

## MICKLE DECLARES QUALITY NEED IN DAIRY BUSINESS

county. He emphasized the necessity of cooperation throughout the study of the problem and urged dairymen to give suggestions that the business men might follow to further the industry's development in Lane county.

### Improvements Urged

Suggestions for the industry were new plants such as condensing plants, cheese manufacturing plants, etc.; the raising of dairy cattle to sell.

Mr. Mickle declared it his opinion that there were enough manufacturing institutions in the state at present and urged the support and improvement of these existing plants rather than the encouragement of more plants.

Another suggestion for the development of the industry was to have irrigated pastures for milk production during summer months. The discussion swung around to the Mr. Angel area and Mickle declared that that area was not better suited to the dairy industry than was Lane county. He declared their success was due to well organized producers, the high quality of their product and the efficiency of their cooperative creamery.

### Tariff No Protection

Discussing imported butter in this area, Mickle pointed out that New Zealand could law down butter here for 32 cents a pound, plus freight charges. The price of butter here now is 33 cents, thus, he pointed out, tariff charges of 14 cents per pound offered no protection to the local producers.

In his talk at the chamber forum at the Del Rey cafe, Mickle stressed the necessity for high quality product. "You can't sell 90 score butter in California," he said, "because the consuming public demands better butter. It must be 91 or better to enter this market."

In this connection, he mentioned scoring contests conducted by the Oregon State college, the results of which indicated that most of the butter being produced in Oregon was above 90 score.

### Market Demands Quality

"However," he said, "this is for fresh butter. Our real problem is to maintain our standard for butter that has been in cold storage since that is necessary in entering markets away from home. We must improve our butter in this respect."

To do this, he said, the state was conducting a campaign to improve cream quality. Mickle laid great stress on the necessity of working for a market in connection with working for more and better production.

"As any business man knows, you must have quality before you can find a market, and given quality, you must then build up your market."

He urged that in any campaign to better the dairy industry in Lane county, this matter of securing a market be kept foremost in the minds of the people in the campaign.

points of bayonets to leave their homes, often in the thick of night, often without any chance to take anything with them and were then marched under guard to the railroad stations. They did not even spare a 70-year-old man with an insane wife.

**Children Lose Parents**  
"Among the refugees are 80 babies. One thousand Hungarians have been expelled from the Baranya district, 1500 from Novisad and 1500 from Subotica."

Women mothered children of others having become separated from their own young. The plaintive wail of children, suffering from the cold, mingled with the sobs of men as the first thousand refugees spent last night on beds of straw and leaves. A Hungarian tradition regards it as a weakness for a man to weep at a funeral, but these men cried unrestrainedly over the loss of their homes.

## HUNGARY CHARGES ALEXANDER PLOT HATCHED IN U. S.

against Slovakia on the northern Hungarian frontier."

Criticizing Hungarian authorities for giving asylum to alleged terrorists, Benes said the forces which permit organization of gangs of terrorists seek to detach Croatia from Yugoslavia and Slovakia from Czechoslovakia.

"They seek to strike a blow at the historical development of Danubian Europe," he asserted.

Eckhardt's statements were in reply to direct accusations leveled against Hungary by Bogolyub Yevitch, Yugoslavia's foreign minister, who denounced the Hungarian government.

In answer, Eckhardt said the assassination was not organized in Hungary and that the assassin never lived in Hungary.

"The preparations for this crime," he declared, "must be attributed to a secret terrorist organization which had its headquarters in Yugoslavia. Alexander was condemned to death by Croats and terrorist organizations which existed outside Hungary."

"Croat newspapers spoke of this assassination and at Croat meetings in America, the death sentence passed on the king was pronounced."

The Hungarian added that the real cause of the crime was the internal situation in Yugoslavia.

### Political Plot Charged

He said Hungary wanted a revision of the treaty of Trianon but that she intended to get it by peaceful and not terrorist means.

He declared that the other members of the Little Entente—composed of Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, and Rumania—were backing Yugoslavia's charges, saying: "This is merely a political maneuver against Hungary."

This statement brought Nicholas Titulescu, foreign minister of Rumania, quickly to his feet in the packed council chamber with the declaration that, as the Little Entente had been attacked, it must have the right to defend itself.

"Ministers and kings may be assassinated," declared Titulescu, "but our right to defense cannot be stifled!"

He demanded that the council session be continued until next week.

## YOUNGSTOWN HELD SCENE

GENEVA, Dec. 7.—(P)—Asked to particularize his reference to an American connection with the assassination of King Alexander of Yugoslavia, Tibor Eckhardt, Hungarian representative to the League of Nations, made the following statement to the Associated Press today.

"I have information which I believe to be authentic that last summer in Youngstown, O., a big Croat meeting, attended by several thousands, was held at which a death sentence upon the king was announced and cheered. This fact was reproduced in Youngstown newspapers."

"At Buenos Aires, also last summer, a death sentence was announced and approved by a crowd of Croats. It seems that some kind of an executive council of Croat refugees meeting at Buenos Aires had dealt with this matter and had taken action favorable to the assassination."

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Dec. 7.—(P)—Newspaper reporters assigned to meetings of foreign-born residents here said today that several meetings of Croats had been held in the last year at which the possibility was

raised that King Alexander of Yugoslavia might be assassinated.

## Lee Schlesinger In South America, Father Announces

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7.—(P)—Lee Schlesinger, department store executive who disappeared at Portland, Ore., two years ago under circumstances indicating he drowned, is alive and "doing well" in South America, his father, B. F. Schlesinger, announced here today.

The father admitted members of his family had been in communication with his son for more than a year. Schlesinger vanished on the night of December 28, 1932. At 11:30 that night he left Vancouver Barracks, Washington, by automobile, presumably for his home.

His car was subsequently found in the Columbia river off a Vancouver dock. Dredging operations were performed in the river in a fruitless effort to recover the body. Although the father did not reveal where in South America his son is living it was reported Schlesinger has found employment in Buenos Aires and has invited his wife, the former Laura Calhoun Anderson, of Los Angeles, whom he met while they were students at Stanford university in 1917, to join him.

DES MOINES, Ia., Dec. 7.—(P)—The Brothers Baer offered a demonstration today of why they are the royal family of fisticuffs.

Max, heavyweight champion of the world, returned to active ring work last night to belabor Johnny Miller, Iowa light heavyweight, in a four-round exhibition, and young Buddy ran his professional knockout string to eight.

Entering the ring as a contestant for the first time since he whipped Primo Carnera last June for the title, Max was far too clever and powerful for Miller. Seconds before the end of the first round, the champion laced Miller with a terrific right that sent him reeling.

From then on Max paid little attention to the business of boxing, just clowning his way along. Miller tried to make a match of it for the champion, but he was hopelessly outweighed.

The fighters wore five ounce gloves. Baer weighed 224, Miller 180. Buddy wasted no time with big Red Fields of Des Moines. The 240 pound "kid" brother of the champion clipped Red after 50 seconds of the first round. Referee Alex Fidler awarded Buddy a technical knockout.

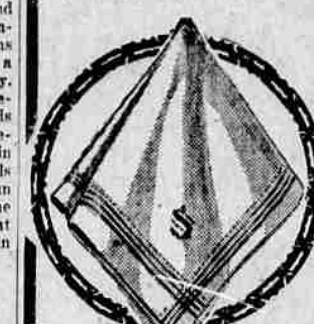

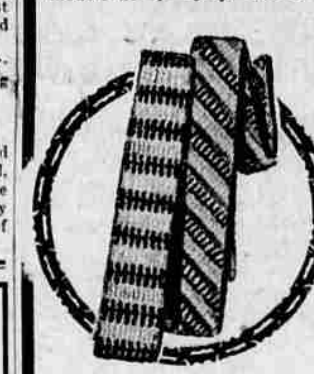

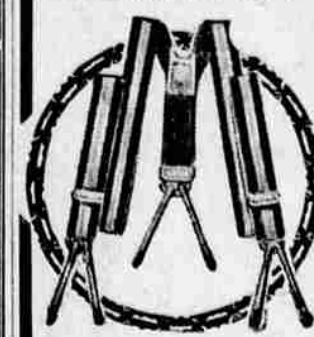
