ST. MARYS HOOPERS TO PLAY SATURDAY

St. Mary's high school basketball team will open the season on Saturday evening, Dec. 8th, at 8:00 p. m. against the Monroe high school basketball team in St. Mary's hall. This will be the Saints first opportunity to test their skill on the maple floor this year.

The Saints do not open their official basketball season until after the first of the year when they enter the "A" league contest with the seven "A" high schools of this district. During this month Father Carberry has scheduled a number of games against the "B" teams of Benton and Lin counties and a few independent teams in and around Eugene.

Father Carberry is uncertain as to his line-up for the first game of the season. Confronted with the serious problem of securing a center to replace the ability and fast pivot man, Walter Meyers of last year, the St. Mary's coach is worried. Height is a necessary quality in the modern basketball playing. St. Mary's high school has always been handicapped in this regard, having only one six foot player on their team in the past six years, namely John Koke. This year while St. Mary's will possibly have a heavier team than in preceding years, there is a real shortage in height.

not a single man on the team reaches five feet ten.

Nurre and Nolan, guards of last year's team, will open the season against the Monroe high school team tomorrow evening. Schoen, former forward, will have an opportunity of being shifted to center. This leaves the forward wall open to newcomers. A number of younger players, without any experience, are working hard to fit into these two positions. Federico, alternate of last year, will be given plenty of chance to work on this year's Saints' team.

Father Carberry cannot expect much from the Saints in their first game of the season, due to the fact that the students of St. Mary's opened their basketball practice only this week. Previous to that time the St. Mary's students were playing football.

Suit for \$404.03 damages was filed in circuit court Friday by the Great American Insurance company against J. J. McInty of Eugene on account of a collision between a truck owned by McInty and a car owned by Ora R. Bruce.
