

ULM SEARCHERS UNABLE TO FIND TRACE OF PLANE

commercial trans-Pacific flying venture.

Twenty-four naval seaplanes were serviced during the night and made ready for a dawn takeoff to search an area within 300 miles of the Archipelago. The exact location of the luckless adventurers was not known.

Think Plane Sunk
A possibility the ill-fated plane or its passengers had been found during the night by one of the Japanese fishing boats was mentioned by officials here. In such case there was little chance of its being known until the fishing fleet returned, as few of the boats have wireless equipment.

Commander E. W. Todd said he doubted if the plane still were afloat. "When a plane comes down on the water, it comes down hard," he said. "When a land plane hits the water it probably turns turtle. Although radio reports seemed to indicate the plane was upright when it landed yesterday, after it landed there still is danger of its becoming water logged and sinking."

"If an ordinary land plane is forced down we would assume that it might float perhaps half an hour, if lucky and conditions favorable, a while longer."

international treaty was secured, controlling that traffic. It was signed by the United States.

"During eight years from 1925 to 1933 its ratification was held up by the senate and probably is yet."

"That ratification was incessantly advocated by President Coolidge and myself and by Secretaries Kellogg and Stimson."

"As late as Jan. 10, 1933, I again urged its ratification and called the attention of the senate to the fact that it had now been ratified by a large number of other nations and that its failure of adoption in the world was largely because of the failure of the United States."

"I further recommended that pending the ratification of the treaty they should give immediate and further authority to the president to control such traffic from the United States."

"I am preparing to recommend to the legislature," Martin continued, "a program based upon the desire expressed, and further to enlist the cooperation of citizens and groups, without reference to politics, both to find facts that relate to our resources, and put into action procedure necessary to their development and use."

"Our embarking upon a program of this kind at the outset of my administration," Martin concluded, "constitutes my recognition of the responsibility that rests upon the state to provide for its people those conditions most conducive to security and happiness."

"In taking this position in behalf of Oregon, I am acting in harmony with the broad program laid down for the nation by Franklin D. Roosevelt."

Cornmeal Mush
Moisten a cupful of cornmeal with enough cold water to make it into a paste. Stir this paste into a quart of salted, boiling water and cook, beating it hard and often for an hour at least. If mush becomes too stiff, add from time to time more boiling water.

It is nice for lunch in the evening to be eaten with milk or syrup. Left-over mush can be used by slicing and frying for breakfast.—Miss Grace Gallagher, R. 1, Eugene.

Holiday Shortcake
1 cup cornmeal
1 cup flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1 cup milk
2 tablespoons melted Crisco.

Mix dry ingredients. Add egg beaten with milk. Beat briskly. Add melted Crisco. Beat again. Bake in large shallow muffin tins, in hot oven 20 minutes. Break each in half. Cover lower halves with creamed turkey. Replace tops.

Creamed turkey: Melt 3 tablespoons Crisco in saucepan. Stir in 6 table-

spoons flour slowly. Add 2 cups milk and 1 cup meat gravy slowly. Stir. Add 1 teaspoon salt. Bring slowly to boil. Add 1 1/2 cups diced turkey. (Left over chicken is delicious, too).—Ester S. Miller, Goshen.

Simons, Du Pont Washington representative, to his company, reporting on a conversation he had with Allen W. Dulles, chief of the department's Near Eastern division.

The letter said in reference to manufacture and export of explosives from Germany in violation of the treaty:

"Mr. Dulles said he was well aware of this and that he was also aware that powder and other munitions were continually shipped out of Germany with the connivance of the allies since the resulting sales of munitions swelled the reparation fund."

Irene Du Pont, on the witness stand, took issue with Vandenberg for placing blame on the Nobel company. He characterized it as "frank nonsense" to blame munitions manufacturers for not enforcing the treaty when the governments concerned undoubtedly had the same information the companies had.

"Certainly the British government knew all about this situation," Du Pont said. "It seems to me you should question them about why they didn't act."

Vandenberg agreed that the British knew of the matter and referred to a confidential government report prepared in 1926 and distributed in allied governmental circles.

He is survived by three children, Mrs. Hazel Gooding of Portland, Mrs. Eva Monday of Washington, and Leonard Doidge of Junction City; 14 grandchildren, a brother, Warren of Junction City; five sisters, Edith, Ella and Maud Doidge, Mrs. Blanche Marguerite of Harrisburg and Mrs. Clarissa Mauldin, of Junction City.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock from the Miller chapel with Rev. W. B. Empey officiating. Interment will be in the Monroe cemetery.
