

"DEHORN" DEATH TOLL REACHES 21; 4 DRUGGISTS HELD

which the hapless victims drank, to die later in terrible agony.

Detectives discovered the source of one drum of the poisoned alcohol today. It came from a wholesale paint company, they said; contained 15 per cent wood alcohol and was so deadly that a few ounces, mixed half and half with water, would kill a man in 12 hours. The wholesale company said it received an order from a drug store for five gallons of industrial alcohol and, not knowing to what use the product would be put, sent some of a double strength formula.

Nearly All Blinded

Sale of denatured alcohol, whole-sale and retail, is legal only as long as the seller does not distribute it as a beverage.

Besides the dead, a dozen or so others were in critical condition in hospitals where heroic treatment was being given to relieve them. Nearly all had been made blind by the drink.

Ordinary, denatured alcohol causes no serious consequence to those who by addiction have built up within their bodies a high tolerance against its poison. But there was no tolerance could withstand the deadly formaldehyde and methyl poison that was in the alcohol distributed to the north-end drinkers the past 30 hours. One veteran of what they call the "skid road," arrested 80 times in recent years for getting drunk on denatured alcohol, fell dead from the new poison.

Federals Join Case

The four men held in jail here, each under \$15,000 bond, were booked by police as: George Jacobs, 68; Charles Hadjeff, 42; Cornelius E. Dunn, 45; and Solomon Miller, 47. Each was charged with manslaughter and Captain Keegan said charges of second degree murder were being considered.

While hospitals were exercising every resource to save others from a violent death, city, county and state officials were joined by federal representatives today in an investigation. L. D. Hickman of the federal alcohol tax unit, and a special federal investigator from Seattle were representing the government.

Deputy United States attorneys here expressed doubt that any federal statutes had been violated in the sale of the poisoned alcohol. If any such violation is found, however, prosecution was promised.

State laws require that on each bottle of denatured alcohol, or "dehorn," as it is known among those who use it as a beverage, "Poison" label and the death's head must be affixed. The death's head, or skull and crossbones denoting poison is commonly referred to by the addicts as "the little queer fellow." Police say, further, that few "dehorn" drinkers will buy a bottle that does not bear the image of "the little queer fellow," for fear of getting a less potent intoxicant.

treasury's narcotic bureau, said the week-end raids in which the government seized peddlers, addicts, narcotics, equipment and automobiles, showed the need for more drastic laws against the evil. At present, the treasury acts under its taxing powers.

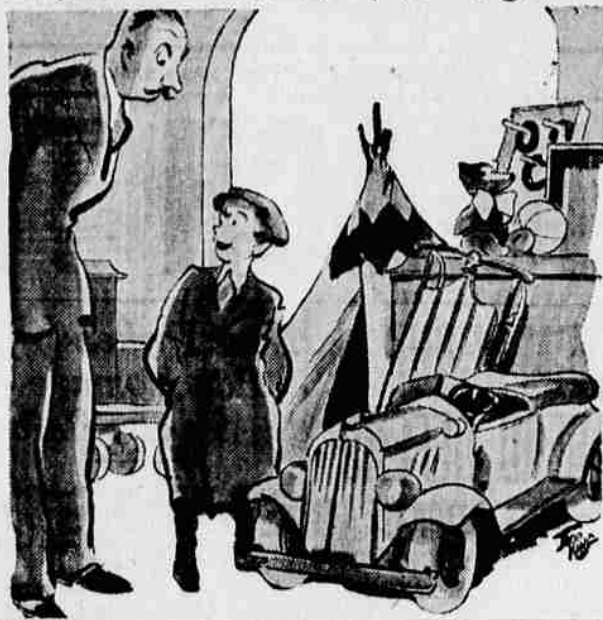

made too "strong against any executive clemency."

Skipworth Opposes Move

"Jackson county spent \$68,000 of taxpayers' money to prosecute these cases, and were it not for the mounting expense the jury would have been deadlocked on conviction of first degree murder and would not have compromised," Moody declared.

Judge G. F. Skipworth of Eugene, who presided at the trial, added his protest against a pardon. He declared Banks was "justly paying the penalty for his terrible deed."

Skipworth wrote a lengthy letter to the governor, reviewing the case and protesting any clemency.

Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle, and Charles P. Dray, superintendent of state police, were likewise emphatic in their protests.

Van Winkle's office cited that "At no time in the history of the state has a prisoner been pardoned after serving less than a year and a half of a sentence for murder."

Earl Fehl, who, under the state law has been eligible to parole for some time upon recommendation of the parole board, has twice been refused the parole with indications he would serve his full sentence. Protests against his parole have also been received by the parole board and the executive department.

Governor Meier was not at his office here today and could not be reached for comment. It was reported here that Jay Bowerman, Portland attorney, was representing the Banks family in the move for a pardon.

MEDFORD SENDS PROTESTS

MEDFORD, Ore., Dec. 10.—(AP)—The Medford city council at special session called this morning, unanimously passed a resolution, protesting against the granting of any executive clemency in the form of a pardon or commutation, to L. A. Banks serving a life sentence in state prison for the slaying of Constable George A. Prescott, March 16, 1933, as a tragic climax to a Jackson "civil war."

The resolution was wired in full to Governor Julius L. Meier.

Similar action was taken yesterday by the trustees of the Odd Fellows lodge of this city. A resolution protesting any pardon was also passed by the Elks lodge of Medford. Other fraternal and civic organizations plan the same action.

tween farm prices with industrial prices and industrial wages.

"4.—We must correct the inequalities in our tariff structure so that agriculture will enjoy equal benefits with industry and so that our foreign outlets will be restored.

"5.—We must develop commodity storage on the farm as a sound public policy.

Correct Land Use

"6.—We must strengthen and develop our credit facilities for agriculture with lower interest rates, in order to correct the inequalities between agriculture and industry.

"7.—We must correct the inequitable tax burden borne by agriculture.

"8.—We must formulate and apply a national program of land use to correct the unsound policies of the past and protect our greatest natural resource—land.

"9.—We must correct inequality in social and educational opportunities in rural life as compared with urban life.

"10.—We must strengthen the voice of agriculture through a more complete organization of farmers."
