Argentine Report Sends Grains Up

CHICAGO, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Unfavorable crop advices from Argentina did much today to make grain prices here average higher. It was indicated that the Argentine wheat crop had been seriously damaged first by frost, then by rust, and finally by a wet harvest. In some quarters, belief prevailed that commission house selling which has been freely under way for some time past in wheat here was about over.
