Chicago Grain Goes Up Like Skyrocket

CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Skyrocketing of grain prices to a new height of \$1.10 a bushel delivered in some sections helped to whirl the Chicago corn market up 8 cents today.

Other grains were swept steeply aloft with corn. To the surprise of the trade, no grain deliveries of any consequence were made on December contracts in the leading North American market today. It had been expected that liberal amounts of at least wheat and rye would be delivered.

Corn closed at the day's top, 1-8@9 cents above yesterday's finish, May 91@91 1-8, wheat firm 1 cent 1 1/2 up, May 90 5-8@3-4, oats 1-1-8@1 1-5-8 advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 35 cents.

STOCKS INACTIVE BUT PRICES HOLD UP FAIRLY WELL

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—(AP)—The stock market moved over into December today without displaying any notable strength or weakness. Some of the Alcohols and Amusements were in moderate demand, as was a few of the Rails and Specialties. The close was steady. Transfers approximated 440,000 shares.

The firmness of various theatrical equities was generally attributed to improved attendance which better appears at this time of year. Better business for the distilleries, which is supposed to accompany the holidays, drew attention to this group.

Several of the Rails showed a mildly better tone as gossip was heard by the administration for co-ordination of the transportation industry upward. Means of aiding the harrassed carriers.

Most market analysts continued to be favorably inclined toward stocks as a whole, although it was pointed out that technical dips and rallies can be expected from time to time notwithstanding the long-term trend may be upward.
