Chicago had returned verdicts of murder in the deaths of Federal Agents Samuel P. Cowley and Herman E. Hollis, and recommended that the government and other authorities seek the killers—presumably Nelson and his companions.

To Nelson had been attributed the murder of three operatives of the department of justice: Hollis, Cowley, and W. Carter Baum, the latter shot down at close range in the sensational nocturnal break from a trap set around the Little Bohemia resort in Wisconsin last spring.

As Cowley lay dying in an Elgin hospital last night Melvin H. Purvis, chief of the Chicago division of investigation, had turned away grimly and said:

"It's the last thing I do, I'll get Nelson."

But he had no need. The bullets of the slain officers themselves had achieved partial revenge.

It was evident the other man and woman, still unidentified, had stripped off Nelson's outer garments to probe the gangster's wounds, then dumped the body out and tossed the clothes aside.

The body—stomach, legs and chest torn with 17 bullets—was taken to a Niles Center undertaking parlor whose proprietor was sworn to secrecy and not until 3 p. m. did he admit holding the remains of American's public enemy No. 1.

in range of air attacks from the continent.

"It is useless to move arsenals and factories to the west coast," he said. "We must face the peril where we stand."

Pending some radical new discovery, he declared, the only practical measure of defense was the ability to inflict as much damage to the enemy as he could inflict on Britain.

He advocated the maintenance, regardless of cost, for the next ten years, of an air force substantially stronger than that of Germany.

"The Germans are mostly friendly," he added. "There is no reason to think they will attack us. But under the Nazi regime the decision of only a handful of men is required to launch an attack without notice."

Germany is illegally building an air force, in contravention of the Treaty of Versailles, he charged. At the end of 1935 the German air force would be nearly 50 per cent stronger than Britain's, and in 1937, he asserted, it would be double the strength of the British.

Turkey Gizzards Yield \$6 In Gold

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 28.—(AP)—Buyers were wondering whether to stake out gold claims on turkey shipments here today after one restaurant man found 86 worth of nuggets in the gizzards of two holiday birds.

Thanksgiving Is Proclaimed By F-D

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The president's proclamation is reprinted here by request):

"I, Franklin D. Roosevelt, president of the United States of America, hereby designate Thursday, the 29th day of November, 1934, as a day of Thanksgiving for the people of the nation.

"Thus to set aside in the autumn of each year a day on which to give thanks to Almighty God for the blessings of life is a wise and reverent custom, long cherished by our people. It is fitting that we should again observe this custom.

"During the past year we have been given courage and fortitude to meet the problems which have confronted us in our national life. Our sense of social justice has deepened. We have been given vision to make new provisions for human welfare and happiness, and in a spirit of mutual happiness we have co-operated to translate vision into reality.

"More greatly have we turned our hearts and minds to things spiritual. We can truly say, 'What praiseth it a nation if it gain the whole world and lose its own soul.'

"With gratitude in our hearts for what has already been achieved, may we, with the help of God, dedicate ourselves anew to work for the betterment of mankind.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done in the city of Washington this fifth day of November in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and thirty-four and of the independence of the United States of America the one hundred and fifty-ninth."

(Signed) "FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT."
