

HERMIT CAPTURED, ADMITS MURDER IN CURRY WILDERNESS

DIFFICULT HUNT ENDED

GOLD BEACH, Ore., Dec. 6.—(P)—The search for the strange hermit of the Coast Range mountains in Curry county has ended.

Hugo Mayer, elderly eccentric, sought in connection with the slaying of Josephine Fantz, was captured in the rugged backwoods of the Rogue river country last night and was brought to jail here where he was held by Curry county officials on suspicion of murder.

Sheriff Fritz Smith is awaiting word from Josephine authorities and will take his prisoner there soon. The killing of Fantz took place in Josephine county, near the boundary line.

Smoke Gives Clue

Mayer's arrest ended one of the most exciting and difficult manhunts in this part of the country. For 30 years Mayer had ranged the thousands of acres of untracked rough terrain. He could out-travel any pursuer.

Mayer was captured at his cabin. He did not seem surprised when the officers challenged him, and offered no resistance. Five deer grazed in un-molested contentment in Mayer's garden.

At noon Tuesday Gold Beach officials were advised that smoke had been seen coming from a chimney at the Mayer cabin. Officers left immediately, journeying 40 miles up the Rogue river, and then making a hazardous ascent of the lower Illinois river. Mayer was not home when they reached his cabin. The officers rested until daylight but the man they sought did not appear until noon.

Portion of Seavey Road to Be Graveled

Thirty or more relief workers were at work on the Seavey hop yard road this week, according to P. M. Moras, county engineer, who was in that locality Thursday inspecting the work. This is an extension of the road on the north bank of the McKenzie east of Coburg.

Some of the road will be gravelled this winter, making it much smoother for traffic. This new road gives access to the J. W. Seavey hop yard without having to cross the ferry.

Car Dealer Here Given Fine of \$25

M. K. Herberger, local used car dealer, was fined \$25 in Justice of the Peace Dan Johnston's court Thursday on a charge of conducting a business of selling motor vehicles without a state license. State police made the arrest.

Herberger was directed to get his state license at a cost of \$35 and had to pay the costs of the action.

from broth and cut in small pieces. Add cornmeal to boiling broth, and cook about 10 minutes or till thick. Take out 1 cup of this meal and save till last. Add the onion chopped fine, meat, tomatoes, chili powder, salt and pepper. Mix well and put in greased pan with the 1 cup of meal spread smooth on top. Bake till golden brown and serve with catsup while hot.—Mrs. R. C. Rush, 1083 High St., Eugene.

Corn Dodgers

2 cups of meal
1 level tablespoon lard
1 scant teaspoon baking powder.
Sauté the meal with one cup boiling water, add lard, salt and baking powder, and thin with milk to a stiff batter. Dip hands into cold water and shape bread into small oblong pones, put on a greased hot skillet and bake in the oven until brown. The success of making corn dodgers depends largely upon the baking. The skillet should be very hot and well greased, and the dodgers should be cooked in a hot oven.—Mrs. Wolff L. Allen, Wendling.

Corn Bread

2 cups of cornmeal
1 cup of flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 cup sugar
2 cups sweet milk
3 eggs
1/2 teaspoon salt
Beat eggs and mix with sugar. Sift meal flour and baking powder and salt. Add milk and stir into a thick batter.—Mrs. John Swafford, Wendling.

had so many over-age ships on account of delay in replacements that the necessary building has been piling up, but in the future the United States will have a regular yearly program.

"If Great Britain or Japan lay down 15 to 20 ships each year," said the admiral, "nothing is thought about it; but when we do it, there is a sensation. From now on we will avoid that by regular replacement."

The American ambassador-at-large also announced for the first time that President Roosevelt has proposed "a substantial all-around reduction in naval armaments." Since no agreement to reduce has been reached, the envoy said, the United States strongly advocates continuing the Washington and London treaties with their assurance of "equality of security."

cerning a shipment of powder to Holland in 1929 for re-shipment to China. K. K. V. Casey, Du Pont company official, conceded his company knew the shipment was going to China. He said the advice of the state department was not sought because that department had no jurisdiction over shipments to Holland.

Testimony developed that the Du Ponts borrowed or rented a United States navy gun to test powder to be sold to China.

"We paid the costs," Casey said. "I think there is a law permitting this."

"It would be interesting to know," Clark observed, "And I think it is in the public interest to know whether munition makers have access to government equipment to make tests."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—(P)—The interstate commerce commission made no changes in the "Portland differential" on grain shipped from south of the Snake river in Oregon and Washington in its report of new tariffs issued following a lengthy investigation. The rates will remain the same as before the 1931 cut, which was subsequently cancelled.

It is one that is going to take more and more sacrifice from those who think they have sacrificed already, he continued. Those who make the big sacrifice will not be given medals but they will have the satisfaction of knowing they have helped in bringing back thousands of men and women to their rights of citizenship and to the right to live, he added.

There are 16 million buildings in serious condition of disrepair today, Mr. Bell said in quoting figures on the problem. Three million of this total by social and economic ratings are not worth another cent of expenditure on them. The remaining 13 million, however, are worth saving and need immediate reconditioning.

The better housing campaign will be a major factor in stabilizing values and in relieving the unemployment situation, the speaker pointed out. Many times we look back on the depression to think of the human wreckage, but there have been other things sacrificed, too. Stores, homes, offices, apartment houses, buildings of all kinds, have suffered, too; have been sadly neglected, Mr. Bell added.

An opportunity and a challenge face the American people to restore these values and to bring back to work the millions in the building, construction and allied businesses.

To meet this challenge in this way means the restoration of better business for all and a greatly augmented purchasing power, he pointed out. Congress and the president have accepted this challenge in the housing act. Credit was lacking but this gap has been aided through the federal government so that the plan is safe for any financial institution extending the needed loans, the speaker pointed out.

An interesting sidelight that has developed is the fact that out of every five remodeling jobs, only one actu-

a country. This group was composed of men and women who renounced Hungarian citizenship preparatory to becoming Yugoslavs. Hungary has thrown them out and Yugoslavia will not permit them to return. They are living in three trains stranded in "no man's land" at the Hungarian-Yugoslav frontier.

HUNGARY APPEALS TO LEAGUE

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Dec. 6.—(P)—The Hungarian government decided today to place before the league of nations the expulsion and alleged ill-treatment of hundreds of Hungarian citizens by Yugoslavia.

Government officials are already at Szeged and other frontier stations taking testimony of refugees concerning their summary ejection and alleged mistreatment.

So apprehensive is the government, however, the situation may lead to an open break with Yugoslavia all newspapers were instructed not to print anything about the number or condition of the refugees entering their homeland.

There has been tension between the countries since the assassination of King Alexander of Yugoslavia and the subsequent Yugoslav charge at Geneva that Hungary was involved in the crime.

A government spokesman said Hungary would be justified in expelling Yugoslav citizens living in this country but would not resort to this reprisal until the matter is aired at Geneva.
